

Project overview

Confederation Park is a popular regional destination park located in northwest Calgary. It is a recognized historic resource and is one of Calgary's significant [cultural landscapes](#). This park was created to celebrate Canada's Centennial in 1967.

Calgary Parks is making some exciting improvements to this park in 2016/2017 in preparation for, and in celebration of Canada's 150th anniversary in 2017. Lighting, pathway and seating improvements are currently underway as identified in the Confederation Park Management Plan, which guides The City's annual work plans for the management and maintenance of the park.

Additional enhancements include:

- Replacing the playground near 30 Avenue N.W. with a natural play space;
- Repurposing the unused parking area west of the washrooms;
- Creating public art murals inside the pedestrian tunnels at 14th Street and 10th Street;
- Enhancing the plantings adjacent to the single flag to showcase a rose garden in the historic form of the Confederation symbol;
- Relocating the kidney-shaped planting bed east of 10 Street N.W. to accommodate a small, grassed amphitheatre for daytime seasonal performances;
- Removing invasive vegetation along the lagoon edge;
- Installing a deck at the lagoon to address erosion;
- Adding interpretive and way-finding signage.

The majority of the work is funded through \$1.1 million of capital funding, with the remainder aligning with The City's Public Art Policy, and playground life-cycle operating budget.

Engagement overview

In June 2016 The City hosted a public engagement session both in person and online, as well as conducted an engagement session at Rosemont School asking for input from Calgarians on the following improvements:

- ideas for re-purposing the unused parking area west of the washrooms
- suggestions for a city-wide celebration for Canada's 150th anniversary (July 1, 2017).
- designing a natural play space to replace the playground near 30 Avenue

What we asked

Re-purposing the unused parking area

Participants were asked to share their ideas about ways to repurpose the underused parking area west of the washrooms. Participants were asked to tell us how they would use the area (ex. Social gathering space with tables, an area for food trucks, etc.) This question was asked both online and at an information and engagement session on June 9th.

Suggestions for a celebration for Canada's 150th anniversary

Participants were asked for their ideas about Canadian-themed activities for a city-wide Canada Day celebration at Confederation Park on July 1, 2017. This question was asked both online and at an information and engagement session on June 9th.

Feedback on designing a natural play space to replace the playground near 30 Avenue

Participants were asked for feedback on play elements to include in a natural play space intended to replace an existing playground that is reaching the end of its life cycle. Natural play spaces are alternative playgrounds that use natural elements to inspire active and creative outdoor play, and connect people. This question was asked online through a survey, as well as through a mapping activity that was available online, at an engagement session with students at Rosemont School and at an information and engagement Session on June 9th.

What we heard - Summary

Re-purposing the unused parking area

Participants had varied suggestions for possible use of the unused parking area, including education and interpretive space for live performances, food services and amenities, kids' space and activities, and activities/features for all.

Suggestions for a celebration for Canada's 150th anniversary

Participants had varied suggestions for a 150th Canadian anniversary event, including historical and environmental, live performances, food services, and other activities.

► HISTORICAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL:

- Recognizing the history of the park and the area, including recognition of indigenous history
- Environmental and natural history of the park and the area, including information about the animals who call the park home

► LIVE PERFORMANCES:

- Music, including local musicians, children's choirs, etc.
- Movie in the park.

► FOOD SERVICES:

- Food trucks, picnic, ice cream.

► OTHER ACTIVITIES:

- Scavenger hunt, lantern release, time capsule, fireworks, BBQ, kid's games and activities, park improvements.

► CONCERNS/THINGS TO CONSIDER:

- Concerned about money spent.
- Don't want music, as it is too noisy.

A: Mapping Activity

Online or at in-person events, participants used the mapping activity to display a great deal of creativity in using natural play elements to build out a variety of play types across the play area.

▶ EAST QUADRANT OF THE PLAY AREA:

Climbing, hiding and jumping were featured often in the treed, east quadrant of the play area, including elements such as:

- Tree houses, forts and/or teepees
- Leaf, mud and sand pits
- Zip-lines
- Climbing structures
- Mazes
- Stone circles

▶ WEST QUADRANT OF THE PLAY AREA:

In the west quadrant of the play area, ideas generally focused around passive features including:

- Decorative gardens
- Wooden instruments
- Sitting along the creek

▶ NORTH QUADRANT OF THE PLAY AREA:

Ideas for the north quadrant of the play area centred on jumping and interactive play including:

- Water features
- Building materials, art and music
- In-ground trampolines
- Fire pits

▶ CENTRE OF THE PLAY AREA:

In the centre of the play area (across the center east and center south quadrants), ideas often involved introducing active play structures including:

- Water slides
- Dog parks
- Horse riding (or other animals)
- Climbing structure

B: Online Survey

Using the online survey, participants prioritized types of play and play elements they'd like to see incorporated in the natural play area.

Participants most highly rated physically active types of play – followed by creative types of play. Under each type of play participants further prioritized play elements that should be included within those types of play areas.
