4 The Primary Question

5 **How can Calgary Parks and Open Spaces collectively manage habitat within the**
6 **Weaselhead/Glenmore area in a consistent way to ensure positive and measurable biodiversity**
7 **outcomes?**

9 Twinning the paths to ensure bikes are separate as much as possible. What's going on with beaver pond
10 at bottom of south hill - doesn't seem healthy?

14 Consistent measurements of biological and social components to monitor the integrity and diversity of
15 the system with adaptive management providing the flexibility to reset the course where necessary.
16 Citizen science can play a role in the gathering of information but must be reviewed to be useful.

17 Closing unpaved trails to cyclists. Either year round or once the ground has thawed until it freezes again.
18 I find gigantic mud holes that develop and worsen with cycle use on all dirt trails thus destroying the
19 terrain. This would need to be enforced as signage would not control this.

20 Engage with Dr. Stewart Rood. Repeat the Weaselhead Societies Impact Study methodology and survey
21 sites. Add additional vegetation transects throughout the park. Utlize shorter transects for Citizen
22 Science engagement. Utilize Societies survey points on trails for citizen science contributions.

23 make it a priority, ask for volunteers, engage professional biologists, signage with interpretive
24 information

25 - Ensure that biodiversity is included as a holistic policy within all Parks and Recreation planning to build
26 common practices and sufficient institutional support towards city government workers as stewards of
27 natural areas in and around the city.

28 Perhaps a rotating schedule of areas closed off to allow for regeneration would be of value.

29 Fencing sensitive areas, lots more signs to educate educate people with pictures (people often don't
30 read the info) and lots more real enforcement of: speeding cyclists, off leash dogs, no dogs and no
31 cyclists on non paved pathway, Dog owners and cyclists know it, they deliberately ignore rules.

32 "1. Prioritize wildlife vs human use; use signage/trail cameras, etc. to get compliance with staying
33 on trails & off reservoir shore 2. Restrict some pathway access for dogs, horses, bikes, or motorized
34 transport in sensitive breeding times & territorial areas 3.Replant with native vegetation"

35 One of the most important steps that the City can take to ensure biodiversity is better managed,
36 appreciated (by all users), and preserved would be to work closely with local stewardship groups (Such
37 as Weaselhead Glenmore Park Preservation Society and Nature Calgary) as well as nearby communities.

38 Consider adding noise restrictions, steps to reduce littering (drives me bonkers), and greater protection
39 for the animals (no one needs to destroy beaver dams). People smoking pot or whatever isn't pleasant,
40 and create stronger rules/reinforcements surrounding alcohol and fire usage

41 There should be stricter enforcement of rules for use of trails extending from the paved pathway and an
42 effort to educate users as to the importance of protecting this area. Picnicking/partying should only be
43 allowed in the current designated areas.

44 Balance? potentially seasonal restrictions at non-peak times? This is a very broad question

45 Put the ecosystems first and human interaction secondary with the very important education factor of
46 how to live and behave with the natural world and gift to all Calgary and of this area which is beyond a
47 special place that must be protected now and for generations to come

48 "Leave weasel head natural. No development"

49 We need to protect the park from surrounding hazards including light, noise and off leash dogs.
50 Disallow bright LED signs and unmarked/bright glass facing park and have more presence to keep the
51 park natural as possible. Check Bird Friendly Calgary rubicon for other means to protect the area.

52 "1. Educate visitors about what flora & fauna exist in the park, and how to protect them using further
53 signage in relevant areas 2. Encourage volunteers with relevant knowledge to conduct trail sessions to
54 educate visitors 3. Randomly police restricted trail use compliance by cyclists and dog owners"

55 Protection/Engagement/Education then Enforcement. Perhaps a small outdoor "Nature Pavilion" (In the
56 underused Polo Park area) as an Education Resource Centre for kids and adults. Show what natural
57 plants/wildlife you can see in the park, and explain why it needs to be protected.

58 Restrict driving so no speeders and no idling. Close roads thru the park, so parking is like bowness park,
59 and at each end. People have to walk in and back out. Reforestation of grassed areas. Get rid of Frisbee
60 golf. Speed traps to catch everyone who speeds. There are so many speeders

61 Limit fires. And remove speeders and excess traffic. No car idling allowed. Better yet, Close inside roads
62 to cars Parking only at the canoe club and at the weaselhead parking lot. People have to walk, run or
63 cycle into the park. Reforestation in a big way. So many empty areas within the park

64 "Balance providing space (pathways, viewpoints trails etc) for human users in designated spaces, while
65 having key important plant and animal places (nest sites, rare or at risk species) protected and off limits.
66 Prioritize restoring degraded areas."

67 Develop and implement a beaver management plan similar to that in place in Fish Creek. Continue the
68 wetland monitoring near Tsuu'tina Trail that was undertaken by KGL and the Weaselhead-Glenmore
69 Preservation Society, & expand the parameters and include triggers for action. Add water quantity to it.

70 Thanks for caring about this. I'd be concerned about bikers in the area. Also, run off from Stoney Trail
71 nearby.

72 Elevated walking paths and view platforms so people know where not to go

73 Don't allow motorized recreation, control noxious weeds, avoid the use of pesticides, control predator
74 populations.

75 Most of the coniferous trees throughout Calgary are very stressed. They are producing a lot of cones to
76 produce new trees, as they believe they will die. I advocate for not cleaning up the cones to foster
77 biodiversity.

78 Consideration must be given to the historical and ongoing use of the area by horseback riders. They do
79 not have a significant impact on biodiversity and are much more gentle and compatible than dog
80 walking & fast bicycles.

81 "What is the existing plan? What is currently being done to collectively manage habitat within
82 Weaselhead/Glenmore area in a consistent way to ensure positive and measurable biodiversity
83 outcomes? What is our current plan and the shortcoming noted by the experts currently managing it?"

84 Through the preservation of native species habitat. There is lots of green space and grass around the
85 Glenmore reservoir, perhaps converting some of these less used green spaces into areas where native
86 grasses and plants species can go instead, supporting biodiversity in the area.

87 Encourage a wide range of users to participate in learning about the many ecosystems and protecting
88 them in large and small ways.

89 Maintain designated paths and expand if needed away from the water, enforcement blitzes for
90 irresponsible pet owners that do not keep their dogs on leashes, maintain visible education signs at
91 trailheads and along the trail reinforcing how precious this area is for us and the creatures we share with

92 "Limit the obstruction of wildlife movement into and out of the area. Limit the negative impacts people
93 have on urban wildlife - light, noise, dogs, litter/feeding, ignorance."

94 Protection is needed, in the form of bylaw officers patrolling to stop the mountain bikes on trails that
95 indicate "no bikes" and to stop all of the off-leash dogs. Absolutely tons of them.

96 "would like to see ""poop"" bags and dispensers installed as many metropolises in North America i love
97 the park and walk in it 2X a time in dark and daylight and there is too much abuse of pet owners not
98 picking up their animals 'poop'""

99 Limit development in and around undisturbed areas.

100 No new parking lots and continue to keep the space clean

101 Zone the land to protect natural areas from development. Put funds into projects to restore/naturalize
102 green spaces/open spaces with native species. Also consider a bat condo!

103 "Do species counts at a predetermined interval. Determine a set of parameters that indicates if
104 environmental damage is occurring. Install nature cameras. Identify unmarked trails and include signage
105 for "no access" to sensitive areas. Designate volunteer stewards to monitor the park."

106 Reducing the prominence of major roads would go a long way. The highway and Crowchild generate
107 significant air and noise pollution and are a major barrier for animals. Reducing speeds on these roads
108 and/or providing grade separated crossing would do a lot to alleviate the harm caused by these roads.

109 Stop spraying pesticides around this area - start using natural solutions.

110 Enforce by any means the way to keep humans on trails and to stop cutting across corners or other
111 short cuts. Also enforce the rules of conduct in using the park and trails. Enforce sharing rules!

112 Start by dredging the lake before it silts up completely. It is barely usable for boaters now, i.e. humans,
113 who are living organisms. If you don't do something, the reservoir will be useless for both drinking water
114 and for flood control within 30 years, Then yes, preserve the environment surrounding

115 "Protect the watershed from runoff, provide corridors between other natural or semi-natural areas, and
116 do not mow Having less light pollution in the surrounding area would help insect population as well I
117 haven't been to weaselhead for a while but these are good principles for ecological health"

118 No more fishing. People fish and leave the fishing lines around the water. Not good for any of the wild
119 life.

120 Please have another election. This city of calgary is clueless on what we need

121 Having this area remain natural and healthy is really important to me. If invasive species are an issue, I
122 support the city to weed or spray some minimal amounts of pesticides to preserve the native
123 biodiversity.

124 Give dog owners a place near the water to let their dogs off-leash if you don't want them doing it in
125 other parts of the park. This is a huge park and nearby off-leash areas are very scarce. Doing this should
126 keep people and dogs away from sensitive areas. Completely outlawing it will not.

127 "Maintain pathways and boardwalks throughout the park. Currently- the boardwalks are broken and
128 results in other pathways being made and boardwalks being used while broken in fragile wetlands. Also
129 need to address mountain biking in the area - many tracks in areas which indicate no mountain bikes."

130 Keep the area undisturbed, free from any development and let access only for pedestrians and non
131 electric bicycles. No e-bikes, scooters or whatsoever.

132 Can we still ride our horses on the designated paths?

133 Do not encourage more users by adding more trails. Prohibit dogs from most of the area. Enforcement
134 of existing rules, every day, with multiple officers patrolling, is vital. S Too many users, some of them
135 incorrigibly ignorant, want to use the park.

136 Given Calgary's already large and growing population, and differing impact of different outdoor
137 recreation pursuits, I think that access and activity restrictions are necessary. It is an unfortunate reality,
138 but nature easily dies from thousands of small injuries that individually don't matter.

139 Please have indigenous people take the lead in creating a sustainable plan.

140 Begin with an appropriate funding and resource model. Many municipal/provincial partnerships are
141 short sighted and include too large a scope based on short term funding. Short term measurable goals
142 and projections result in cleaner and demonstrable outcomes.

143 Management, with consultation like this, is key. Providing management options for consideration and
144 comment is more helpful than a blank page like this. Still, closing areas or all of it during critical dates,
145 such as breeding or hatching, may be called for. Similar management ideas are options.

146 Put defined paths in a small area of the park, leaving most of the park natural. Control park entry so as
147 to permit only limited numbers of people inside. Facilities should be only on the park perimeter. Dogs
148 should not be allowed.

149 "1) Keep area natural, no more development of any kind. 2) Do not promote. Do not encourage people
150 who would not visit on their own initiative. 3) Enforce rules. Off leash dogs, off paved trail bikes a big
151 problem. 4) More nat env parks to reduce pressure on all parks, especially as pop grows."

152 Manage as per guidelines in the NAMP AND BYLAWS. Create formalized trail system for protection and
153 access for disabilities.

154 west side - leave it natural and don't develop it. people enter an area and its devastated by those who
155 don't care. happened to fish creek (I know I grew up there park when it was private) construction of
156 paths disturbs growth/animal habitat - dislodging forcing them to move out. fenced it off.

157 Find ways to balance public demand with habitat management. Trails are heavily used in some areas
158 causing erosion and signs of overuse. We use the boat launch area by Heritage Park often to launch
159 kayaks. Can be congested. It's a very important, biodiverse park area that we don't want to lose.

160 I believe we should ban bicycles from the trails that are not paved. Also letting dogs off leash on
161 unpaved paths and in wooded areas is destructive to the flora & keeps the fauna away.

162 Can you provide a more detailed management plan or at least an outline. I am unyer

163 Keep the area as natural as possible. Provide separate space for bike and pedestrians to encourage
164 visitors to stay on the paths. Have ambassadors to share the "rules" as to what is best for the
165 environment. Give guided tours to spread the word.

166 Provide talks to school aged children on the same importance of biodiversity and how to behave in
167 natural spaces. Coordinate with specialty groups such as those managing invasive species to monitor
168 and address issues as they arise. Organize citizen science activities for collecting data.

169 Just leave it alone. It is doing just fine without political interference.

170 The plan needs to be married to human use. Biodiversity needs to include usage not barring human
171 access and enjoyment.

172 I believe so, the park of Weaselhead needs to be watched and taken care of for the people of Calgary
173 and for the species, aquatic ecosystems, terrestrial, marine, and the ecological complexes. It brings good
174 people to Calgary to enjoy this beautiful place and there must be signs and garbage waste...

175 We must include the public to help with maintaining the beauty and health of our parks by educating
176 people about how important our parks are and how each one of us can help in our own small way.

177 Leave it alone.

178 Please leave the Weaselhead area and any currently undeveloped areas in North and South Glenmore
179 Parks as is. The Weaselhead is fine the way it is, and leaving it in a less developed state would be my
180 preference. Less is more at times.

181 There needs to be a balance of pathways intermixed with natural areas. Mowed sections need to be
182 maintained for picnic and family use. Conflicts occur most often between pedestrians and cyclists, and
183 with dogs who are offleash. Minor tweaking is needed to protect wildlife and prevent random paths

184 Expand wildlife. Return interior to original pathways. Stop excessive spring flooding. Redo inland H2O
185 path with rocks. Remove some of the coyotes so rabbits have a chance to return. No picnic tables. Path
186 for animals to migrate across tsuut'ina double highway safely. No nude beach. Cyclists slowed

187 Maintain the areas you have now established. Leave the Weaslehead with clear usage boundaries as
188 they exist. Monitor for abuses and deal with those individuals rather than punishing those who respect
189 the park. What is happening now is excellent.

190 Since any kind of building development, even pathways, tends to be irreversible and damaging to the
191 environment, the city of Calgary should preserve the area as is. Dog walkers littering,
192 homeless/campers, garbage dumpers, poachers, etc, should be charged under local law as strongly as
193 possible.

194 Leave the area in its natural state and don't tinker with it, leading to unintended consequences. Nature
195 is more than capable of maintaining biodiversity on its own.

196 A key concern with the question is the use of the words "manage habitat". The area hasn't been a
197 natural area for some time. It is contrived. The removal of the thriving beaver pond is one example. The
198 massive highway to the west has cut off the area. It feels like the Glenmore Dam Dog Park now.

199 "Keep it natural

200 Animals and nature first ... humans needs last"

201 Keep the ring road isolated from the area. Perhaps sound deadening the highway would be effective.

202 More corridor work to allow wildlife to pass under ring road.

203 Priority should be given to the conservation of species in these parks. Human use should be restricted
204 where appropriate to ensure enough space and connectivity for the various species to thrive. Then,
205 education, education, education. Signage. Messaging. And, sound barrier the Ring Road!!

206 Dogs need to be on leashes, in parks and public spaces and need to be picked up after. There isn't a
207 single block when walking through school yards, city paths/sidewalks that is clear of feces. They are
208 destroying natural areas and contaminating waterways like the NW storm water ponds/CTrain area.

209 I believe in order to keep the Weaselhead/Glenmore Park area in line with the goal of biodiversity we
210 should focus on increasing natural processes in the area while informing the greater public. Here are
211 some ideas: limiting light pollution. A building perhaps for the WGPPS. Indigenous initiative.

215 "Create a separate bike only lane. Remove the horse trails and make them wider gravel paths. In force
216 bylaws for office dogs and increase the fines"

217 "Hi, Are there plans for more tree planting especially the area to the west near 37th Street SW. Could
218 the neighbouring properties be encouraged to join a partnership to also create more habitat along their
219 fence line. Any further tree planting would be excellent."

220 Calgary Parks and Open Spaces can continue to prohibit dogs in the Weaselhead Flats area.

221 Weaselhead natural landscape must be retained and managed independent of the nonnatural Glenmore
222 park portions. Do not expand the trails within Weaselhead, discourage off trail use. Restrict bike use to
223 regional paved path. Improve wildlife connectivity upstream. improve interpretation.

224 Dogs must be kept leashed and under control.

225 Regularly monitor the trails. Fine accordingly. Keep advertising to a minimum. Educate through
226 signage. Mostly concerned with cyclists and off leash dogs disturbing the wildlife and fauna.

227 100% no off leash allowed. Better enforcement and strong fines. No warnings for violators. When you
228 give a warning it is ignored.

229 I suggest banning dogs. Calgary has plenty of off-leash and other areas where dogs are allowed. It would
230 be nice to have a park where dogs are not allowed. North and South Glenmore park and Weaslehead
231 seem ideal to me.

232 By installing a wildlife barrier fence in the new highway. Many large animals have been killed already.
233 You can't have biodiversity without allowing wildlife corridors. Also the trails need to monitored. Many
234 dogs are running loose in critical nesting areas.

235 You cant. The damage has been done. Where is the fencing for the new highway? How many animals
236 have been killed by cars? After the military left I observed moose, elk, deer, bear, beaver, coyotes,
237 cougar and many bird species including Osprey, Owls, Redtail Hawks and a Bald Eagle, most are gone.

238 Reduce the bike traffic in the whole area. High speed road bikes and electric bikes are driving
239 pedestrians (with their dogs) off the paved paths and into the areas normally left to the animals and
240 native plants. This behavior is driving native animals away and destroying their habitat.

241 Prevention of habitat destruction and animal disturbance includes preventing cyclists from entering
242 non-designated trails, off leash dogs, dog feces left behind. Enforcement with substantial fines would
243 benefit this fragile ecosystem. The complaint system in place is non-effective.

244 Maintain a clearly marked trail system - reduce unofficial trails and take regular action to prevent their
245 proliferation; enforce the current regulation that visitors stay on trails; clarify and enforce no dog/bike
246 access other than along regional pathway; control invasive and non-native vegetation

247 There is a lot of misuse of the pathways with bikes and with people with dogs. Is there a better way to
248 monitor this, for the safety of the others who use the park and for wildlife?

249 Better map outlines of where Equestrians can safely ride without interfering with the bike paths/walking
250 paths so we are less disruptive to the habitat.

251 Enforce dog on leash rules. Restrict bikes to established paths. Block unplanned paths and revegetate
252 unplanned paths. Weed control.

253 Hello. As a dog owner, I truly enjoy coming to Glenmore Park areas for walks. However, majority of the
254 time it's extremely difficult to stay on paved pathways due to speeding cyclists. It's hardly safe for me,
255 let alone for my pet. Taking non-paved trails often times is a much safer path for us.

256 Dogs shouldn't be allowed in biodiverse sensitive areas.

257 Need enforcement and heavy fines for people who let their dogs off leash

258 I think the City of Calgary needs to fine the people who use weaslehead as a clothing optional area in the
259 summer. This area should be open to the public. Families should be able to take their kids there without
260 running into naked adults walking on thw trails.

261 More education signs & information stations. Increased garbage cans on the bathrooms to encourage
262 pet clean up. Enforcing owners to keep pets on leash. Bike speeds lowered near high congestion areas
263 such as boat launch and Glenmore landing, rockyview hospital.

264 Maintain pathways. Continue to require dogs on leash. Do not allow any further develop adjacent to, or
265 within the park. Essentially - preserve this special space.

266 More staff to keep areas clean. Slow down speeding bicycles. Post more educational signage to help
267 people understand about the park. No more parking lots. Stop cutting drown trees and bushes and not
268 replacing them.

269 A lot of the area surrounding weaselhead flats used for the motorway is now bare grass. If this was
270 planted with native species, grasses and or trees it would encourage better ecosystems in the park itself.

271 Planting trees and regular maintenance should be top priorities. Trees provide natural habitat, shade
272 and food for many different species. By planting at empty or cleared areas, biodiversity can grow and
273 spread. Idea: starting a community based initiative to help clean and maintain the area.

274 "Keep the pathways well maintained and bikes only on the paved paths. Concerned about the over
275 crowding of picnic areas especially in South Glenmore Park."

276 Leave it be. It's nature, it will take care of itself.

277 Limit bikes and dogs to paved pathways and enforce the existing rules regarding dogs and cyclists. Also,
278 if feasible it would be great to have separate walking and biking paths so that cyclists and walkers aren't
279 getting in each other's way. You might also consider a speed limit for cyclists.

280 Do very little to accommodate people using the area. I've seen much intentional and unintentional
281 damage caused by users over the years. It suffers from too many people.

282 Make it more accessible to people.

283 Don't put a ring road through the area.

284 I wish we could have our permanent disc golf course in north glenmore!

285 Build some mountain bike trails

286 Would like W/G to always remain maintained parks for all generations. Would hope city enforces bylaw
287 and fines to dog owners. Way too many dogs running wild on the WF trails everyday, chasing wildlife,
288 flushing birds and excrement is everywhere not picked up. Thx for survey

289 Maintain foot access only. Limit bikes to paved or designated trails only. Consider using low intensity
290 prescribed fires in the winter for a planned disturbance regime. Utilize restoration methods such as
291 rough and loose for non-designated trails. Have a budget for invasive plant management.

292 Weaselhead has a nude beach, which is fine, except that I went only to be faced with the nude beach
293 being a place for same sex couples to engage in sex out in the open. Morals and boundaries of engaging
294 in sex in Weaselhead should be addressed.

295 Prohibit dogs from the wild areas, so many off leash dogs all the time, I'm sure they are impacting
296 wildlife. And somehow mitigate the impact of the ring road. It looks like water in the wetland areas has
297 been detrimentally impacted. Certainly the noise is overwhelming

298 "Providing maintained trails that encourage people to use them rather than going off the path.
299 Identifying critical locations and closing those areas with signage explaining why that area will be closed
300 and for how long. Public washrooms and compost/recycling/waste bins to reduce human
301 contamination."

302 Appropriate investment in the project and educational opportunities for Calgarians

303 Manage the park to maintain natural habitat as much as practical. Include invasive plant & animal
304 management by mechanical or chemical means. But only use chemicals if all other methods fail.
305 Maintain the natural light ecology. No permanent lights outside the parking lot.

306 Theres needs to signs posted as to where The Elbow River ends and The Glenmore Reservoir starts. I fish
307 both and with out a clear sign you end up with people fishing the river during times when they should
308 not be fishing at all and they use baits that shoud never be used in the river

309 Restore the wetlands that the ring road destroyed.

310 Have to find ways to facilitate wildlife movement across the Freeway both ways. Overpass, underpass?
311 Should have been done during construction but here we are.

312 Leave it alone

313 My wish for the area is to keep invasive plants at bay. The invasive caragana is making a comeback.

314 "Develop a meaningful relationship with Tsu Tina for joint management to meet conservation goals.
315 Limit trails to limit human access. Monitor and manage invasive species. Seek conversation corridor
316 west along waterway."

317 "Increased enforcement of Dogs of leash to prevent the disturbance of wildlife. Prevent motorized
318 scooters from using walk ways as they access off trail as well. Have areas closed off to the public for
319 restoration. Restore riparian areas."

320 "Leave it alone as much as possible. I'll still be running on the path."
321 Educating visitors.
322 "Enforce the rules. Yikes. Dogs off leash. People leaving their garbage behind. Breaking branches trees
323 'art'. Emptying the garbage promptly. I get concerned in the fall months when I walk in the early
324 mornings and see the trash bins overflowing. Bear bait!"
325 Keep the cyclists and dogs out of there! Improve signage! Enforce the rules! Educate people better!
326 Look at key indicator species and quantify their numbers and health (qualitative); regular water analysis
327 (quality and quantity); identify unique species or new species that may indicate positive or negative
328 changes perhaps through eDNA analysis; track intact geographical corridor and any changes
329 Dogs should be restricted to main asphalt paths ON LEASH! and banned from the trails. They chase
330 wildlife who inhabit the area and they defecate everywhere, most dog walkers don't pick up.
331 For the preservation of Weaselhead and North Glenmore Park, the city should establish more off-leash
332 parks in new communities to take pressure off these precious areas. Currie Barracks turf is tiny, dogs
333 fight and get injured and too much concentration of urine and feces.
334 Would like the City to enforce dogs on leashes as we constantly encounter dogs running on trails
335 disturbing wildlife. Never see bylaw officers, very disappointed in the City.
336 We visit Weaselhead Flats, North and South Glenmore Parks but have concerns over off-leash dogs
337 ruining biodiversity. Bylaw enforcement and fines needed.
338 We walk in Weaselhead Flats on a regular basis and appreciate the area. One concern is the number of
339 people walking dogs off-leash on the dirt paths. We encounter a lot of dog poop on the paths and have
340 concerns for wildlife when the dogs chase after deer and other animals.
341 Honestly I have no idea. But I wanted to say thank you for working on this. As a community member
342 and user of the park I very much value the environmental value of having a space like this in the city.
343 Please do what is necessary to keep the Weaselhead a healthy ecosystem.
344 Enforcement of no off-leash dogs
345 By continuing to educate people and have opportunities to have guided walks, interpretation - programs
346 for students - indigenous perspectives included - a base such as a place to learn such as Inglewood Bird
347 Sanctuary or at Fish Creek
348 first and foremost, ban dogs off-leash. They are the most destructive element in the natural setting. I
349 find trails littered with dog poop, (I saw 3 piles yesterday as I was riding the paved path) and yes I fully
350 know the difference between dog and coyote scat.
351 The best way to manage the habitat is manage access and activity. The area should be managed as a
352 natural area with clear rules and enforcement when necessary. It is also part of Calgary's watershed
353 and drinking water which must be understood by all.
354 " - Look at ways to help animal movement over or under the ring road

355 - What happened to the beaver dam / swamp area, where is the water? Construction changed that area
356 - Enforce no biking on trails and dog leashing
357 - More nature tours aimed at people who don't normally interact with nature"
358 "Some areas and some activities in the more remote areas may need to be off-limits (eg clothing
359 optional beach) - some additional enforcement may be needed Better signage and better maintenance
360 on the gravelled & boardwalk trails will encourage people to stay on proper paths"
361 No additional formal pathway paving. Rotation of areas of the park that have access so some times of
362 year, whole areas are not accessible by people. Improved signage around the park about which animals
363 park visitors are sharing the park with.
364 Picking the most important value is a place to start. You have already identified the importance of
365 biodiversity and I think it is an essential aspect of sustainability for a city. I think it should be the primary
366 value of the Weaselhead. In the remainder of Glenmore recreation would be a priority.
367 I would not want to close the area, but reducing use may be part of the answer, I see plenty of geese,
368 gold eyes, Ibis, killdeer, etc there in the spring but very little in the fall, when there are still plenty at
369 say Carburn park, is it the extra filling of the dam moving them away?
370 My concern is for the eastern edge of the park. There is no public pathway that allows the continuous
371 flow of pedestrians and bicycles completely circumnavigating the park. The beauty of the park comes to
372 an abrupt halt between Heritage Park and Rockyview Hospital where there is no pathway.
373 Raising the level of the dam has distorted the riverbanks and back channels. This combined with the
374 massive roadway has isolated this section of land where it feels inauthentic to continue to refer to it as a
375 natural area. It is becoming a contrived area.
376 I know the ecological importance and significance of this area. It is a privilege to access it. I think you
377 need to manage it by dropping the hammer. Do all the management steps you outline, and we might
378 have a chance of saving it.
379 "1. Manage visitor behaviors: make expectations & reasons clear, and ENFORCE. How about gates on
380 the entryways to the no-dogs paths, with clear ""no dogs past this point"" signs? 2. Manage the
381 ecosystem: Water levels, vegetation, wildlife, beaver damage... I'll leave this one up to the scientists!"
382 Enforce existing regulations banning dogs.
383 the inclusion of North and South Glenmore Parks makes me hopeful that the city is taking a holistic
384 view of the region to sustain wildlife and the commodification of the parks that has occurred in recent
385 years
386 Don't build any more roads through Weaselhead, for a start. That big "utility corridor" sure isn't doing
387 the area any favours. Really though, this is the kind of question that should go out to the experts, so, ask
388 a few conservationists?
389 More educational signage! And collaboration with indigenous communities to include their languages of
390 the various species. Path maintenance to encourage users to stay on trails, protect the riparian zones on
391 the river banks to promote healthy water body ecosystems

392 We need protect the area from the potentially harmful impact of surrounding roads, pollutants, and
393 pollutions through accessing scientific and conservational knowledge and resources. We also need to
394 ensure natural areas are not further developed or encroached upon and establish robust buffer zones.

395 Continue to allow use of the area, but manage use, primarily through environmental education
396 opportunities of users

397 "Do not over develop neighbouring districts, ie Eagle Ridge , Bayview by densifying them with large
398 housing units or retail. This will only lead to more infringement on natural habitats and destroy the
399 natural beauty we see today"

400 Habitat will look after itself if we manage human impact. Paved pathways, viewpoints and limiting off-
401 pathway traffic.

402 With the densification goals and aspirations of Council and City Management, there is an expectation
403 that more parks and green areas of all classifications, will need to be developed. These natural areas are
404 going to be, under threat with increased demands resulting from densification.

405 Leave it alone. It's already diverse and thriving and city intervention will probably just ruin what is the
406 best park in the city.

407 Resources for trail upkeep, and monitoring to let people enjoy the area appropriately, while still offering
408 animal/plant habitat protection. Limiting further development/uses to protect and manage these special
409 areas.

410 Allow bikes on trails in weaselhead. Expand area to include greenspace near cedarbrae and oakridge
411 between dog park and southland drive/ring road. Encourage citizen permitted tree planting in
412 designated areas to boost tree population.

413 There needs to be a concentrated, multiyear effort to tackle noxious and prohibited noxious weeds.
414 Enlist volunteers and professionals to get rid of yellow clematis, spotted knapweed and other weeds.

415 Good question, but disingenuous. Calgary Parks and Open Spaces lost the battle for ensuring
416 biodiversity in the Weaselhead when an EIGHT [offensive language removed] LANE FREEWAY went in on
417 its western edge! Stop pretending it's a wild area. It's a city park! Let people enjoy with dogs and on
418 bikes and sunbathe nude!

419 Start with the strategies from the Q and A and enforce them. We are encroaching too much into this
420 area as time goes on especially with the ring road and Taza so the natural realm needs some protection.
421 Get an idea of initial populations and then monitor the strategies to see what's working best!

422 The new Stoney trail west has cut off the area from the more natural areas to the west. Priority should
423 be given to create under and over passes across Stoney trails for wildlife to safely pass.

424 What goals relative to the area? At a minimum, I'd maintain current levels of bio-diversity. Preferably,
425 return to the levels of that existed before the park started to experience more intensive use in the 70's.
426 Acknowledge though that reservoir is artificial; historic river or post 30's baseline?

427 Better enforcement of bylaws! ie: dogs off-leash/poop pick-up fishing. Bird feeders along pathways
428 removed to keep the area "wild" and reduce attractant along pathways. Unmanaged bike use of

429 unsanctioned, unpaved pathways leads to degraded vegetation along trails and surprise wildlife
430 encounters.

431 Minimize dog usage in these areas. Dogs I feel are the biggest threat to biodiversity, as they are an
432 unnatural introduction of an animal into an environment. Dogs and birds do not interact well together,
433 and dogs are a threat to all ground level nests. Off leash dogs must be enforced. Thank you

434 Provide noise and sight protection from Stoney trail - add trees and shelter buffer.

435 The Weaselhead is now fragmented habitat with West Stoney Trail. Contact the province to build
436 wildlife tunnels, reduce noise and light. Bikes and dogs need to be restricted to paved trails. The
437 Weaselhead area has many diverse habitats, requiring careful management to remain a gem for
438 Calgarians.

439 Do we know what is there now in terms of species counts and density, nests of x bird per acre etc?

440 This question is best answered by experts in bio-diversity, ecology, habitat restoration, and parks
441 management. The public will come with a wide range of opinions but what is important to me is that
442 every preservation measure undertaken is based on solid science.

443 Keep things pretty much as they are, but perhaps limit where users can walk. There are many duplicated
444 trails.

445 Connect to river valley west of Stoney trail

446 Keep pathways and development to an absolute minimum. Other than the main pathway through the
447 area, there should be no other paved paths in the area. Preservation of the biodiversity should be
448 valued MUCH higher than increasing park capacity for more people.

449 Public education plays a very important role. Many people do not understand the environmental impact
450 of walking off trail, feeding wildlife, or having pets off leash. I think learning resources for all ages need
451 to be developed and shared in a way that promotes stewardship and action.

452 Wrong question. We have massive amounts of biodiverse areas within a short drive from the city.
453 Weasel head is in an urban setting and the focus should be on providing access to Calgarians and
454 encouraging appreciation of this natural setting, the. doing our best to preserve habitat.

455 A couple of concerns exist in my favourite park. 1.) the effect of the ring road and new development on
456 the Indigenous land nearby the park - how can we best mitigate this? 2.) the variability of water levels
457 due to the increased dam volume. I've seen some species really thrive from this!

458 Informative/interpretive signage along the most commonly used pathways would be nice. Maybe
459 include some of the photos taken by park users to identify some of the animals and plants that are
460 unique or important to this special place.

461 Do not let dogs in the area. All scientific data shows dogs negatively impact biodiversity.

462 We need to rebalance our relationship to the area and change management practices to better address
463 the pressures and degradation resulting from development and human activity. I strongly believe we
464 should take a similar approach as the Inglewood Bird Sanctuary in protecting habitat in the area.

465 Last summer I was in the flats and was horrified at the amount of homeless encampments and
466 associated debris. This must have a shocking effect on the ecosystem, from disrupting the species trying
467 to exist and breed and raise their young, to polluting the water areas and the risk of fire etc

468 "These areas should be protected to the maximum by prohibiting dogs, bikes especially mountain bikes,
469 and activities such as nude sunbathing (totally ridiculous as to why this has ever been allowed). Make
470 the park areas accessible for low-key human activities (walking, picnics) not disruptive ones."

471 More enforcement. Stop people from using it as a off leash dog area

472 Maximize habitat connectivity and foster coexistence strategies including acknowledging that wildlife
473 uses this area regardless of whether people see it or not

474 Since the Tsuut'Ina Trail went in the beaver pond was first flooded and silted in following heavy rains
475 and now is dried out to lowest level I have seen it since 1973. Has runoff that used to fill the pond now
476 been diverted? Dried out ponds do suffer significant loss of biodiversity!

477 More conservation, less recreation. The picnic areas are often full of garbage summer mornings, people
478 camp overnight in the summer fully set up in the parking lots, dogs are often off leash running through
479 wildlife areas, ...

480 1) No Bikes on upaved pathways. 2) Block pathways, that cascade the embankment on the North side 3)
481 Remove games installations 4) Enforce after hours access and camping bylaw. 5) Enforce off leash bylaws
482 the park.

483 the weaselhead belongs to the original peoples of the land. and calgary for the most part .leave it alone.
484 all you do is interfere with nature by changing it. god already made things how they were intended to
485 be. the city never paid anyone for the land they are currently profiting off of

486 Restrict/eliminate off-paved-trail mountain biking. Bikes cause extensive erosion, destroy plants & roots,
487 frighten deer & other fauna. Close the west end Weaselhead path network for short periods when trails
488 are very muddy as pedestrians widen the paths killing plants to avoid puddles.

489 I like the idea of restricting access hours; would be nice to have more bylaw enforcement to stop people
490 making new trails and littering.

491 Keep trails to a minimum and block unofficial trails.

492 Habitat protection is the number one way to ensure consistent and positive biodiversity outcomes in my
493 opinion. With an ever-growing city and population ensuring that people keep to specific trails and do
494 not stress the landscape more than is needed is crucial.

495 I am very concerned that this is a shadow project designed to promote selling off portions of the natural
496 area.

497 Efforts should focus on keeping the park accessible to users and ensure there are sanctioned spaces for
498 all types of use (walking, biking, dog walking, picnicking, etc).

499 "We need to control use of bikes of all types. South Glenmore and Weaselhead need two pathways (one
500 for walkers, one for bikes) similar to the North Glenmore area. Bikes should be restricted to this paved
501 path. More work is needed to eliminate invasive species of plants."

502 Maintain the existing pathway system as it is today. We don't need anymore paths and do not pave any
503 more of them. On pathways that tend to have muddy sections, bark chips or gravel could be added.
504 Love this park already.

505 Don't mess with anything! Other than perhaps a slightly more developed swimming beach, people tend
506 to make their own and although it's not really encouraged, people will do it anyways so might as well
507 have a more managed area intended for that - especially if people wanted to do open water swimming.

508 Prioritize the protection of nature. Keep human footprint as is, or make smaller. Dogs must be on
509 leashes, have an enforcement plan. Consider visitation limits.

510 Designate space specifically for wildlife. There are lots of little side trails people have carved throughout
511 the park that may have a negative impact on vegetation and cause wild animals to stay away. And make
512 sure the new ring road isn't causing harm to wildlife and their natural movements.

513 There seems to be an issue with unleashed dogs. More education maybe? More enforcement is
514 definately needed.

515 Pathways that people are encouraged to use, and natural areas kept natural allowing animals to also use
516 these spaces. Allow the coyotes, moose, bears, and all other animals to use the habitat as it was their
517 home. Don't continue to poison Richardson Ground Squirrels as they are important as well.

518 Strong protections for the waterways and natural areas, maintain pathways and encourage people to
519 stick to them, monitor and measure wildlife numbers.

520 Continue to support pathways and information / education

521 Reduce the number of people and their pets in these areas

522 Keep space wild. Explore opportunities to avoid, mitigate offset impacts. Minimize additional
523 infrastructure in glenmore/weaslehead area. Keep parks closed overnight. Minimize light and noise
524 disturbances. Avoid large scale events (ex marathons) through weaselhead.

525 Manage the habitat by removing access to sensitive areas, create clearly marked pathway systems for
526 people to enjoy but be sure to mark the out-of-bounds area with signage and enforcement. Record a list
527 of flora and fauna and monitor this list yearly to be sure biodiversity is intact.

528 Leave it as is. Nature finds away in ecosystems when it is left alone.

529 Keep as natural as possible. No more roadways over / through natural area. Should have been no
530 brainer adjacent to a main water supply.

531 I really think it should be left alone, leaving it as it is! People can enjoy it in its wilderness state.
532 Developing it more would change the natural landscape of it, people enjoy it for its naturalness

533 Keep it the same as it is! Except for fixing damaged pathways, and possibly more garbage cans closer to
534 the sailing club and fire pit areas, keep it as it is. Consistent monitoring of plant and animal life, along
535 with water, is needed.

536 As a very frequent summertime and occasional wintertime user of the park, I think there is a wealth of
537 observable biodiversity and it appears to be managed in a way that permits enjoyment of urbanites to
538 enjoy our park jewel.

539 I don't believe that any further management is required.

540 The biodiversity of the area should NOT be impacted by trying to implement human activity diversity.
541 Bike paths, a plethora of hiking trails and the like, have no place in a relatively pristine natural
542 environment. True nature is such a precious thing.

543 With the exception of reducing animal - vehicle collisions along Stoney, leave the park as is. It certainly
544 doesn't need any development, just path maintenance.

545 Protect against partyers, late night idiots, and people who don't respect the park. Lock it at night, watch
546 who uses the park. Monitor animal safety.

547 Consult wildlife, biodiversity, urban, & nature conservation specialists

548 Remove all human contact, interaction and presence from the entire area, permanently.

549 Absolutely zero development. Make sure it is left as a natural habitat for years to come.

550 Encourage more rewilding where possible in order to let wildlife & flora repopulate the area. Ban any
551 development that might encroach on the area & disturb habitats. Expand the park area to the North &
552 South of the Western half of the Flats. Better enforcement of picnic/BBQ & off-leash areas.

553 I'm wondering how the current approach is working. Perhaps more of the same is warranted.

554 The Weaselhead is a Gem, it is a wilderness area within a major city, this quite rare and we should be
555 proud of it. We have to protect it for all generations that follow us. We must not let abuse by those that
556 disregard the rules take it away from us. No bikes and dogs on the trails....

557 don't allow dogs, reduce trails if possible, allow only passive recreation - eg walking, not biking off trail,
558 remove invasives, plant native sp, could look at fencing off areas - but that does not necessarily work,
559 increase signage about the importance of the area, why to "tread lightly"

560 You are doing a great job, we appreciate it, keep it going !! And thanks for all your work, it's wonderful.

561 Primarily continued access to the Weaselhead by the public Better informative signage, more garbage
562 receptacles and a reduction in bureaucratic overreach in trying govern people. Park is working just fine

563 Keep bicycles out. Keep them off the main path, the little side paths, and the bridge. No one needs to
564 be zooming through there. Make a path that goes along the new ring road.

565 How will the impact of the ring road be measured?

566 Enforce the rules of no bikes and dogs inside Weaselhead. I'm tired of these aggressive people taking
567 over and getting away with it

568 No mountain bikes.

569 The optimum approach is to limit development of facilities to what currently exists, stop the
570 proliferation of trails, harden the approved trails to limit erosion and add more educational media to
571 alert users to proper etiquette and the value of the natural resources

572 All dogs should be banned in the park. They and their careless owners are destroying the sensitive
573 habitat

574 I'm not enough of an expert to be able to answer this question in an informed way. It is critical at this
575 time that we preserve and allow nature to flourish.

576 Always (consistently) put the animals, plants, their habitats and their genes as a higher priority than
577 human needs and our insatiable greed to overtake and own every square inch of beauty and land this
578 plant has to offer.

579 The key to managing biodiversity in this area will be managing what happens above and upstream of the
580 Elbow River. Shutting the map down at Tsuttina/ Stoney Trail severely limits the scope. The water
581 flowing through the Weaselhead becomes habitat for everything and drinking Easter for half of YYC.

582 Provide clear paths for people, and path-free areas for nature.

583 Leave it as is

584 Disallow dogs in park. Unfortunately, too many dog owners do not follow rules: allow dogs off leash,
585 allow dogs to chase wildlife, & not pick up after their pet (or drop poop bags). Calgary has ample off
586 leash dog infrastructure throughout the city. Nature deserves a place to call home.

587 Do not expand parking lots or make it easier for more people to go there. There must be a limit on
588 visitors, and keeping the parking lots small, helps.

589 Establish/expand an advisory committee (with Indigenous) to oversee plan development AND
590 implementation/sustainment (ie Weaselhead Glenmore preservation society, Calgary River Valleys,
591 Elbow River Watershed Partnership, Friends of Fish Creek, Parks Foundation, community assns adjacent
592 to plan area).

593 If you truly want biodiversity, then you need to strengthen the ecosystem by planting more trees. Trees
594 are an extremely important organism to most ecosystems as they are the body of most systems. They
595 provide shelter for animal, insect, and plant life.

596 Don't spend money on this. Keep the park the way it is, and use funds for something meaningful.

597 I think there needs to be active monitoring of number of people using the park at various locations thru
598 non-intrusive means, monitoring the state of pathways, regulation, signage and education, and active
599 monitoring during phased in changes. People do not necessarily come first in any plan!

600 Leave the weasel head alone. Do nothing.

601 I was born in 1970. The reservoir was built. The flats are the only good spot remaining. To keep them
602 clean we need to keep the new bridge pillars free of garbage and camps. The garbage will come from
603 the new retail. The camps will come. Keep out garbage

604 We often see dogs running all throughout the area and are not leashes. Especially in the weaselhead
605 park near the elbow River. Perhaps enforcing this might help.

606 Leave the trails alone. This sounds like a way to force trail closures on people that use that actually use
607 the park

608 This is a very broad question but I feel that the city needs to maintain the park and make it accessible to
609 all calgarians.

610 Secure animal corridors using people restriction fencing in weaselhead elbow river flats. Add extend
611 single walking/biking loop on flats. Restrict access to path way only.

612 More education and enforcement in North glenmore park. Lack of washrooms for the masses of people
613 in summer. Enforcement of proper fire pit use

614 Continued rehabilitation, diversity projects to reintroduce and support wildlife while limited further
615 human development

616 Remove access for all dogs and cyclists and enforce it.

617 "1.Ecological literacy: increased information about: natural grassland. Species at risk 2: ecological
618 resilience - natural wildflower planting, bird nest boxes, species surveys, upstream connectivity. 3,4:
619 collaboration and integration - "Weaselhead preservation society +TsuTina consulting"

620 I was very disappointed that people were allowed to have alcohol in the park. Totally disagree with that
621 decision as the reason you should be going in the park is to appreciate nature in all aspects and you
622 certainly don't need alcohol to do that and which leads to other problems.

623 The issue is how to keep the Humans out of some of the habitat

624 I wish to remind all involved in this eco project that this area belongs to the citizens of Calgary and not ,
625 just another, special interest group. I am tired of every new plan restricting the access of citizens at large
626 in an effort to support their agendas. I have been going there since the 1960s.

627 Increasing educational content/signage throughout the park about biodiversity, importance of
628 protection, and impacts of risk behaviour can improve the sense of nature engagement. Recent signage
629 emphasizes brands and sponsors, which emphasizes private use.

630 Identify clear objectives. Decide if invasive species are an actual priority. Consider impact of drastic and
631 extremely rapid water level increases (June) on ecological integrity of the area.

632 Protection of the land - no bikes on pathways, no dogs, and please have ADEQUATE signage and
633 ENFORCEMENT from both north and south entrances. Education for those new to the area. Also
634 protection for the cliff swallows under the green bridge over the Elbow.

635 Encourage responsible dog ownership: leashed & on trails, off shorelines, dispose of waste.. There is a
636 link between the dog presence & biodiversity loss. Let's minimize that impact.

639 With the ring road cutting off habitat movement patterns, it would make sense to build some tunnels
640 for animals to pass from the native reserve back and forth into the park as they surely did before the
641 road was constructed?

642 It should be all about protection and education for nature and water which hopefully can still allow
643 people access. It is by seeing and feeling the beauty of nature that we can be motivated to value it.

644 "How can the Weaselhead area be managed to ensure positive outcomes for the future?

645 Keep people on the paved paths. Keep those pathways free from snow and ice at all times. Trim the
646 branches off the pathway. Provide garbage at the parking lots. Dogs on leash only."

647 More public education surrounding littering, feeding of wildlife and other disturbance of flora/fauna. If
648 education does not seem sufficient more bylaw presence is required. Education might include having
649 experts in the park talking to users about the biodiversity issues we need to be aware of.

650 Priority needs to be put onto education and enforcement of rules. Education to explain why these rules
651 are important (like dogs on leash and bikes on bike paths only), followed up by enforcement of the rules.
652 Continuing research needs to be supported as well. We have much to learn from this park.

653 Ensure there is no further development adjacent to this area and perhaps times of park closure when
654 animals are most active to avoid having to kill them.

655 Avoid additional developments, even for recreation, in this area such as the bike park or new trails. Limit
656 use of unauthorized trails and rehabilitate existing trails. Enforce on leash requirement for dogs.

657 Do not open anything it is a natural area! As soon as you touch it it is not natural!

658 Don't add any new picnic/recreation areas or pathways.

659 Ensure that the water coming into Weaselhead is clean, and free from trash, construction debris and
660 artificial turbidity.

661 Build animal crossings so animals can cross the ring road

662 The increased access by dogs I believe is a significant threat to wildlife that live in the weaselhead. Dog
663 owners consistently disappoint by letting their dogs off leash, swim in the water and defecate in the
664 weaselhead.

665 "Allow mountain biking on a few interesting trails to give that community some enjoyment, rather than
666 having to poach the trails during off-hours. Enforce no dogs in the areas that we are trying to keep more
667 natural. Dogs and wildlife interact in ways that cause too much stress on all the wildlife!"

668 Car access should be limited to actual parking spots. Currently North Glenmore park can be overrun with
669 cars parking everywhere and the resulting people, noise (including amplified music) and "camp" setups
670 trample biodiversity in every respect. Encourage non motorized access instead.

671 I believe education is the key. Please continue to educate people about how to treat our park, its plants,
672 and its animals.

673 Keep dogs on leash. Mark trails better.

674 Ensure that cyclists and dogs don't go into the areas where they are currently prohibited so as to protect
675 the environment. The non-paved paths have appropriate signs but it seems many, many people
676 disregard the signs.

677 Maybe you should proof read your page, and ensure proper grammar. I don't want to answer the
678 question because you are not Scientist.

679 Dogs must be banned from Weaselhead and Elbow Rr.Habitat destruction. Defiant dog owners break
680 the law 20 hours/day. Dog owners physically remove signage. Bylaw officers not present 99.9% time.
681 Fines SMALL. Owners SERIOUSLY threaten & intimidate the public who reports them. BIODIVERSITY
682 CRISIS YYC

- 1142 I hike and bike in this area.
- 1143 Walking biking boating
- 1144 Essentially for cycling on the trails
- 1145 We walk, cycle for recreation , commute to work by cycling, cross country ski, skate, play curling and
1146 crokicurl.
- 1147 Walking, Cycling and on a rare occasion Cross Country skiing
- 1148 Walk and bike. About every 2 weeks in winter but 2 to 3 times per week in summer.

- 1150 Walking on a daily basis primarily on the south and east sides.
- 1151 Usually walking my dog. Also xc skiing. Some biking. Kids have also used over the years - playground,
1152 tennis, walking dog, etc.

- 1178 I appreciate the pathway system so much and hope the maintenance & care of the pathways continue.
1179 Please don't change much.
- 1180 Walking on the paved and not paved paths
- 1181 Running on the trail system.
- 1182 Walking, running, biking on paved pathways, sitting by the river.

- 1184 Hike, paddle, bike, recreation
- 1185 I run through the area.
- 1186 I run the dirt pathways in the Weaselhead Flats protected area.
- 1187 Walk
- 1188 I live across from the reservoir, I walk there often. On the south side
- 1189 I love to walk through the Weaselhead area and photograph fauna/flora.
- 1190 Kayaking on the reservoir, walking, biking
- 1191 I use the walking pathways which have wonderful views and help me manage my arthritis.

- 1213 Walking and biking on pathways, walking in area by storm ponds/behind houses in Lakeview Village,
- 1214 cross-country skiing, disc golf (when it was allowed), occasionally tennis
- 1215 I live in Lakeview. I was born here in 1967. I walk, cross-country ski, skate, cycle, rollerblade, picnic. I
- 1216 use the park all the time. I can not imagine living anywhere else!
- 1217 I enjoy going there for walks and picnics, to connect with water, nature, the wildflowers, the birds and
- 1218 other wildlife. It is less enjoyable now than it used to be with all of the noise from the Ring Road
- 1219 I walk my dog or I go for walks on my own.
- 1220 Walking
- 1221 I regularly walk in North Glenmore Park. In the summer time I cycle around the entire area.

- 1222 I photograph biodiversity and submit to government. Particularly interested in NUMEROUS Sensitive,
1223 Endangered and Threatened Species at Risk in both Weaselhead/Glenmore area. Migratory bird feeding
1224 resting nesting activity. PLEASE SAVE BIODIVERSITY YYC!
- 1225 Biking, picnic, dog walks, walking, kids playing by river
- 1226 Walking, occasional use of bike and skating paths
- 1227 Walking, biking, kayaking and cross-country skiing.
- 1228 iNaturalist observations of nature; dog walking; cycling paths
- 1229 Walking with my dog, biking. Go on my own or with a small group of friends. Kayak up the river in
1230 summer
- 1231 Walk, jog, bike, paddle
- 1232 Walking on the trails and skiing in the winter.
- 1233 I walk my dog in South Glenmore Park and weaselhead 4 times per day all year round
- 1234 I basically go for walks mainly in south Glenmore Park, the Weaselhead and the Heritage Park area. My
1235 walks normally include my dog. I plan is to get a bike and ride and walk.
- 1236 Hiking and kayaking
- 1237 I walk the area regularly, especially with my dogs. Sometimes cycle in the summer, but I walk it every
1238 day, even in the winter.

1254 mental health.
- 1255 All of the above. The area is a primary focus for myself and family to mostly walk and cycle in the
1256 season, access nature/observe wildlife, and meet to socialize with friends.
- 1257 The solitude of nature.
- 1258 Just to visit for pictures
- 1259 Disc golf when it was there
- 1260 Wild trout
- 1261 Clothing optional beach access.
- 1262 All of the above
- 1263 All of the above! Well except for the "recreational activities" (rarely use)
- 1264 Mountain biking (non-paved), snowshowing, x-skiing
- 1265 I like the disc golf course
- 1266 I value the paths for both cycling and walking.
- 1267 Rec, nature and bike paths
- 1268 All of the above

- 1272 The area is home to beautiful plants and animals. I love that this is protected and accessible in Calgary.
- 1273 "curious about all forms of wildlife activity; exercise, meeting others, take part in advertised activities,
1274 Weaselhead Society member. Sharing and hearing of others share nature experiences via their walks at
1275 a weekly coffee session."
- 1276 It is very important to protect the natural habitat and ensure a healthy biodiversity in the area. The
1277 Weaselhead has many diverse ecosystems that provide valuable ecological goods and services to the
1278 area. The health of the environment must also consider the biological functions that require nightly
1279 darkness for their effective performance. Experiences in natural environments are critical to develop
1280 the future stewards of the land - you won't protect what you don't love.
- 1281 This area is only a 10 minute drive from my residence and gives me access (walking) to find birds and
1282 wild areas. So the wildlife is why I visit but walking is the means. Other such areas (Fish Creek Park,
1283 Carburn, Kananaskis, Banff and further) take longer to get to.
- 1284 also the wildlife, the walking paths, the river and the delta - all of this wonderful nature
- 1285 - The area is fantastic for birdwatching!

1286 The weaselhead is a hugely important place to our family because of how wild it is. We love getting out
1287 of the city and into the quiet. bird and animal watching, experiencing all seasons, being in a protected
1288 area where we can contemplate our place in the natural world, how it takes care of us and how we can
1289 take care of it.

1290 it's really about the walking paths that give me access to nature - both paved and not paved.

1291 As a City, we use the river, and created the Weaselhead/Glenmore area. It is where we can optimize,
1292 protect, and celebrate the natural biodiversity of the area. A healthy wildlife community is an indicator
1293 of good stewardship & needed contribution to biodiversity & a healthy waterway as we intensify the use
1294 of lands outside our river valleys. The land between the river & the pathway should be natural, a wildlife
1295 priority zone, & shouldn't be used for recreational purposes for the most part.

1296 The Weaselhead is a rugged and remote urban park unlike any other park in cities I have visited. The fact
1297 that there is a 1km walk just to access the flats make it feel wild and untamed. It's a place demands
1298 respect. It feels remote and keeps me feeling refreshed and pure.

1299 When people are respectful of the environment, the wildlife comes alive. There's something magical
1300 about seeing pelicans, herons, moose, and various other animals in this environment. If you are quiet
1301 and peaceful, they are too.

1302 We enjoy experiencing nature that feels away from the city but is easily accessible. Weaselhead had
1303 previously allowed us to feel at peace with nature even on Sunday afternoons. With the pandemic, it
1304 became overrun, making it more difficult to enjoy the serenity of nature. Excess litter, loud noise,
1305 disrespect towards nature has resulted in reduced animal numbers and discouraged us from going as
1306 often as we had for the over twenty years of frequenting the area.

1307 I enjoy cycling in there area and being in nature.

1308 Amazing to have access to such a beautiful natural area while living in urban area. Wonderful for
1309 exercise, connecting with nature, and stress relief.

1310 Could commute through other means, choose to commute through the park for nature access.

1311 This is what I use the most, however we usually cycle to a playground or picknick area

1312 We have used NGP and the Weaselhead for over 40 years; kayaking, picnics in the park, watching
1313 beavers and birds in the weaselhead and splashing at the waters edge near the bridge and have coyotes,
1314 moose wander in the park is magic. So in reality I would have checked off nature, wildlife and pathways
1315 because of how we view and see this area as a 'quiet' exploration where we are the visitors and are
1316 invited into nature.

1317 It's important we prioritize that this is natural habitat first. Keep it as natural as possible as it is a
1318 privilege for us to enjoy it.

1319 Weaselhead / Glenmore area is a great spot to observe birds and other wildlife year round and it is my
1320 motivation to get out more often. I have several parks near where I live, but a walk in Weaselhead just
1321 has so much more to offer and that is why, i don't mind driving out to the location regularly and enjoy
1322 the trails out here.

1323 This is a hard question. I value all of the above, but without the natural environment there would be no
1324 wildlife, and it would just be a recreation area in an urban neighbourhood close to major highways.
1325 Please, if you take anything away from the citizen input you receive, I hope you realize how truly
1326 valuable and irreplaceable and unique this area is. 30 years ago there was talk of a ring road, and I am
1327 EXTREMELY GRATEFUL the road did not extend along the off leash park as originally planned.

1328 Being able to walk and destress in wilderness. Better than therapy!!

1329 The surprising pockets of wildness are great. The number of unused mowed grass areas should be
1330 reduced to promote natural grassland environments

1331 We go to Glenmore to get away from people and the cars

1332 We want to get away from the city. No cars. No idling. No speeders

1333 Specifically recreation in an area that is natural. I like that there are rules that no dogs are allowed on
1334 the trails although these rules are not respected.

1335 It is important to me to have natural areas in my city. It is great for fostering a love of wild places with
1336 my children. It's also a great area to see migratory birds and other wildlife.

1337 It is an area with abundant biodiversity that is becoming harder to find within a city.

1338 It would be wonderful to connect the weaslehead to Griffith Woods so we could have green corridors
1339 and easily bike from one park to another. With all the highways, right now I need to drive to get to
1340 weaslehead

1341 Amazing to be close to so much nature in the city

1342 Very easy access to nature and a beautiful large body of water

1343 The area is a wild area close to Calgary that we can enjoy seeing the native flora and fauna.

1344 I enjoy all of the above things but it really is lovely to have access to nature within walking distance from
1345 my house. I have seen moose, deer, bobcats, coyotes, beavers, muskrats and a huge variety of birds in
1346 the park. It helps me relieve the stresses of my day.

1347 My mental health benefits greatly from being in nature.

1348 Seeing a diversity of healthy, thriving animals is amazing to see. They're fun and exciting to watch and
1349 it's nice to know that they have a safe home here.

1350 There should be more than one option. The pathway is a great feature to loop around the reservoir, but
1351 the natural environment is equally important.

1352 Having such a resource within city limits is incredible. Walking in the Weaselhead is our go to to clear
1353 our heads, and move our bodies.

1354 Part of what makes the weaselhead area so unique is the large area of nature within city limit, which
1355 supports native species and biodiversity.

1356 Fresh air, nice views, community, trees and water all enjoyed from my non-electric pedal bike.

1357 Well maintained paths in a natural setting

1358 Like to include the wildlife and walking paths. It gives the feeling of being out of the City.

1359 There aren't many areas within the City with intact ecosystems and easy access to nature and the
1360 wildlife that lives or frequents the area.

1361 Walking paths are critical to access nature and hear wildlife though cyclers are too fast and there are not
1362 enough garbage cans for the junk that people leave behind like cans, bottles, wrappers, candy packaging
1363 and even Tim Horton and McDonald cups, straws, napkins, etc. People also do not respect nature by
1364 feeding them bread, crackers, etc. human food is not food for them.

1365 We need to preserve the existing green spaces in Calgary. I enjoy connecting to nature as it helps with
1366 my physical and mental health.

1367 I actually value the access to nature, the wildlife and the walking paths. I love the fact we have a park
1368 like this that is accessible for me to get our in nature, walk and be able to see wildlife.

1369 Don't restrict public use

1370 There is no reason to go there that is more important than to be out in nature and to hear the songs of
1371 the birds, and to see birds and wildlife. Lots of other areas are available to ride bikes, walk dogs, race
1372 electric toy cars, etc. Keep Weaselhead natural. Keep the huge groups of school kids to a minimum.
1373 They are so unbelievably loud and scare away people and wildlife. The ruin a visit to the Weaselhead -
1374 you can hear them from more than a mile away.

1375 The primary reason I visit is to experience undisturbed natural parklands and to see wildlife such as
1376 birds, deer and beavers. It is quiet and free of cars. The secondary reason is for recreation near nature.

1377 Animals are cooler than people.

1378 It is amazing to have access to this beautiful area without leaving the city.

1379 I value the natural area. Unfortunately the ring road has already interfered with that aspect of the park.
1380 It should be kept in a natural state without intensive use to protect the wetlands and the biodiversity of
1381 the wildlife.

1382 The cycle paths are a great asset. There aren't many places you can bike without worrying about cars or
1383 pedestrians. It would be nice if the separated bike paths covered more of the loop.

1384 Trails in the weaselhead and South Glenmore

1385 More than one good answer. Being so close to nature and letting nature do it's thing

1386 It feels like you outside the noisy, chaotic city.

1387 a spin around the lake is great exercise in a beautiful and refreshing area.

1388 The walking paths to walk my dogs.

1389 There are very few water bodies within the city of Calgary large enough for a 2-3 hour paddle outing.
1390 Between the reservoir and the river, there is great places to paddle as well as see wildlife.

1391 Love to walk on paths in the park area

1392 It's wonderful to step into the countryside inside the city. I hope that changes aren't made to the park
1393 and that the only maintenance is of the walkways. they could cut the hours by an hour in the morning
1394 and an hour at night. 6-10 instead of 5-11 giving wildlife 2 more hours. Let's not overanalyze and create
1395 a costly make-work project out of something that is already operating effectively.

1396 Just having a calm, beautiful area of fresh air and natural surroundings is a great antidote to life's stress

1397 It's a peaceful, serene area and a nice escape from the bustle of the city. It's just not planned very well,
1398 so I find people make their own fun, because of the distinct lack of pathways, river access, off-leash
1399 areas and other recreational facilities. Compare Fish Creek park to Weaselhead...it's much more
1400 accessible and with a wider range of things to do, yet it isn't falling into decay.

1401 I love the pathway system through Weaselhead. Great for hiking and running off of tarmac

1402 I go to the Weaselhead for the piece of nature in the city - to find quiet and animals, rivers and trees.
1403 This is what makes it desirable. I like to recreate there but mainly because it is peaceful, unlike other
1404 parks in the city

1405 Access to nature allows me to bird watch, find plants and animals that aren't human introduced, to
1406 escape the human built environment.

1407 "Walking mostly

1408 Also bike paths, nature and kids playgrounds with grandchildren"

1409 I love riding in The weaselhead. It doesn't take too long to get there and if I go early I have lots of room
1410 to park my rig. The people love seeing the horses and the kids and parents love to come pet them. It
1411 makes me feel like I am riding in Central Park in New York. I love having this available to equestrians.

1412 There are very few equestrian trails in the City of Calgary. Weaselhead and Griffith's Woods are two and
1413 they are critical for urban horse riders. They maintain history of use, they have loyal users and they
1414 keep an awareness of this use for other users. This use is entirely compatible with biodiversity and is a
1415 quiet and natural way to enjoy the park. Equestrian use support in the park has been badly neglected in
1416 the last decade, with bridges unrepaired & poor signage/understanding,.

1417 I love walking in nature. I don't always have the opportunity to go hiking in K county, Weaselhead is the
1418 next best thing.

1419 Sensitive wildlife areas should have a priority on wildlife not human usage.

1420 The bike path is one of the few safe places in the area to ride your bike

1421 Appreciate being able to visit a more-or-less natural environment for a few hours without having to
1422 travel well out of the city.

1423 Access to nature includes wildlife viewing. Just nice to get out and enjoy walking in the park. I do not
1424 actually like the bike traffic on the walking paths.

1425 The area is a critical protection for habitat for wildlife and people.

1426 I usually park at South Glenmore Park and wander down to the Weaselhead from there. I take
1427 binoculars so I can better see birds and wildlife. Sometimes I don't see anything but trees, water, shrubs,
1428 but that is also a treat. I avoid weekends as it is often just too crowded then.

1429 it is a wonderful area for me to walk, as I have to use a cane,, only problem is bike riders who think the
1430 path is for them, only them and it should be a race course..

1431 Main activity is bird watching

1432 The undeveloped nature of this area is the attraction. People need a place to wander among the trees,
1433 see animal footprints, listen to birds, etc., away from pavement, concrete and houses. It is restorative
1434 to people in many ways to do this.

1435 I look for diverse wildlife in the region.

1436 I use the walking paths the most.

1437 Used for enriching life, a break from routine chores, "lifting the spirit." Using the trails, one encounters
1438 wildlife, observing all nature's diversity.

1439 It's an almost wild area (worse now with noisy bypass) full of trees and wildlife. Feeds my soul

1440 This is an island of nature in the midst of a busy city, a place for varied species to live more naturally and
1441 that includes both flora and fauna. Keeping it less developed would allow for a more natural experience.

1442 Access to nature, uncrowded peaceful, natural and undeveloped, quiet, -these are why I go

1443 I like biking in the area and would like to see more cycle paths. The path however is crowded in its
1444 attempt to accommodate both pedestrian and cyclists...twinning the path would be ideal.

1445 The greenery, the birds, the views and air are what attract me. Being able to cycle and walk through are
1446 bonuses.

1447 I go to the Weaselhead/Glenmore area to hear the birds, smell the woods, do nature photography and
1448 just relax. Being able to access that 5 minutes from home and not having to drive an hour or more (e.g.
1449 K-country) makes it convenient and means I do it much more often.

1450 I'd like to be able to choose both the "Access to nature" and the "paths" options but since only one is
1451 possible, it is the access to nature. There are other paths in the city, but none where you feel like you
1452 are not in the city! The paths make the access possible. The path is great, especially the newer section
1453 behind the golf course.

1454 Great spot to ride bike and kayak, feels like you've left the city

1455 This is an accessible natural area with well defined paths. It needs to continue to be a natural area, and
1456 people need to stay on the paths to help protect plants and wildlife.

1457 We need a quiet place to go to enjoy nature with out being g interputted by barking dogs, mountain
1458 bikers.

1459 I walk there to get away from the noise but I'm dismayed at all the dog poop and garbage in the area.
1460 It's also too congested and the cyclists are aggressive and will go at break neck speed even at blind

1461 corners. Also in the parts where there's no dogs or bikes allowed, they're on those dirt paths. Bikes
1462 create ruts in the dirt and dogs aren't on a leash pooping everywhere.

1463 We come here to feel like we're not in the crowded city, to relax in an open space, to look for wild life
1464 and to breathe clean air. (Note: wildlife definitely doesn't include dogs and the abundant number of
1465 owners that fail to pick up after their pooches).

1466 I like the variety of pathways through wooded areas. As I age I appreciate the mental/physical
1467 importance of walking on uneven ground. I appreciate the critter encounters, especially the ravens. I
1468 appreciate that there are many users of the park and the park folks do a commendable job facilitating a
1469 great public space that Jane would be proud of.

1470 It is nice to have a natural environment semi-wild park close to home where I can enjoy quiet walks and
1471 watch animals go about their daily lives.

1472 I use the designated walking paths at various locations. My walks with my dog usually take 2 hours.

1473 Excellent trails and pathways that provide an immersive and diverse set of experiences. I love seeing
1474 views of the Rocky Mountains at Sunset and sweeping views of open water. Also walking into the forest
1475 at Weaselhead is fun because you always see wildlife. I feel safe because it is a well used park.

1476 having a natural environment within central Calgary is key - do not pave anymore areas - riverpark is a
1477 classic issue with all the pavement

1478 The paths are pretty good for walking but would like to see more SEPERATION of walkers & bikes

1479 It's nice to be in nature while getting excessive and fresh air

1480 Access to nature is a close second, but for me the wildlife, particularly within a city, is most important.
1481 The area provides a buffer from the bustling city to wild spaces. It's the litmus test to human/wildlife
1482 coexistence . If we get it right here, we can get it right anywhere!

1483 Not sure why I can't have multiple answers. Generally it's the pathways that get me into nature and
1484 opportunities to observe nature including wildlife. Wonderful paths in winter to get out and have
1485 solitude.

1486 I grew up in Lakeview and have spent my life admiring the trees and views in the park and beyond to the
1487 mountains in the west.

1488 It's a nice piece of wilderness easily accessible within the City! It's not nearly as peaceful as it used to
1489 be .. so much traffic noise now 😞

1490 I like the walking paths because they are kept cleared all year, but I go specifically to North Glenmore
1491 Park and the Weaselhead because of the peace, quiet, nature, all making you feel like you are out of the
1492 city

1493 Natural area is diverse, extensive and full of birds and wildlife, even moose, lunch, bear occasionally.
1494 Wetlands and reservoir key waterfowl migration area. Its close by and accessible and you can feel like
1495 you are out in nature, not in the city (except ring road noise now intrudes). Its beautiful from Glenmore

1496 Park trails looking west over Weaselhead to mountains. A natural escape within the city. Wildlife,
1497 natural habitat and access to nature all are key to me, and no bikes allowed

1498 "Love walking and biking around the res. Love walking in weasel head Love the music park at north
1499 glwnmore"

1500 Values ... all of the above make this a great destination for anyone. Impossible to rank what matters
1501 most as I have used this park all of my life in all of its capacities

1502 A very scenic route

1503 I come to Weaselhead to observe urban wildlife within the park. It is a nice way to disconnect from the
1504 hustle and bustle of city life

1505

1506

1507 Love having a place in the city where I can wander in a semi-natural landscape. Amazed at how alive it
1508 is with birds, insects and bugs....and always the possibility of seeing something bigger. Find the
1509 opportunity to watch beavers at work and see how quickly they can change the habitat around them
1510 especially fascinating.

1511 Weaselhead is Calgary's 20+ year clothing-optional recreation area. Lots of people understand that
1512 others can be offended at nudity, and Weaselhead is a nice out of the way location that we can enjoy
1513 our time at without worrying about offending other people.

1514 As a resident of Lakeview, the park and park area are a large part of our lives. It would be great to
1515 manage the new traffic noise from the freeway somehow but this has been a large part of our everyday
1516 life for many years. We feel very lucky to have it and hope to be able to keep it as is for many years to
1517 come! Our children have purchased homes in the area and made this decision based on the park as one
1518 of the aspects to be here.

1519 More and more communities are losing nature habitat especially migration corridors. Calgary is known
1520 for inner city wildlife and would like to keep it this way.

1521 I am an avid birder and the area has habitat that supports numerous species and abundance of
1522 residents, nesters, and migrants.

1523 Cycling the reservoir is a great way to safely enjoy bicycles with kids - away from motor vehicles. The
1524 quick access to nature and beautiful views are also highlights of the cycle paths.

1525 I dont want to see more development of trails or any more artificial man-made structures. I would like
1526 to see it remain more untouched.

1527 Walk the pathway every day

1528 Access to nature without leaving my neighborhood

1529 The access to nature by pathways is what I value

1530 I like the pathways and trees. I especially like the pathways in the trees

1531 Seeing the yachts in the water. Would love to see a restaurant on the water.

1532 The Weaselhead/Glenmore area is a great way to connect with nature while hiking or biking. The area is
1533 incredibly unique to me due to the fact that it sits on the delta that feeds into the Reservoir. I find it
1534 really engaging while walking around the waterways and streams, knowing that the water I pass will
1535 eventually arrive at the Reservoir and will be distributed across the city in the form of our drinking
1536 water.

1537 The paths allow access to nature in a peaceful, tranquil and as yet, largely unspoiled area. However, the
1538 park is in danger of overuse and must be managed carefully through proper stewardship. This would
1539 include restricting dogs to on leash and avoiding any further unnecessary development including
1540 erecting structures.

1541 Being in nature within the city is wonderful.

1542 It is amazing and unique to see so many different animals live there.

1543 The weaslehead area is a beautiful natural area within our city. It's important to have access to spaces
1544 like this as I feel much more relaxed walking here or in Fish Creek Park than I do when walking
1545 residential streets.

1546 I use the weaslehead in off-peak times. Paddling is very soothing.

1547 I live in the community of Haysboro. Glenmore / Weaselhead provides a great and close option to run
1548 trails. I also take my kids to see beavers in the backwaters, to the Elbow river, or canoe into the
1549 Weaselhead from the canoe club.

1550 Fast way to reach different beautiful locations.

1551 I value all of the above and the answer I chose seems the most general.

1552 As urban sprawl continues in Calgary and pushes wildlife out, this area is precious to see the remaining
1553 wildlife we need to keep. If we can't see wildlife in its natural habitat, it's difficult for a population to
1554 understand the beauty and need to preserve the habitat. wildlife are important from something as
1555 simple as birds eating mosquitoes, which is helpful to humans. encouraging a habitat where humans and
1556 wildlife can co-exist is necessary in urban planning

1557 I like walking the paths because it is good exercise and calming to be in nature

1558 I wish I could answer more than just access to nature - it is the ability to walk (respectfully) amidst
1559 nature.

1560 Its a beautiful chunk of nature in the city. There are some rare plants there and abundant wildlife.

1561 I primarily use the walking paths and love the access to nature. In the summer I bike a lot.

1562 The natural areas in Weaselhead give me a great opportunity for stress relief, a good place to get away
1563 from the noise of the city and recharge the brain cells.

1564 "Member of Calgary canoe club. After canoeing I often go for walk or stop to eat lunch. About 25 years
1565 ago would go on trail rides with my horse. Also a great place for dog walking."

1566 Go there for peace and solitude when I can't go to mountains. Go in evening when less busy. Important
1567 for my mental health. Go with my dog for safety and he cleans up human waste off the trails

1568 The Weaselhead/Glenmore is a place that feels wild even though it is in the city. It is an important
1569 corridor for animals.

1570 By going into North or South Glenmore Parks and then moving into the Weaselhead, I can get the sense
1571 that I am away from the city and all its stressors. "Forest Bathing".

1572 I think there's no where closer to me that provides such expansive and immersive access to nature. This
1573 is something I truly value. I like how many trails there are to explore and always something new to
1574 discover.

1575 It's still possible here to be part of an ecosystem bigger than me. I can (almost) meld into my
1576 surroundings.

1577 I love to cycle to and in Weaselhead because of the access to nature. I value the accessibility for those
1578 with less mobility than myself.

1579 Enjoying the trees and birds.

1580 I cycle around the reservoir several times per week. It also serves as a connector to Fish Creek and Elbow
1581 pathways.

1582 While I ride my bike here, I choose to come here because of the great path that takes me close to
1583 nature. If the path existed without the nature, I would like ride somewhere else.

1584 I have been cycling to and through Glenmore and weaselhead parks for over 20 years. I love the chance
1585 to view the beautiful landscape, the deer, the birds and all the humans enjoying the park. It's pretty easy
1586 to ride to from my Sunalta home. I wish for a separate bike path wherever possible. there are many
1587 more visitors now. I'm currently vacationing in Tucson. Pedestrians and cyclists coexist very well on the
1588 wide pathways here.

1589 Nature is so incredibly beneficial for our mental health and our appreciation of the earth. It can be hard
1590 to find time to head to the mountains, but weasel head is easily accessible and a beautiful space to find
1591 some quiet and connect with nature.

1592 I love the wide cycle paths amongst the huge trees. Sometimes you overtake someone and turn a corner
1593 and it feels like you're in the middle of nowhere. Love how the type of trees and vegetation changes
1594 throughout the loop.

1595 I do not live close enough and there is other more accessible parts of the park from other areas.

1596 I love wildlife, seeing it makes me feel some peace when things are rough & it reminds me that people
1597 do care about animals!

1598 Getting to see the animals out and about as well as its ecological importance.

1599 I love that I can walk or run for an entire 15k around a pathway that doesn't cross any major roads and
1600 has beautiful views the entire time. Have been walking and running the Glenmore Reservoir myself and
1601 with my kids for over 50 years. The recent addition of the winter skating is magnificent.

1602 I go there to do birding as the bird diversity is good. The walking thru the woods and along the river and
1603 oxbows is a nice escape from the city life.

1604 I feel that nature protection needs to be given a higher priority.

1605 I enjoy it for walking, but love that it is a natural/wild area in the city.

1606 There is a variety of landscapes and species seen in only a few other city parks.

1607 Walking paths are wonderful this park is an escape from city life you can breathe here

1608 Both access to nature and wildlife.

1609 I walk in the area frequently for fitness but also stress management. Easy access to nature and wildlife
1610 is relaxing and energizing especially when living in an apartment complex set amidst a bustling urban
1611 setting. I have taken up bird watching as a hobby.

1612 This area is a goldmine in the inner city. So peaceful (most times). A real gem.

1613 Like to be able to watch the birds and other wildlife in the park and photograph them

1614 All are valuable but the ability to enjoy a natural environment that seems remote from the city is hugely
1615 beneficial to the health and mental wellbeing of those of us who enjoy the area.

1616 There are only a few spots in the city which allow access to so much diversity. I love this area because it
1617 truly feels wild and offers different landscapes throughout. The incline and decline offers a great
1618 workout and lookout. Although man-made the reservoir adds to the natural feel of the environment.
1619 The air feels clean and refreshing. I also like that the area is allowed to be somewhat wild with minimal
1620 disturbance in some areas - for the wildlife to enjoy.

1621 Being able to feel like you are out in nature while only being a few kms from home is incredibly good for
1622 our mental health and feels properly Canadian. The walking paths make it very accessible which is why
1623 it was hard to choose between the two.

1624 We most enjoy walking the pathways to explore nature and to see what's going on in the park.

1625 "Hard as you can only pick one option But living near the area we use the area for walking, access to
1626 nature , biking, kids use pump track and water park, use the north glenmore park for leisure - picnics
1627 and hang out with friends - park area- it's why we moved to oakridge to be within walking and biking to
1628 be in the trees and near water -"

1629 once in the weaselhead flats it is quiet and the noise of the city disappears.

1630 I ride the asphalt pathways daily. It would be nice to have some dirt trails for riding. I enjoy nature and
1631 love riding through the area.

1632 Weaselled is natural area within the city and it is so refreshing to walk into the woods and see deer,
1633 coyote and the odd moose.

1634 I like to walk along pathways (paved or unpaved) enjoying the environment. Not too keen on all the bike
1635 traffic (especially those that don't obey rules, etc). Walking paths shouldn't be used by bikes.

1636 Used disc golf course when it was there

1637 we go walking pretty well everyday! the access to nature and wildlife and the reservoir beauty is what
1638 draws us

1639 To be clear, the walking paths by/in nature. so beautiful and peaceful.

1640 Being able to go to a park that offers a place for recreational activities great but also having this space in
1641 the city to feel like you are in a nearly totally natural area is a huge boon for my mental health.

1642 I do love the nature that the park provides its an oasis in an urban environment but the walk in the
1643 paths is great exercise. It would be great if there was public transit access to the park directly perhaps to
1644 the weaselhead parking area. There was a bus route through lake view but if you live in the NW it's not
1645 practical.

1646 Being in nature is relaxing, refreshing, humbling and inspiring.

1647 a great place to walk, year round, Kayak in the summer, seeing nature which includes seeing wildlife
1648 doing photography. from what i have noticed seeing 6 or 7 coyotes at once, there are probably more,
1649 the few moose who come and go, plenty of deer. abundance of water foul before the water gets too
1650 high, or freezes.

1651 We love seeing moose, deer, coyotes, owls, eagles, woodpeckers, ducks, trumpeter swans and lots of
1652 other wildlife.

1653 Connecting with nature and wildlife is my primary way of maintaining my mental health. However, I am
1654 feeling less and less safe walking in the Weaselhead due to aggressive cyclists barrelling through the
1655 side-trails and large off leash dogs. If I speak up and express that this is against the bylaws and is making
1656 me feeling unsafe, I am being laughed at and verbally assaulted. I have repeatedly reported the issue,
1657 but the city is not doing anything about it.

1658 I enjoy viewing the flora and fauna on the pathways that are not used by cyclists and where dogs must
1659 be leashed.

1660 "I seek out opportunities to walk on uneven ground for mental and physical health benefits. I enjoy that
1661 there are critters in the area. For myself it is especially
1662 the presence of ravens that I am drawn to."

1663 I use recreational means such as cycling or walking to access nature

1664 Great place to restore after a busy day in the city. Truly a gem to be treasured!

1665 This is a very special ecosystem. Birds, plants, reptiles, amphibians, insects and wildlife are supposed to
1666 be prioritized. Please keep it safe. No off-leash dogs, no dogs at all on certain trails, cyclists on paved
1667 paths only.

1668 We're very lucky to have such a large and relatively "wild" natural area right in the city. It's great to be
1669 able to walk around, enjoy the trees and water, and encounter birds, beavers, coyotes, deer, moose and
1670 the occasional (gulp) bear. I enjoy the recreational opportunities, but that's a distant second to just

1671 being able to have some quiet outdoor space, and to protect a bit of habitat for the creatures who live
1672 here.

1673 I would want to say "access to nature" or "the wildlife", but the reality is I just wouldn't access the park
1674 much in the first place without a bike, and I need the bike paths as connectors in order to reach
1675 destinations outside of the park space, which I couldn't easily reach on bike if they weren't there.

1676 Dog free recreation in a natural environment.

1677 The quiet of nature so close to the City.

1678 The large green space

1679 The wildlife here is unbelievable and worthy of protection. While it's wonderful to have plentiful
1680 recreation in this area, that should never threaten wildlife. At this point in history I believe all natural
1681 areas must be conserved and cared for like the civic, provincial, national, and global treasure they are.

1682 kayaking opportunity

1683 I love the walking paths all year long, which then brings me closer to nature and the wildlife.

1684 As the city grows the park provides an escape from the hustle just beyond its boundaries.

1685 I really enjoy walking in the park with my kids. It would be amazing if there were separate cycling paths.
1686 I have young kids and it's a bit scary getting approached quickly by cyclists.

1687

1688 I appreciate the closeness of Nature and any encounters with birds, wildlife within the city, the closest
1689 best thing for me than other than being in the mtn's. Nose Hill is also special to me since I grew up in
1690 Brentwood. I make good use of the pathways and walking trails in the weasel head area. I feel lucky to
1691 live so close.

1692 Weaselhead is arguably the most biodiverse place in Alberta. It should be protected approximately. The
1693 high use of humans and previously pristine nature of the park makes it one of the most important
1694 environmental places in the province. The allowance of the ring road is embarrassing and shows a
1695 weakness in the cities environmental and social evaluation for projects.

1696 Humans need to be in nature as much as possible and helps ground me.

1697 Coyotes, beavers, bears, deer and moose.

1698 Love the access to nature, right in the almost middle of the city, need to keep protection on this area
1699 from development for future generations.

1700 I bike during the day hours and sometimes late evenings. I also enjoy walking/hiking and kayaking in the
1701 area but, mostly biking around the entire reservoir

1702 It's lovely to be able to wander around in the woods (on a trail) or by the water.

1703 Paradise in the middle of the city with a beautiful reservoir

1704 Time spent in nature is important, nature heals, and Weaselhead is accessible. Sadly it feels less like
1705 nature since ring road built

1706 "My favorite memories were from childhood, before the floods there was the gloating bridge I loved
1707 going there to find frogs and tadpoles. As adults my sister and both had super small wedding ceremony
1708 over looking the reservoir. We have attended baby showers there, and go for walks and sometimes bike
1709 rides there."

1710 I live in close proximity (>500m) and this is what drew us to the area. We use the paved and unpaved
1711 pathway systems year round for a variety of uses.

1712 My husband & I just enjoy being out & about on the trails, in the woods & nature.

1713 Walking along the elbow river off the bicycle path

1714 It's a nice place to walk. It's close to where I live and I love the fresh air.

1715 I value both recreational activities like disc golf (RIP) as well as the cycle and walking paths.
1716

1717 The diverse flora and avian fauna is precious. And threatened by overuse of the park.

1718 The weasel head area allows me to run in nature, Away from a main road and cars. Usually it's pretty
1719 quite, especially in winter.

1720 The area is heavily trafficked and doesn't leave breathing room to wildlife.

1721 I am a regular runner. I find the Weaselhead area a great place to have a variety of running experiences.

1722 Before the ring road was constructed the Weaselhead felt like you had left the city completely and was
1723 an amazing place to reconnect with nature. Since covid and construction of the ring road sadly increased
1724 use and traffic in the area has taken a toll. With more users there needs to be better management of
1725 trails, signage, garbage, etc. The area is still beautiful but with the freeway nearby and more users, the
1726 sense of being in nature has been degraded as its hard to even hear the birds sing.

1727 The area is great for physical activity away from cars and traffic and is a great wildlife area.

1728 It's nice to escape the city life and be in a predominantly natural park. I'm not fond of permanent
1729 fixtures, constructed destinations, and specialty use developments such as frisbee golf courses, paths,
1730 picnic tables etc - I prefer a natural environment that is optional in its use.

1731 It's a natural area long the river with a lot of different wild life. It could be kept this way.

1732 It is very important that we maintain the area and do not develop it...

1733 Weaselhead area has amazing diversity of habitats in a small space - boreal forest, aspen parkland,
1734 wetland, douglas fir plus wonderful views of the reservoir and mountains. Birds and mammals are a big
1735 draw to visit this area. A natural, peaceful respite from the city.

1736 I use it equally walking and biking. Recently I have been using it more in the summer to commute from
1737 Oakridge to mission. Without this cycle path I would not commute as the roads along elbow etc are too
1738 dangerous.

1739 Walking in nature so a couple of the above

1740 I have seen a wide variety of wildlife including bluebirds. Also there are some beautiful flowers to be
1741 seen

1742 In addition to the cycle paths we use at least 2 times/week in spring, summer and fall, my husband and I
1743 also regularly enjoy the walking paths and access to nature.

1744 I appreciate that there's separation for run and walk paths

1745 We need to stop the killing of our wild trout , by removing all gas powered engines on the reservoir. And
1746 not allow the use of bait and treble hooks. Its a easy one to protect that costs 0 dollars.

1747 Nature needs to be protected

1748 The Weaslehead is my favourite natural area. The smallest, unpaved trails are great because they are in
1749 real, intact wildlife habitat. There has been more pressure on wildlife since the flood when one big loop
1750 of dirt pathway was widened, and the pandemic when more people came down there, and also since
1751 the ring road which changed some wildlife patterns. Having just one paved path as a throughway for
1752 most people keeps the pressure off the small, single-track walking trails in the natural spaces.

1753 It's a great oasis away from typical city sights. Great for people who may not be able to get away outside
1754 of the city and can help prevent nature deficit disorder. We could benefit from keeping more areas like
1755 this!

1756 While I love doing recreational activities in the Weaselhead/Glenmore area, it is the natural beauty that
1757 makes it extremely special.

1758 It was a hard choice between The wildlife and Access to nature options. I like both as a way to lower
1759 stress levels while I ride my bike around the reservoir. It currently is a very quiet and calming
1760 environment.

1761 I have seen wildlife in the Weaselhead that I have not observed in other parts of the city.

1762 It is critical to have areas within the City where people can recreate, enjoy the outdoors without having
1763 to get in a car and leave town. Encourage more use and diverse activities do not restrict and limit them.

1764 Access to nature blends the answers of the wildlife and walking paths for me. I primarily use the park to
1765 get a pleasant view while being not so in the city while walking or relaxing. Also there is a noticeable
1766 amount of variety in the wildlife you can see year round in the park areas.

1767 The nature I find in weaselhead is amazing. Beavers, muskrats, herons, ducks, fish, deers, moose, bears. I
1768 absolutely love going there to see a little bit of wildlife so close to where I live and would love to take my
1769 future children there one day!

1770 Not enough nude beach/clothing optional beaches in Alberta. This is a great convenient area to catch
1771 some sun.

1772 It's a one stop shop for all of the above activities

1773 It's honestly difficult to pick a top one. My husband and kids cycle here often. I love seeing the wildlife
1774 when I go walking. One of the reasons we live where we do is that it's easy to access North Glenmore
1775 Park, which is a real gem in the middle of the city. The playgrounds and recreational activities are also
1776 great additions.

1777 YYC is a city. Cities are for people. Wslhd is not a provincial or national park. I have been recreating in
1778 Wslhd for 50+ years, all 4 seasons. I see more wildlife NOW than at any time in the past. Including
1779 bear, moose, coyote, cougar, snakes, frogs and many bird species. Biodiversity is not an issue. I DONOT
1780 support reducing access in any form including closing under used trails. or banning any user group.
1781 People need space to recreate in the city. The ecosystem is fine.

1782 I have been riding the park off-road trails since the 90s and am sad to see a reduction in "multi-use"
1783 trails and would like to see more opportunities for mtb to return to the park. Riders are some of the
1784 greatest land conservationists as we are all there for the same reason. To enjoy and preserve for future
1785 generations.

1786 we need and we have to protect the few natural areas in the city that we still have. The city needs more
1787 green areas, more trees and recover all green space we have protecting with the aid of the native or first
1788 nations people because they are the ones who have the knowledge

1789 I value the biodiversity in the Weaselhead and strongly believe in its inherent value as habitat. It is a
1790 critical piece of Calgary's biodiversity and an important asset in the fight against climate change.

1791 I moved to Calgary from the uk 4 years ago and was absolutely amazed that a park like this existed in the
1792 middle of a City. It is just incredible seeing all the wildlife and birds thriving here amongst the hustle and
1793 bustle of city life. It's an incredible space to just have calm and quiet from the chaos of city life. To know
1794 that moose, bobcats, coyotes, cougars etc roam here blows my mind. It's my favourite spot in the city.
1795 Please address the homeless camps though, its so damaging to wildlife

1796 A tie between access to nature, the wildlife and recreational activities. A serene place to sit at a picnic
1797 table with a small group of friends and enjoy the peaceful beauty of nature and wildlife.

1798 It is one of the most biodiverse areas in the city with great opportunities to see a variety of wildlife. That
1799 does get threatened by people going off main trails, having dogs off leash and developments cutting off
1800 habitat connectivity

1801 It is a great place to escape the traffic, noise and smell of the city. Can experience a natural landscape,
1802 plants animals and aquatic environments without the long and expensive trip to the mountain parks.

1803 It is the perfect "yin" to the yang of living in a large urban centre.

1804 My mental and physical health is improved by walking and cross country skiing in the natural
1805 surroundings. The opportunity to view wildlife and birds, the river and the wide variety of flowers and
1806 plants is very important to manage stress. It makes me proud that the City of Calgary is protecting the
1807 area with stewardship considering the long term importance of our connection to nature. So rec
1808 activities, wildlife and walking paths are as important as access to nature.

1809 I like walking in the "wild" inside the city.

1810 Allowing mountain biking offroad would alleviate bike traffic from the normal pathway, and would allow
1811 for better access for measurement of biodiversity

1812 I love walking thru the area and being immersed in nature, spotting wildlife.

1813 Weaselhead provides an escape from traffic and traffic noise and urban hardscapes.

1814 We find the ability to enjoy the peacefulness of the surroundings and nature is refreshing

1815 I like the ability to explore a nature park with only minimal human influence.

1816 Respite from the city: enjoying the wild flora and fauna

1817 Nice to have a reasonably quiet, undisturbed area so close to our urban centres for recreation and quick
1818 bike rides/trail runs without having to drive out to the mountains/foothills

1819

1820 The length of the bike path loop around the reservoir is perfect for me. I also enjoy walking through the
1821 area but biking happens more often.

1822 This area is one of the few places in the city where you can feel like you are in the Kananaskis area

1823 I like to immerse myself in natural surroundings as often as possible. To that end, I and my family have
1824 taken up bird and nature watching, hiking, cross-country skiing and cycling. Now that I am 81, going for
1825 modest bird-watching walks is the only one of those activities that I have left.

1826 It is a place Calgarians can come to disconnect from the city without having to leave the city limits. The
1827 wildlife is what makes me feel like I've lost connection - hearing the wind through the trees, the flow of
1828 the river, listening to the various bird species and seeing evidence of mammals are why I come.

1829 A pleasure to ride through.

1830 I actually enjoy more than one aspect. While the wildlife is truly enjoyable and should be protected all
1831 activities listed are appreciated

1832 It's a beautiful place to walk year-round, but that's because of the access to nature and wildlife. The
1833 recreational activities are great, from the tennis courts and playgrounds to the winter skating path. Bring
1834 back disc golf!

1835 It seems that "The Wildlife," "Access to Nature," and walking paths are all one and the same. By having
1836 pathways that allow one to enjoy nature and the wildlife without destroying the area its a huge win for
1837 both people and animals.

1838 I use the park for bird watching. And would like to keep the area undeveloped. I like it as it is

1839 Walking/running paths safer than biking path (speed) and allow you to enjoy nature and surroundings
1840 more. Cycle path could be more on the outskirts of park or have speed limits or designated times.

1841 No

1842 City of Calgary has done a great job with the trail system throughout this park. It is great to go exploring
1843 throughout the park

1844 I bird watch

1845 I wanted to click access to wildlife as well as the walking paths allow access, but control where people
1846 go. I don't like the amount and speed of cyclists.

1847 There are very few natural areas. Most parks are overly programmed and have too much artificial
1848 infrastructure.

1849 Walking paths allow me access to nature.

1850 I became aware of this beautiful area when I started kayaking a few years ago. It is a wonderful gift to
1851 Calgarians, to have this natural area in the city. The variety of wildlife and birds I have seen is incredible
1852 as is the variety of plant species. Visiting this area does not require much driving time and offers a
1853 wonderful escape (peace and tranquility) of the man made world that surrounds us.

1854 I value walking in the natural setting within the City. I do wish that the cycle paths would be separated
1855 from the walking paths. As I age, (i'm in my 60's) I find the cyclists more and more aggressive and speedy
1856 than, say 10 years ago on the same paths)

1857 We need to sustain our current natural environment within the city limits. Sustain for wildlife, our
1858 environment and future generations. The Weaselhead is a municipal treasure that we need to support
1859 in it's natural state without further development

1860 We enjoy walking on the pathways which we do 2or 3 times a week.

1861 We love the feeling of being in the wild, close to many species without having to drive to the mountains.

1862 I like to walk quietly to hear and see the birds. I do not like running into people who have dogs off leash
1863 as I keep mine on leash. I do not like having bikes speeding past me

1864 I enjoy walking, cycling and jogging in a quiet natural area that is right in the city, easily accessible
1865 without need to leave the city and has stunning views of the mountains. I have also cross-county skied
1866 along the perimiter of the reservoir and hope to make this a more regular habit as I get older.

1867 Being in nature is the best medicine for a person's mental and physical health.

1868 By restricting access to the myriad of human activities (a small price to pay) we have the rare privilege of
1869 experiencing natural beauty

1870 I enjoy the walking nature and wildlife with my LEASHED DOG. I do not enjoy the cyclists pathways are
1871 not wide enuf for both.

1872 I love that there is a place that is somewhat accessible to me that has trees, a natural outdoor water
1873 place (I don't go in to swim or anything, I just love hearing the water), a place to walk on designated
1874 paths among nature with friends (paths are key so that it's obvious where to step that's not an animal's
1875 home), and picnic areas.

1876 I appreciate well maintained, level walking trails and the access to nature

1877 I would like to see more disc golf courses in the city.

1878 While the beauty and wildlife are incredible, the pathway offers a break from the city through a
1879 generally natural environment and has since I was a kid in the 70s. I'm also hoping it will connect back to
1880 Griffith Woods allowing for a safe riding corridor taking advantage of everything the Elbow Valley
1881 Corridor has to offer.

1882 except in certain concentrated areas Calgary has not done a good job of creating safe cycle spaces. The
1883 paths around the reservoir fill that need for many citizens.

1884 The Glenmore Reservoir loop (walking and cycling path) is one of the most beautiful pathways in
1885 Calgary. You can get so close to nature and close to the water - it soothes and restores you! I've been
1886 coming to Weaselhead since the 90s as a kid.

1887 Running/walking through the trails exposes us to nature and the attendant mental health benefits.
1888 Would like to see the park be rewilded so the wildlife can flourish. Would hate to see the area become
1889 more sterile.

1890

1891 Separated bike path good for young riders, nature in Weaselhead and good playground

1892 Outrigger paddling to access nature is great physically & mentally.

1893 Having pathways in Fish Creek and other parks in Calgary is probably my favourite thing about the city. I
1894 use them daily for walking, running or biking.

1895 I like being able to walk through the Weaselhead or kayak along the shoreline of both the reservoir and
1896 upstream along the Elbow River. The pathway around the reservoir is excellent for biking or running.

1897 I appreciate having bike paths in the area and enjoy the beauty of it. I also enjoy taking walks in the area
1898 and being close to nature.

1899 It's awesome to feel like you are getting out of the city without getting out of the city.

1900 The walking paths provide great visuals that brings a diverse group of people out even in the coldest
1901 weather. The additional activities added around the pathways support this and facilitates interactions
1902 amongst groups. The skating also augments this well.

1903 It feels like you're in the wilderness, peaceful, love it

1904 I am a runner and often use the paths around the Glenmore Reservoir for running

1905 It makes me feel like I'm out camping minus all the people, the fact we have access to this wonderful
1906 area is awesome.

1907 its amazing large natural area in the city

1908 Skate

1909 The walking paths allow me to observe nature which includes the birds and wildlife

1910 I love that it's a natural park with dirt trails

1911 Walking paths provide access to nature and recreational opps

1912 I like to walk my dogs there, and my elderly parents (but with mobility issues it has become to difficult to
1913 bring them as they age)

1914 It is a wild are within an urban setting. It offers wildlife to many who do not have the opportunity to see
1915 and experience nature.

1916 I relish the views, vegetarian and wildlife (to a certain point - not sure about those cayotes!).

1917 To be in the city and have access to nature is vital for mental, social, and physical health.

1918 Value walking and cycle paths equally. Being able to recreate in relatively natural area within a short
1919 distance of my home.

1920 Please bring back ultimate frisbee nets.

1921 Hard to separate - I LOVE wildlife, but wildlife exists in a natural environment, which is what makes the
1922 Weaselhead special.

1923 I love the way the space makes me feel - alive, grateful and motivated.

1924 I grew up in orthodox Glenmore Park area (Lincoln Park). I'm now 65. As a youth we went there often to
1925 explore, swim in the river, ride bikes and have fun. I consider an important part of my development. I
1926 learned to respect nature there. I learned about managing risk as there is lots of trouble to get in as a 9
1927 to 16 year old. It was always interesting to learn about the life cycle of the plants and animals in the area
1928 and how issues with one led to challenges for others.

1929 I listen to the birds, look at the plants, smell the air.

1930 This is a gem within the city and we are fortunate to live near by. Nature is the healer. We need it
1931 because of the stress associated with being a human in a human focused world. We need it because
1932 humans are a destructive species and in the end, we do not matter. We need to understand that we are
1933 a part of an ecosystem and to stop dominating the ecosystem because that will lead to further
1934 destruction and our demise. We need to protect it while benefitting from it.

1935 Deer, coyotes, birds, bats, bobcats, hares, squirrels, chipmunks wild flowers etc come right into our
1936 condo complex and are readily observed on pathways which provide the access. The pathways are
1937 generally flat, paved and well maintained and ploughed in winter, making it accessible for me, a senior.

1938 In such a large city full of technology, it's nice to be able to unplug and unpack, reconnect and commune
1939 with nature without having to drive for hours to get there first. Nature helps restore one's life balance,
1940 eases the mind with it's colors, and soothes the soul with it's peace and tranquility. It strengthens the
1941 mind, the body, and the spirit.

1942 It's just an area to do some light cardio outside. Keep it that way, I don't care about the wildlife living
1943 their.

1944 I used to live in the former army base ("Camp Sarcee") in the 1960s. Weasel head gave us (and others in
1945 Lakeview and beyond) the chance to hike, swim, fish, etc, without the expense of travelling out of town.
1946 It was best back yard a kid could wish for. The improvements since (eg Glenmore Res. bike path,
1947 maintained walking trails, et al) have only added to the experience. It was one of the main reasons I still
1948 live in Lakeview. How many other cities have such an opportunity?

1949 It feels like you are not in the city, so great to be able to experience that.

1950 "Very hard to choose-I tend to spend more time biking in park, but I enjoy all of these aspects. I love
1951 biking in this area because of the easy access to see the birds and animals and ride through trees, but I
1952 also enjoy the winter games and the unpaved
1953 walking areas. I think the diversity of the recreational opportunities of the parks in the area is its
1954 greatest asset"

1955 I like all those things. The beavers are a family favourite

1956 It's easy to see birds from the trails. Owls, flickers, woodpeckers, nuthatch etc. I've seen beavers very
1957 close to the pathway.

1958 Love that you are submerged by nature right within the city. Parts of the park still feel like you have
1959 travelled outside the city. I appreciate the high level of biodiversity and each time I go I still see
1960 something new. We are lucky to have this space in Calgary.

1961 I love living in a city where within minutes you can be surrounded by nature, as if you were in a rural
1962 area.

1963 I value all of the things on this list equally.

1964 Weaselhead is one of the few places where one can stay on a multipurpose pathway for running or
1965 cycling in a pleasant setting (away from car traffic, in or next to a natural setting) without interruption
1966 from roadways.

1967 I do not want any more development in these wildlife areas. We don't need more roads and certainly
1968 need less cars. Leave nature alone and preserve it as it is now.

1969 I use the paths to access natural areas

1970 While I visit the area primarily for cycling, I enjoy the surroundings and would like to see it preserved. I
1971 have also walked the area many times in the past and enjoy the natural environment.

1972 We absolutely love walking on paths in nature.

1973 As a survey designer I would have suggested a less leading and better question. I value the natural
1974 environment while I partake in recreational activities like walking and cycling.....So all of the above. But
1975 I can tell if you think you are going to get useful information from a "fill in the text box" you really aren't
1976 very serious.

1977 I like the walking/cycling paths that are close to nature. But with new highway to the west it can be
1978 quite noisy at times which is disappointing and can spoil the experience.

1979 The Glenmore dam should be drained and removed allowing the area to go back to it's natural state
1980 before the city screwed with nature

1981 Walking on a daily basis including winter on the south and east side of the reservoir. I greatly appreciate
1982 that the paths are cleared of snow and then gravelled. My favourite go to place in Calgary.

1983 I love being outside and this area is so beautiful, especially considering it's part of the city

1984 What a shitty survey this is...it doesn't allow for multiple answers. Why are you using radio buttons
1985 when you should have option boxes.

1986 Will use my bike 2-3 a week for exercise in this area.

1987 I use the park for all of these things and I feel connected with nature while exercising. I value that we
1988 have a beautiful spot on the edge of the city that has water, mountain views, wildlife, and nature at our
1989 doortep.

1990 This area provides a unique opportunity to paddle through a diverse waterway that transforms
1991 throughout the season. Bird watching is a must, along with seeing other wildlife along the shoreline.

1992 The city has done away with so much green space and allowed overdevelopment in areas like Marda
1993 Loop. Back yards with green spaces have been substantially reduced, which is sad. Having access to
1994 green spaces, nature and ensuring safe spaces for wildlife is important to our environment and mental
1995 health.

1996 Appreciate that bikes and walkers are separate. Appreciate the numerous washrooms. Appreciate the
1997 views from the trail above the reservoir. Appreciate that the trails are paved.

1998 I run the glenmore area 3Xa week year round and add time on the pathways during the summer on my
1999 bike. I picked walking paths but I really can't separate my love of the path system from my love of the
2000 the wildlife and the access to so many areas to recreate and meet with friends and family.

2001 Accessible pathways in a natural, non-commercial outdoor environment, with occasional "shelter" areas
2002 so we can wait out a summer shower. The pathways system is extensive, and it's easy to find yourself a
2003 long way from your vehicle when a sudden rain or hail system comes through (which happens often in
2004 Calgary). Having some simple covered shelters located between parking/pathway access areas would be
2005 greatly appreciated by families, older citizens, and those with mobility limitations.

2006 "Play tennis But pickle ball now has taken over the four tennis courts More courts required for both
2007 sports"

2008 I go here to bird watch!

2009 I enjoy going to spaces within Calgary that are a little less "managed" and more natural, to experience
2010 fresh air, the local flora and fauna, and to feel like I'm getting out of the city without actually having to
2011 get out of the city.

2012 Even though I love to recreate in many city parks wildlife and biodiversity is greater than myself. We live
2013 in a city that is at the intersecting point of 3 major ecoregions (foothold, prairie and aspen parkland). As
2014 such we have a wealth of biodiversity and the Weaselhead/glenmore area represents this. As the city
2015 grows we must be intentional to protect these vital spots for future generations

2016 THIS IS AN AREA THAT COULD BE DEVELOPED AND USED RESPONSIBLY LIKE THE SOUTH GLENMORE
2017 SIDE I.E. BIKE PUMPTRACK, FLOW TRAILS, SKATE BOARD PARK AS EXAMPLES.

2018 The paths are great - always cleared off even in winter

2019 While I participate in all of the options in the previous question, the access to nature is huge to me.
2020 Having access to these (relatively) undisturbed natural areas is so nice to have easy access to.

2021 It's quick and easy access to nature, and the bike paths can connect you to Fish Creek park or
2022 downtown. It's my preferred method of biking to downtown during the summer since it's almost
2023 completely separated from road traffic. Some areas are developed for family activities and other areas
2024 are left to nature.

2025 I cherish the close access to a protected and (somewhat respected) natural area to educate my family
2026 and engage with nature. I grew up in rural Alberta/Kananaskis area, so this experience helps me and my
2027 family feel very at home in Calgary. I also spend time removing the various stickers and booby traps left
2028 by anti-vaccination "Freedom" vandals polluting the area.

2029 I use the paths (mostly cycling) very regularly. This is mostly because it is such a pleasant area to be in.
2030 With the ring road and other development the area have very definitely been significantly degraded.
2031 Light, noise, altered drainage, blocked wildlife corridors have all made the natural qualities of this area
2032 much less appealing,

2033 Walking thru the park, and being in nature that nature specifically- has been therapeutic. Please don't
2034 change things, just keep maintaining it.

2035 The trees and diversity of the forest is amazing

2036 There is a lack of quality dirt trails.

2037 When I'm down in the Weaselhead, I feel like I've left the city. Being in the trees and in nature is
2038 amazing.

2039 The Weaselhead/Glenmore area is a haven for birds and other wildlife. It is regularly enjoyed by a large
2040 contingent of Calgary birders who have recorded upwards of 266 different species there, rivaling the
2041 Inglewood Bird Sanctuary

2042 There are very few cities that have such abundant nature and wildlife so easily accessible to citizens
2043 (nature and wildlife are not separable in my opinion and I don't appreciate that I was forced to choose
2044 between the two options above instead of being able to click on both items...)

2045 I love the peaceful meandering pathway in all seasons. I hear birds and other wildlife, I see dams and
2046 water life, I feel the breeze and I love the quiet.

2047 I highly value being able to access high quality nature/scenic areas with dirt pathways to run on
2048 recreationally. As running on pavement is bad for you, and nature provides an added benefit over and
2049 above the exercise.

2050 So special to be "into the woods" just a 15 min walk from home.

2051 This area provides me so much positive mental health benefits. Fills me with peace and joy. The walking
2052 paths are wonderful. It can get a bit busy with walkers and bike riders.

2053 I like to get off the main paved bike path and walk the trails in Weaselhead mainly in the summer. I take
2054 photographs of the flora and fauna. I would like the trails to be maintained with extra gravel in low
2055 spots so people don't have to make new trails to avoid muddy or wet areas. The location signs put up
2056 last year are good, but one of them is in the wrong place. Some dog walkers do not keep dogs on leash.

2057 Feels like you are away from the city but you are not

2058 Though my primary use is the well maintained walking paths, it is the spectacular views, the glimpses of
2059 wildlife and the sheer sense of not even being in the city anymore that I treasure about the area.

2060 I walk with my dog or with just. Myself

2061 I enjoy engaging with trees animals fresh air and water. I feel healthier when out in this natural area. I
2062 am an artist and teacher so nature is my inspiration.

2063 The fact that we can access nature without having to drive long distances is special and worth
2064 protecting. As the city grows, these spaces allow us to de-stress from busy lives. They also provide
2065 valuable ecosystems for the creatures we coexist with.

2066 It's a quite large natural area with differing habits, so a great area for access to nature within the city.

2067 For me those 3 are intertwined and rate at the same level.

2068 The area is large enough, and facilities in place allow for kayaking, biking, running and hiking for hours in
2069 a natural environment. It is one of top natural recreation areas in the City.

2070 Wildlife and access to nature - with so much natural habitat being destroyed by the city's growth
2071 program, what are the animals to do when their homes are destroyed?

2072 Walking paths within nature. And being close to the water. Quiet.

2073 nice to quickly get down into a area with forest and riverfront.

2074 Great for birding

2075 While there are many parks to do recreational activities, being able to access natural areas within city
2076 limits is less available. I love that I see deer, skunk, bobcat, coyote, squirrel, muskrat, beaver, eagles,
2077 wolf and bear within walking distance.

2078 I moved to the neighbourhood of Lakeview specifically to enjoy the parks and nature nearby. As a
2079 runner and biker, this area is very important to my physical and mental well being.

2080 I love it when I am down in the Weaselhead and come across wildlife

2081 proximity to the city, with a variety of people. the only thing missing is the food trucks - the car parks
2082 reserve space for the trucks, and could promote community provided we ensure waste/packaging is
2083 cleaned up.

2084 It's nice that many spots in the western side feel totally immersive.

2085 I adore the animals, plants, and the peace and quiet.

2086 this is a really special wilderness area within city limits, that protects habitat for so many different
2087 species of plants and animals and of course also creates an incredible recreational opportunity for us
2088 humans.

2089 "I love to look at the bushes,trees,wild flowers,different kinds of birds and animals.

2090 I love the beauty of the park in all seasons and am great full to live so close.

2091 We are fortunate to have this area inside the city."

2092 Wildlife is there, but hard to see. Ability to walk in such a natural area is wonderful.

2093 It is a gift to be able to walk and cycle in an area where there are flowers, trees and birds. I find time in
2094 nature to be a necessary part of keeping myself healthy and happier. Much nicer to cycle and walk in the
2095 park than on city streets with cycle lanes.

2096 Biodiversity and habitat loss is NOW CRITICAL in Calgary. Issuing development permits in river and creek
2097 valleys and illegal dog activity are reasons. (Intended ?) Failure of BYLAW and COURTS to curb illegal
2098 dog activity. Threats, intimidation and assaults by dog owners to members of the public at the park and
2099 at their homes if they file complaint against illegal dog activity. Calgary's beautiful, amazing and
2100 priceless biodiversity has declined 90% since 1980s policies have been abandoned for\$

2101 Spending time in the park contributes to my physical and mental health and my social connection to
2102 fellow park users. I value access to this natural space in the heart of the city. I also realize this is a city
2103 park used by Calgarians in many different ways. I value the access to nature but I also value that the park
2104 is open to all Calgarians for a variety of reasons (picnics, gatherings, organized sports, etc). Access to
2105 nature but also understanding the importance of access by people.

2106 I walk here regularly and appreciate both the upkeep of the park and accessibility to nature.

2107 The native plants and wildlife in Weaselhead/Glenmore is a key reason why I value this area.

2108 The experience of being outside in this area is gaining through multiple activities and access to nature is
2109 a multi faceted experience.

2110 This is a unique area- getting away from traffic to be in nature, self- propelled, with my dog for walks or
2111 runs

2112 My wife and I walk on the pathways almost daily through the year.

2113 The paths are cleared which makes waling much easier both summer and winter

2114 The main purpose of my walks is for my health and wellness. I love the peace and relaxation I find in this
2115 park. The wildlife and diverse nature is awesome. Other users are respectful of the area and a pleasure
2116 to meet strike up a conversation.

2117 Love this paradise in the middle of a large city

2118 I love that the park is reasonably natural, and so close in to the city. I love the trees and the waterways,
2119 and the pathways that provides access.

2120

2121 Question 7: Thinking about the Weaselhead/Glenmore area 5 years from now,
2122 what do you think will be the most valuable? What about 10 years? What about
2123 20 years?
2124

2125 For each timeframe, the most valuable is to preserve is as a natural area that is still somewhat
2126 accessible.

2127 Climate Change and Biodiversity data collection and protection of habitat from artificial lighting, safety
2128 on valley slopes and curves, Park ranger public relations volunteers, expansion of native plant habitat,
2129 removal of introduced plants, particularly berry bushes that attract bears. Park educational tours at
2130 specified pre-registered \ times, possible educational center (West Calgary does not have an Inglewood
2131 or Ralph Klein Centre.,

2132 We need to think in terms of generations as First Nations does, and ensure we maintain or improve the
2133 biodiversity and health of the environment for future generations.

2134 Wildlife. Wildlife. Wildlife.

2135 the Delta, natural pathways, wildlife, native plants

2136 " - Ensure public transit buses are more accessible for folks

2137 - Prioritize habitat protection, even if it sometimes comes at the cost of recreational use.

2138 - Work with community organizations to get Calgarians more appreciative of natural areas like
2139 Weaselhead/Glenmore."

2140 We would love to see a rewilding of the whole area with larger portions of the area protected. To
2141 educate people on our impacts on the area and the environmental impact protecting areas like the
2142 weaselhead has on our communities and cities. 20 years on maybe all of Glenmore could be wild. We'd
2143 love to see programming for younger children and youth. Maybe even a small building with educational
2144 opportunities (similar to the one at Lynn Valley Suspension Bridge in North Vancouver)

2145 Cannot put a price on access to nature within the city. It is so good for mental and physical health.

2146 Note: Grazing should be VERY targeted to a 1 m strip adjacent to trails, could include goats to eat
2147 invasives, targeted to avoid interference with naturally thick & high grasses (it looks messy, but it
2148 contributes naturally). Opportunity for exemplary best practices to be emulated throughout the City, to
2149 educate the public re the value of naturalized spaces & native vegetation. Need to be concerned about
2150 impacts from noise, lighting, pollutants, overuse (loving to death). Protect & conserve it.

2151 the most valuable thing in the future of the park will be to retain the sense of wild. If we over-plan and
2152 provide too many resources to people it has the potential to feel less wild and feel like any other park. It
2153 should feel exploratory and not simply become a "natural area" within an urban environment.

2154 Greater protection of the habitat, including efforts to prevent people from willfully destroying habitats
2155 (my poor beaver friends 😞), reducing sound pollution ranging from the road din to students screaming,
2156 people running with music blasting, car radios blasting in the parking lot so loud you can hear it deep in
2157 the park. Keep the lesser accessed areas accessible. It's where I find peace with nature. No smoking -
2158 anything yuck!!! And no alcohol allowed. No fires.

2159 To protect this natural habitat

2160 5-10-20 years: preservation of and access to such a beautiful natural area with urban limits of Calgary

2161 Green space - our city council will probably attempt to sell this regional park after the precedent setting
2162 Richmond Green sale - they are so spend happy we might lose it all together. DO NOT LET COUNCIL sell
2163 this for profit!

2164 Maintaining the area to preserve it for future generations.

2165 I wrote under five hundred but it continued to be red so I am unfortunately submitting this without my
2166 thoughts

2167

2168

2169 I love all the ideas above of reducing hours, dog-free zones, etc. Just excellent! I would love to see the
2170 Weaselhead become an even more nature-diverse area with impeccable examples of native plant
2171 habitat.

2172 "5 years - Laying out infrastructure to support growing visitation from rising local population 10 years -
2173 Factoring in the changing climate and its effects of bio diversity 20 years - Creating proactive zoning and
2174 protection laws to maintain the natural areas from urban development encroachment"

2175 Protecting as much of the natural habitat as possible. Less is more. When development happens you
2176 cannot make it go away. I think there also needs to be more community engagement about proposed
2177 projects in adjacent neighbourhoods PRIOR to decisions being made about development. I have seen
2178 lots of changes over the past 30 years. IMO: The polo field is the biggest waste of space. Lastly:
2179 PLEASE!!! WE NEED A FLASHING SIGN AT THE CROSSWALK AT OAKSIDE GATE SW ESP FOR KIDS/BIKES
2180 HEADING TO BIKE PARK.

2181 Pathway, nature and views and sitting areas. Parking.

2182 Natural areas. They will be fewer and fewer. We need to understand that we share this land, water and
2183 city with nature.

2184 Get rid of the cars and speeders

2185 To get rid of the cars and speeders and all the garbage people leave

2186 Keeping it natural is how I see the future of the area. This will not be attainable if dogs bylaws and bike
2187 bylaws in this area are not enforced. Bikes approach wildlife too quickly. Dogs off leash chase wildlife
2188 and disturb ground nesting birds. Plus their waste is not being picked up.

2189 It remains important to me at that over all the listed timelines that weaselhead co tongues to provide
2190 important habitat for plants and animals. It is also valuable for citizens to have natural areas to enjoy,
2191 learn, and recreate in.

2192 Maintaining Biodiversity

2193 Leave it unspoiled. Expand it and don't let city roads encroach on it.

2194 Water

2195 It should have no lawns, just a forested area

2196 With Calgary spreading like a fungus, there needs to be adequate protection of an area like this for all to
2197 enjoy and appreciate the natural environment that we have lost due to the surrounding development.
2198 This will be the same for 5, 10 and 20 years forward.

2199 Keeping it as natural as possible. In the long term, as the planet warms it's going to be very important to
2200 have natural areas with lots of vegetation, especially within large urban areas. We also need to preserve
2201 the quality of our drinking water!!!

2202 Wildlife friendly fencing, increased enforcement of by-laws, altered park hours

2203 It is essential that this natural area be protected from development and overuse. The biodiversity of the
2204 area must be maintained for future generations.

2205 As urbanization occurs everywhere, the preservation of natural spaces (and keeping them natural) is so
2206 important for the future

2207 The park serves many Calgarians and it is important that there whatever we want to preserve is not
2208 going to give major restrictions. The many user groups all have their own needs. And they likely are not
2209 conflicting with the nature goals. See for instance how smart trail building in West Bragg Creek has
2210 made that a top notch destination, with what I think limited impact on the environment.

2211 Important is that the area will not be destroyed by a human overusage due to the TaZa Park
2212 development that is planned.

2213 Protection of the natural ecosystem, including including plants, insects, and wildlife. This natural area
2214 needs to be protected and supported, as biodiversity and native species will be increasingly threatening
2215 in coming years due to climate change, invasive species, habitat loss, and human interference.

2216 In all cases, the opportunity for families to get outdoors and enjoy green space. All great cities have
2217 accessible open and natural areas for citizens.

2218 If nothing changes, in 5 years the area will likely just be a park with no large mammal activity.

2219 Protect nature/wildlife from development that will further encroach on their habitat. Already you can
2220 hear and see the ring-road signs and traffic on its west side. It will get worse not better. In 5 years,
2221 mankind will destroy the environment as being from Signal Hill many animals have been coming into our
2222 area or killed by the ring-road as their homes were destroyed. I fear the fresh air, sights and sounds of
2223 what used to be quiet, protective, sensitive and beautiful will be lost forever.

2224 That urban development, sprawling, and park users do not negatively impact the park or the Elbow
2225 Rivers water quality. Preserving the habitat for wildlife both terrestrial and aquatic species.

2226 The most valuable is still having a natural area with wildlife.

2227 That it remains open for unrestricted public use recreationally.

2228 "Goal should be low key access to protected nature. Less loud and destructive recreation (biking, dogs,
2229 kids wagons, parties on the shoreline), more quiet enjoyment of nature. Like the bird sanctuary.

2230 Limit use of the park to the protection of nature, and the respectful enjoyment of nature."

2231 Preserving the wildlife that lives in the park. Ensuring they continue to thrive. Keeping the area free of
2232 development and additional cars. Ensuring the wildlife are as undisturbed by humans as possible. The
2233 use of additional fences to keep humans out of sensitive areas will help. Additional interpretive signage
2234 will also help teach people about these sensitive areas.

2235 The only infrastructure Glenmore needs is a sheltered picnic area next to the Glenmore Pump Track.
2236 There is zero shade on hot days. A water fountain and/or tap would be wise to install as well at the site.

2237 My biggest concern is overuse of the area, especially by large groups. Trail management will be very
2238 important in the Weaselhead area. The pathway around the reservoir is unbelievably busy at times, so
2239 increased capacity in certain pinch points on east side of the path could be beneficial.

2240 Mowed greenspaces for picnics and family gatherings.

2241 Education adjacent to the parks. Seems like every fall black bears cruise Lakeview for apple trees.
2242 Although there are studies of stress by animals that sense humans I fear if you close the park at night
2243 vulnerable or dangerous animals we'll venture closer to busy roadways and human habitats.

2244 To remember that is a sanctuary for people, not just wildlife.

2245 Clean water and air

2246 Green space with recreational activities like cycling and walking, pickleball

2247 Love having nature with walking/biking paths walking distance from home. I hope this is maintained.

2248 Public use is important

2249 I'd like to see it's rustic beauty remain the same.

2250 I hope, the same things that are valuable now. A place for Calgarians to access, learn about, and even
2251 teach their kids about nature close to home.

2252 Giving people places to camp, picnic, play, explore with their kids and dogs, instead of the city's current
2253 approach of banning everyone and everything from 90% of the park.

2254 5 years- access to wetland area within the city.

2255 Natural habitat within the city boundaries. Seeing wildlife and bird migrations

2256 Regardless of time span, the most valuable part of the Weaselhead is its natural, wild environment.
2257 Second most valuable is in educating the public about the value of the natural, wild environment.

2258 Preservation of areas to encourage and sustain wildlife corridors and habitat - 5,10 and 20 years.

2259 The ability to enjoy the natural environment

2260 Enjoying the area for its nature and wildlife, rather than racing through it for exercise would be best.
2261 That's why I am so supportive of continuing equestrian use - trail riding at a walk!

2262 "Dogs off leash including off the paved pathway is an issue. Bicycles off the paved pathway is also
2263 common. Improved signage, education, and enforcement so that in 5 years there is less damage to the

2264 park. Improved and maintained pathway out to the NW corner of the Weaselhead and signage
2265 indicating a clothing optional area."

2266 Let's keep the space as natural as possible and give everyone an opportunity to enjoy. Ie bikers hikers
2267 people with dogs. Too much regulation makes it feel less like an outdoor park and more like a garden.

2268

2269 Keep the area wild. The ring road places the area at risk with run off, traffic noises and more people in
2270 the area. Cannot believe we placed our drinking water at risk

2271 Question isn't entirely clear. The most valuable aspect to Weaselhead in 5, 10, or 20 years will hopefully
2272 be exactly what it is now - an oasis of nature in a city full of noise and distraction.

2273 "Use is likely going to increase. Maintaining the resource into the future is critical.

2274 The one change I would like to see would be separating bike pathways from walking pathways. Many
2275 bikers travel at excessive speeds on the trail and assume they have the right of way. Having a separate
2276 designated biking path and leaving all other paths exclusively for walking would be wonderful. The
2277 possibility of serious injury due to a bicycle collision is highly likely unless the situation is resolved."

2278 Control of users Rehab of damaged areas, protection of diversity,

2279 I like to think of the Weaselhead as an oasis within our city, and love the idea of protecting and yet
2280 enjoying this vibrant and biodiverse area. I like the thought that having such a wonderful natural space
2281 will be a resource fostering mental health and balance in an often chaotic urban world. That said, I need
2282 my dog to come along, on leash of course, but vital for the companionship and to help me see what is
2283 out there - without the dog I would not, could not come.

2284 open spaces, but better walk ways that will work,, maybe a area for bikers, who think speed is the
2285 most important use for this wonderful park

2286 leave as much of the area alone as possible

2287 Natural habitat with minimal disturbance of vegetation; wildlife undisturbed by cyclists and dogs that
2288 ignore restrictions on pathways

2289 It will continue to be a natural area, attractive to wildlife and people who wish to walk in extensive
2290 undeveloped forest. Please do not outlaw the trails!! That is how people access the more remote parts
2291 of this park.

2292 Close collaboration with Tsuut'ina and integration of the Taza development into the park system for all
2293 years.

2294 The same as now

2295 "That we humans can escape to it to ""recharge"" ourselves. As the human population of Calgary grows,
2296 per Federal, Provincial and City unwise policies, any ""natural"" area, including our Weaselhead, will
2297 come under more and more pressure. It is unrealistic to think that the Weaselhead's biodiversity can be
2298 completely preserved, while the surrounding landscape is built up with more and more highways and
2299 human housing. Thank you for trying to keep it somewhat natural."

2300 Due to my age I'll stick with the 5 year question. Keeping the area as wild and undeveloped as possible
2301 would benefit all flora and fauna. The parks have plenty of picnic and socializing areas outside of the
2302 Weaselhead as it is, so no more are required in the 5 year time frame.

2303 The same things that are valuable now-easy access, lack of development, lots or trails, happy wildlife.
2304 interactive environment for humans and animals, like birds, beavers, etcIdeally not wildlife like bears,
2305 cougars, lynx etc as the area is surrounded by residential areas and they will come into neighbourhoods.

2306 A rich green space with lots of trees and habitat for birds and other creatures. Still accessible to visitors
2307 in a significant way, as to many this is one of only a few times they get to experience nature or
2308 introduce it to their children.

2309 For all, 5/10/20 years, having a place for nature is the most valuable. So much land around Calgary has
2310 been developed, pushing wildlife out. We need to give them a place in our city as much as people.

2311 "The natural areas. However, I'm concerned about the practices of closing off certain areas. Right now,
2312 people spread out in the park. When you close off areas, you still get the same number of people, just
2313 they are closer together. Instead, enforce the existing bylaws. We often see bikes on the trails in the
2314 forest where they are NOT supposed to be. Dogs are a huge problem when they are running off leash
2315 and when owners don't clean up after them. I have NEVER seen a bylaw officer in the park."

2316 That the park area remains intact for all users to enjoy. There needs to be some form of pathways to
2317 prevent trails popping up everywhere

2318 The natural habit and pathways to enjoy it.

2319 That the nature and wildlife is preserved.

2320 Quit building things in this area. Leave it natural....there's too many people and things, play ground, two
2321 sailing schools, music park and bike pump park (no bathrooms so they urinate and poop in the trees,
2322 especially guys)

2323 Maintenance of existing pathways and better regulation of rule-breakers for the long-term, overall
2324 health of the water system in the area.

2325 Most valuable would be if the highway were gone. It feels so much less natural with the hum of the
2326 highway and visible electronic billboards which will only grow in the next 20 years. I still see it's value as
2327 a great public space though it feels less and less like a natural space. Raising the level of the dam has
2328 altered the space dramatically, the river is no longer accessible for much of the year, more trees fall into
2329 the river from the elevated water.

2330 A natural space, free from tinkering and "management"

2331 In next 5 years, better monitoring of the park and signage. Expand the park along the river.

2332 With extremes of weather patterns, we can expect more flooding and potential for fire damage.
2333 Thinking of ways to manage/mitigate those risks will be hugely important in the next 20 years.

2334 always the wildlife and nature

2335 Leaving more areas for the animals. Humans have enough of the city. I do love though that I can walk or
2336 cycle there as I do not have a car or access to a car so it's really nice to be in nature.

2337 I don't really understand this question. The most valuable what? Generally speaking, the whole area is
2338 valuable, and it will be for years to come. If you're asking about the items above, most valuable will be
2339 dog-free zones, by-law enforcement, and educational signage. Then the naturalization of under used
2340 trails and open areas. I also think a sound/noise barrier is required for the Ring Road, to ensure species
2341 return that may otherwise avoid the Weaselhead due to increased noise/pollution.

2342 "Place for people to gather and socialize or undertake recreation as a family or extended family. As well
2343 as, a place for people to get away to enjoy the outdoors, nature and observe wildlife, therefore
2344 preservation of the natural ecosystem and minimizing impact is vital.

2345 Signage should be minimal. Walking trails preferred over biking trails, gravel trails preferred over asphalt
2346 trails, manual biking preferred over ebiking etc."

2347 Natural areas and wildlife habitat

2348 A place to get out of the hustle and bustle of the city within the city.

2349 More habitat creation and restriction of dogs off paths to preserve bird breeding. I also think adjacent
2350 properties should be in partnership to create more habitat and buffer zones for the park.

2351 Water management.

2352 The beauty of its natural areas and green space

2353 Natural habitat needs to be retained, no further encroachment, and wildlife corridor connectivity
2354 enhanced along Elbow to ensure no loss of existing wildlife use. Maintain Glenmore Park size to buffer
2355 area from housing etc. Should be in as good and better natural condition than now.

2356 Open spaces for families to use. The urban density currently being adopted gives residents less and less
2357 space for larger family picnics and gatherings.

2358 Separate walking and cycling trails

2359 Preserving the space, but allowing people to interact with it in a way they can connect with the land
2360 personally.

2361 Preservation of what is left of the natural areas in the Park

2362 Preserving the wildlife and native plants. This is a unique and beautiful area - very few if any city in NA
2363 has such a natural reserve. If it means excluding people in time from the area to preserve it that might
2364 be what has to happen.

2365 "5yrs: the area is managed with the priority to maintain biodiversity. Outreach helps people understand
2366 how they can enjoy the area without conflicting with this aim.

2367 10yrs: it is part of a urban ecological network designed to increase biodiversity, provide city-wide
2368 ecological services, offset carbon emissions. It remains accessible for recreation that does not conflict
2369 with this.

2370 20yrs: it is embedded in a robust network of connected green spaces. Their value is widely understood
2371 by citizens."

2372 Maintaining the Weaselhead clothing-optional area. This area is already somewhat threatened by the
2373 development project on Tsuu T'ina land. Use of this area for clothing-optional purposes must be
2374 maintained and respected as a valid and lawful form of recreation.

2375 Manage trails and set up process to it stays clean naturally as it does now.

2376 "5 yrs - restoration to sensitive natural areas and defined spaces for both park users and wildlife.
2377 Introduction of native wild flowers and grass areas restored, ""goat"" trails restored and no longer
2378 visible. This includes spawning fish in the upper elbow. 10 yrs - park is self healing and returning to
2379 natural native form. Less daily visitors = more diverse outdoor space. More wildlife return. 20 yrs - park
2380 still exists and is considered protected under provincial law"

2381 Maintaining naturalb undisturbed areas for wildlife, controlling weeds and area use. Education of the
2382 public and area users.

2383 In 5, 10, 20 years, the most valuable contribution will be the natural local wilderness AND public access
2384 to that wilderness. There needs to be a balance struck between supporting wilderness and allowing the
2385 public to enjoy it. If the public cannot experience the wilderness, that support will disappear and the
2386 Weaselhead / Glenmore area will not make it another 20 years.

2387 Continued access to a variety of year round uses - frisbee golf; Nordic skiing; skating track; expanded
2388 picnic areas. Something for everyone.

2389 Some areas look unkempt, including bridges and wooden walking paths. Will be important to upkeep for
2390 the future to ensure we can still have a beautiful park in the city. No other park is as beautiful in my
2391 opinion

2392 That is has better biodiversity and the ecosystem is in better condition

2393 Replant what you have cut down, you have made a horrible mess in places. Get rid of the fungus on the
2394 trees. Do not promote the park so much, it can't take the pressure. Stop developing the park so much
2395 leave it alone you are ruining this natural space. Nobody needed that water or bike park.

2396 "Would like to see a restaurant on the water- perhaps close to yacht club. Make the bike pump park
2397 bigger. Basketball courts and soccer field with nets. A pool would be awesome."

2398 Maintain natural environment

2399 The most valuable thing for the Weaselhead/Glenmore area would be to promote and maintain
2400 biodiversity and the beauty of nature. While biking is really great and Weaselhead provides good
2401 connections for cyclists, the wildlife and the safety of the water should be the top priorities. Only then
2402 can Weaselhead/Glenmore be considered a safe natural space for Calgary's flora and fauna.

2403 Most valuable will be the preservation of this area including wildlife. This area should be preserved in
2404 perpetuity.

2405 Still having the area in tact.

2406 The partial wildness of the area, the animals and that it is not totally covered in trails and visible human
2407 impact

2408 Limiting cyclists to paved pathways, limiting access to sensitive areas of the park, enforcing a speed limit
2409 for cyclists and naturalization of mowed park space. There doesn't need to be lawn in any "natural"
2410 area in my opinion

2411 Keeping as much natural areas as possible. Protecting our drinking water.

2412 Construction of the new ring road and the associated development of adjacent land has impacted the
2413 Weaselhead natural area (and South Glenmore Park) to a level that no management practice can rectify.
2414 While limiting access to recreational users and restoring natural areas is ok to some degree, the City of
2415 Calgary should take a close look at the permitting and engineering processes for the area if they are
2416 truly interested in making a difference.

2417 Easy access to nature

2418 An oasis of green space in a very big city.

2419 The value of nature has been proven for mental health benefits and we want to facilitate that as a
2420 community. Although one can drive to Weaselhead, it involves physical activity to access it, which is a
2421 health benefit. The children of the future will learn the value of preservation on the environment.

2422 Preservation and maintenance of the nature trails and encouragement of respect for natural
2423 environment.

2424 Preservation of biodiversity and habitat. You can ride a bike in many other places - and not like bike
2425 riders are really stopping to 'smell the roses' anyway- we come because it is natural - and that requires
2426 biodiversity.

2427 Open to Calgarians to explore nature

2428 Riparian areas are objectively the most ecologically valuable places.

2429 Preservation of wildlife and access to a natural area for people. Watershed protection.

2430 Calgary needs its natural spaces. I would like to see Weaselhead preserved in perpetuity.

2431 Trails that remain in a semi natural state. No paved bike paths. (No bikes. Period.). Abundance of
2432 wildlife. Natural not manicured. Should be accessible to walking, hiking. No fat tire bikes or bikes of
2433 any kind. Keep no motor boat laws on actual damn.

2434 "An outdoor pool by tennis courts for families More biking trails single track off paved pathways. More
2435 areas to take dogs"

2436 Habitat for birds, mammals, amphibians, insects

2437 The opportunity to get into a natural area without having to drive for an hour to get to a provincial or
2438 national park.

2439 I think maintaining it's present state or improving the natural habitat for wildlife will be most valuable
2440 going forward.

2441 That is retains its natural habitat. Though I love to visit, it is an area where the well-being of the fauna
2442 and flora takes precedence over my entitlement.

2443 Maintaining a balance between wildlife, habitat and human access to nature. Winter activities. Slope
2444 stability. Dedicated shade areas. Snow fencing.

2445 A safe place to walk and bike.

2446 I think this planning initiative is the right direction. The area is seeing increased use and congestion, and
2447 balancing that usage with habitat and wildlife is important.

2448 Flood management

2449 5 years- a place for calgarians- same with 10 years and 20 years.

2450 Habitat protection but also allowing people to enjoy the space in a way that also provides protection

2451 Maintaining and nurturing the plants/nature to ensure we always have access to this beautiful gift here.

2452 Less mowed area, more trees.

2453 Time to make the park an All Natural area, no human intervention of any area.

2454 I hope to see more wildlife at weaselhead & to be one of very few places than can be urban while still
2455 caring about the environment.

2456 Its ecological value and its value as an undeveloped and protected land.

2457 The goat program has limited purpose. It makes people feel great but it only suppresses invasive plants
2458 at best. Use efficacious chemical herbicides for noxious and invasive plant control. That's how to
2459 encourage biodiversity.

2460 I believe that increased enforcement of by-laws and regulations is key. I live in an area with a lot of
2461 natural wildlife and dog free zoning would be very positive in my opinion.

2462 I think that most valuable would be an overall presence of less trails and less dogs (off leach especially)
2463 would in turn help the wildlife numbers and diversity

2464 Bringing sheep in could spread disease. Bringing goats is identified to be less risk.

2465 Preserve public recreation in natural area, as it is

2466 That the park remains in as natural state as possible it's such a gem

2467 Keep it as it is, just to organize volunteers to help maintain the park.

2468 Pretty simple - preserving and enhancing the naturalized areas and wildlife. Access to areas like these
2469 will be essential for a healthy city especially as it continues to densify.

2470 The ability to walk through such a natural space in the city is a gift.

2471 Retaining the natural, wild feel of the area is the most important thing for users and wildlife. Increased
2472 fencing, signage, by-laws and regulations will turn the area into just another city park

2473 Within 5 years, Reduce underused mowed park space for better habitat and clean water. Increase and
2474 maintenance of riparian areas to reduce flood and drought impacts and increase biodiversity. In 10
2475 years, Increase of habitat diversity and intact corridor with wild spaces kept wild. I hope that in 20 years
2476 that the tree canopy will be healthy and diverse.

2477

2478 Long term maintaining a network of wetlands and other ecosystems as a way for critters to navigate
2479 through the city is essential. I hope that in many dozens of years from now there it will be a thriving
2480 natural ecosystem that provides opportunity for citizens to unwind/enjoy/learn about nature.

2481 "I am happy with the upgrades that the City has made to the park over the last few years. I love the
2482 trails but I do think that it's important to support nature by creating more habitats for nature and by
2483 promoting lighting for darker skies near the park. I would like to see more shade trees planted to offer
2484 shelter from the sun. Throughout the next 20 years, I want the parks assets to be properly maintained
2485 and I want the natural areas to be more natural."

2486 Natural space, cool shaded areas, space for wildlife

2487 5 years -more signage and engage with indigenous communities and highlight plant names in languages
2488 and stories of the land, plants and animals. expand the website to educate students and citizens, open
2489 programs to support with guided walks - create more paths on congested areas 10-20 - interpretive
2490 center for continued learning opportunities with classroom - connect to open minds program whereby
2491 program, connect eagle park with pathway instead of through community

2492 a park for people to come and enjoy the outdoors based on their capabilities. some people are only
2493 capable of coming out for a picnic. that's great. some can walk deep into the "wilderness" to the west
2494 in the weaselhead. that's great too. some like to ride their mountain bike through the area. that's
2495 great too.

2496 I think the most valuable part of this area will continue be for people to slow down and connect to our
2497 natural environment.

2498 In the next 5, 10 and 20 years I hope it remains a pristine natural area that everyone can enjoy on hiking
2499 and walking with the only bike access allowed on the paved path. A natural area will also ensure clean
2500 drinking water.

2501 Natural areas both treed and grassed. Access to pathways and walking paths. Wheelchair access.

2502 Disc golf course

2503 preservation of the natural landscape and views - development is already encroaching with TAZA
2504 development

2505 The natural aspects of the park. Well, whatever we can hold on to. Not confident after the ring road
2506 debacle.

2507 Sustainability, a natural area within a large urban centre will simply run down due to overuse. It's a zero
2508 sum game more freedom to roam the park will diminish its natural beauty. Nose hill park restricts

2509 people to paths, it inhibits the use of the park but it's required to keep its natural beauty. Same with
2510 Sunshine Meadows. If you look at Wypriss sp? ATV's and 4 wheeling has destroyed the area.

2511 In 5 years, or in 10 or 20, I think that the most valuable asset we have in the Weaselhead/Glenmore area
2512 will remain the access to nature, to vistas of the reservoir and mountains and a place to recreate.

2513 Improve the pathways to make them accessible for all, wheel chairs, seniors electric carts. Allow people
2514 with pets on leash, on the trails, which might require more enforcement to keep the pets leashed.
2515 twining the bike / walking paths to move pedestrians away from speedy cyclists. The dirt trails are the
2516 only safe place to walk a dog in summer. stop building boardwalk trails and then raise the water level 2
2517 years later a wash them out. convert some trails in into to nordic ski in winter

2518 During the pandemic we saw a large influx of people using the weaselhead area which was both good
2519 and bad. It is nice for people to get out and enjoy wild spaces right in our city but too many people are
2520 not staying on the trails and are creating new trails and trampling the vegetation. We need to preserve
2521 the area for wildlife to be able to flourish in the next 5 - 10 years as the city grows and the park gets
2522 even busier.

2523 Biodiversity and being able to continue seeing moose on a regular basis as well as beavers, owls, bears
2524 etc. I would like to see more community engagement/watch to help enforce bylaws and preserve this
2525 treasure indefinitely. I fear that the park is being overrun by people without respect for the wildlife and
2526 other park users and are creating damage that will be irreversible. I don't mind there being an official
2527 nude beach, however, right now I see naked men everywhere, even walking on the trail.

2528 The park's biodiversity.

2529 "No ring road. It used to feel like there was nothing between you and the mountains when you were in
2530 the Weasilhead. Now you are just in the shadow of a large road with giant screen billboards and an
2531 artificially elevated river. It is no longer a natural space. Lots of effort is being spent to pretend that it
2532 is."

2533 Access for residents - residents have chosen to live near the parks so maintaining access is important -
2534 at the same time some level of user management is necessary to avoid excessive use and destruction of
2535 habitat such as building bike ramps etc

2536 The natural habitat - both as a refuge from the city and as great example of nature for all to observe,
2537 enjoy and learn from. The challenge will be to conserve biodiversity and a truly intact and healthy
2538 wetland environment.

2539 If it is preserved properly, it will be a triumph for the many species that rely on it. We have ruined Fish
2540 Creek and so many other natural areas that Calgary is supposed to be famous for. I grew up here and
2541 have moved back 20 years later. I am shocked at the decline of the parks and natural areas. Off-leash
2542 dogs, littering, dirt bikes everywhere... it's a free-for-all of destruction.

2543 Most valuable, but perhaps not viable, would likely be to get noise levels back down closer to pre-ring-
2544 road levels. Other thoughts: reduce stress on birds and wildlife by making everything off of the main
2545 paved path a dog-free zone, and enforcing that and on-leash requirements. Support bees, birds, bats,
2546 etc. through housing (if that's appropriate - I'm not an ecologist). Maintain and enforce the "no standup
2547 paddle boards on the reservoir" rule - sadly, more people = more damage to habitat.

2548

2549 The fact of its existence as a forested park space. We desperately need more forested park spaces, and
2550 it's much harder to create new ones than maintain existing ones. Don't y'all dare put another road
2551 through Weaselhead, that "TUC" is causing enough harm as is. Protect wildlife from the roads and
2552 create wildlife safe crossings, ensure the streams can flow with minimal intervention, and don't dare
2553 shrink the total forested area; expand it. Also, maintain the pathways to be safer in winter.

2554 A dog free environment, with all riparian off limits to dogs and their excrement.

2555 The access to 'wild' nature will be of paramount importance over the next 5,10 and 20 years. This park
2556 ,like Fish Creek and Nose Hill will be a refuge for people to escape from suburban life with traveling too
2557 far out of town.

2558 Ensuring the area is accessible and left undeveloped

2559 Re-wilding of the space

2560 The natural wildlife and plant life first and foremost, now and in the far future. Having access to as
2561 pristine as possible natural areas for citizen's mental health and leisure, without putting undue pressure
2562 on the wild inhabitants of the area with ensure future generations have the same opportunities.

2563 Trails, green space and recreational use of reservoir.

2564 "I believe there is a need to control the damage the beavers are doing in many areas in this zone,
2565 particularly with their destruction / chewing down trees along and on the banks of the reservoir. they
2566 are part of the biodiversity but with few natural predators around they seem to be causing an increasing
2567 amount of damage over the past number of years.

2568 Educational signage for species , types of birds etc in the area would be very nice"

2569 5 yr -Restoring natural setting. Formal and enforced access areas. 10 yr - wild setting with formal access
2570 areas with full enforcement of bylaws. 20 yrs - sustained commitment to vegetation renewal and full
2571 enforcement of bylaws.

2572 Sustainability

2573 "Follow through on the Habitat mangement practices as mentioned above.Make sure parking lot to
2574 entrance for Weasel Head at 37th doesn't get bigger to try control crowds in the area as no doubt it will
2575 get busier. More people means more littering and perhaps more dog pooh that owners may not pick
2576 up."

2577 Keeping it available to bike commuters, its part of the only N-S bike path in the SW

2578 "Many European parks have dining facilities. Prince's Island has a very good one. Consider offering this a
2579 s a possible option."

2580 Clean drinking water and flood protection provided by the river valley and flood plain.

2581 Continued access for all Calgarians.

2582 Enforcing "No Dogs" bylaw around the reservoir.

2583 If it is managed, protected, and not developed, the beautiful natural area will just increase in value, as
2584 the rest of the city grows and grows. Thinking of iconic world cities, their big urban parks are well
2585 known, loved and an attraction. Calgary should protect this precious resource, not have it as an
2586 afterthought.

2587 It's quiet when you get off the cement paths I think that is very valuable. I also wish there was an area
2588 for public swimming how does it make sense that you can swim in the elbow river before it gets to the
2589 weasel head but you can't swim in the Glenmore reservoir or the weasel head?

2590 As development continues around the Weaselhead area with the Tsuu T'ina Taza developments and
2591 increased use of the ring road, this area will continue to exist as an oasis in an increasingly loud and busy
2592 area.

2593 Peaceful and beautiful area to wander

2594 Intact natural spaces with durable year round access for residents. This is true for 5-10-20 years.

2595 My school took us there as kids to learn about the animals, and water shed, it was one of my favorite
2596 trips. I would hope there would continue to be access and good areas to bring students to learn.

2597 The continued use of it as a green space within the context of a 1+ million person City. It is great to have
2598 natural areas, but it should not be considered to be an off limits or restrictive area. We already have the
2599 national parks where preservation is above recreation. This needs to be viewed as an amenity and
2600 facilitate a multitude of users on and off pathway. This is a City which has a large population that
2601 prioritizes recreation and this should not be taken away.

2602 altered park areas, seasonal partial park/ trail, trail networks & dog free zones.

2603 Maintaining the natural area

2604 A piece of nature in the city. Access to a large body of water.

2605 Long term, access to nature and wildlife/biodiversity conservation.

2606 park protection designed in a way that citizens respect nature.

2607 Forever, its value will be as a healthy natural ecosystem.i

2608 Preserve the habit/ trees / animals and access

2609 Biodiversity, wildlife and intact nature.

2610 Less is more - less intervention and development is good.

2611 Preserving its current state.

2612 For the entire future i think the most valuable aspects of the weaselhead are the clean water (consistently
2613 monitored to see the effect of all the new upstream development), managing and maintaining the
2614 amazing trail system (to prevent erosion and vegetation destruction), protection of the wildlife that use
2615 the area for breeding and daily life that keep this reserve exciting for future generations.

2616 Better pathways that take people away from cars, mostly around Eagle Ridge community and Glenmore
2617 Trail. Better management and signage for the gravel trail network.

2618 Nature is a biggest asset and must be protected. Parks should be left natural and have minimal
2619 structures and man made items. Cut fields are nice for recreation activities, but should not be organized
2620 by courses or trails - rather left open for optional multi-use.

2621

2622 Natural areas with wildlife.

2623 Not to develop anything in this area or even close to this area

2624 Preserving the natural area so that wildlife and natural vegetation can continue to thrive. The
2625 Weaselhead/Glenmore are should continue to be a haven for Calgarians to enjoy and appreciate the
2626 natural world for forever.

2627 Do what we do well. If it means doing less that is ok. Eg. , so clear and maintain paths but if too
2628 expensive then have fewer of them.

2629 In all timeframes I think to have the area stay as natural as possible should be a priority

2630 Enforcement

2631 "Dog free zones. Separate paths for bike to protect the walkers and runners.

2632 More enforcement and presence- some sections of pathways feel isolated and unsafe. More direction
2633 and mileage signs. Say where things are like: 2km to

2634 Pump park. 4km to boat ramp and sailing. 8 Km to glenmore landing."

2635 keep dogs out of area

2636 Do what needs to be done for the protection

2637 "5 years - the smallest, single track walking trails and all the plants and animals 10 yrs - the smallest,
2638 single track walking trails and all the plants and animals 20 yrs - the wetlands, natural river banks and
2639 intact forests"

2640 Ensuring no habitat is lost, no new development, protecting waterways and wildlife corridors. More
2641 naturalizing and less mowed areas.

2642 I like it just the way it is!

2643 The most valuable thing that can be done is to help Calgarian's build a relationship with this space
2644 through education opportunities. What people do not understand they can not care about.

2645 Outdoor recreation opportunities within the City Limits.

2646 5 years to 20 years from now I feel the most valuable aspects of the park area will be to maintain a more
2647 natural environment that Calgarians can come to for generations. The large green areas in the city
2648 create places for a nice break from the concrete and buildings and form opportunities to educate about
2649 our natural habitats and encourage exercise and movement within our communities.

2650 Spacial conservation and ensuring that wildlife animals have access to enough area to thrive, while
2651 ensuring that those close to the community can explore the area as well to celebrate the beauty of the
2652 natural world. I think that, depending on Calgary's development, ensuring that a connection exists along
2653 the elbow river (up towards Griffith Woods Park) to make sure that wildlife has the space needed to
2654 truly prosper.

2655

2656 A natural gem within an urban environment

2657 In 5 years, I don't see much of a change, but in 10-20 years as Calgary's population grows, I can see this
2658 urban oasis being even more important to Calgarians who use it.

2659 Access. Do not limit access. People need to access natural areas. This is an urban park, DO NOT limit
2660 access or activities in the park. Plow the bike path in winter to increase access. If horses are permitted
2661 in the park, mtbikes also should be permitted in the park. Do not discriminate against user groups. TOO
2662 much signage also distracting and a waste.

2663 Creating a sustaineable and manageable plan that is financially feasible. Focusing on unused trail
2664 closure and perhaps seasonal use of certain areas to continue wildlife is great but the reality is that
2665 there is a giant highway bordering the park. Is there any analysis of the long term effects that this can
2666 create that can be leveraged from parks canada or fish creek park?

2667 protect the area from people who want to build new neighborhoods. It must be wildlife area only. I
2668 hope in 20 years still is protected and thriving the wild life there

2669 Access to nature will be most valuable. We must keep this a protected area - and even consider
2670 expanding its footprint. Have we considered moving Heritage Park somewhere else and reintegrating
2671 that land as protected reserve? Heritage Park creates an immense environmental impact and would do
2672 better if it was moved to the Stampede grounds. If we want to take Weaselhead/Glenmore seriously as
2673 a reserve then treat it as such.

2674 An intact, healthy ecosystem is the most important for all of the above milestones. This area is fragile
2675 and under intense pressure. If we can start changing the culture of usage and management now this will
2676 have huge value in the coming decades. In the face of biodiversity collapse and climate change areas like
2677 this have immense value. I hope we realize that now and make the right decisions.

2678 Don't understand this question.

2679 Preservation of healthy, thriving wildlife populations and diverse eco systems undamaged by humans
2680 and their dogs and bikes.

2681 I hope it is still a beautiful natural place. I value being able to be "in nature" even while in the city. I don't
2682 know much about the details of what conservation of biodiversity means for this location, but support
2683 its promotion and management!

2684 It's continued biodiversity if we do it right. Over time it is going to be more difficult to ensure wildlife can
2685 get safely in and out of the Weaselhead. Connectivity goes beyond the boundaries of the park and so
2686 needs to be considered when looking at potential developments.

2687 Most important and most valuable would be preservation of the opportunity to experience a natural
2688 and most importantly undeveloped environment. There is a development creep occurring in South
2689 Glenmore Park that in twenty years may completely obliterate any natural ambiance of the area. The
2690 last +-twenty years have seen the maintenance depot, Kinsman water park, bike pump track, memorial
2691 music fixture added to a pre-existing tennis court and equestrian polo field. When will it stop? When all
2692 gone

2693

2694 5 yrs: a place where people can go to connect with nature, admire it and recognize that it must be
2695 protected. 10 yrs: a safe habitat for wildlife and protection of the watershed to protect our drinking
2696 water. 20 yrs: As the city grows to the southwest, the extension of the park to the west will be required
2697 to maintain wildlife corridors and provide additional room for more people to enjoy the protected area,
2698 rather than increasing the use to a level of overuse in existing areas

2699 I would like Weaslehead to be more like Fish Creek Park - more trails, spreading people over a greater
2700 distance. More trails dedicated to different activities - splitting mountain bikes from strollers for
2701 instance.

2702 The greatest value will be derived if the municipality leaves the Weaselhead/Glenmore area alone ...
2703 nothing needs to be done - full stop. As a pedestrian, cyclist, photographer etc ... I've never experienced
2704 any inconvenience in the park areas and do not wish to see any further development (period). Leave
2705 the Weaselhead/Glenmore park area alone.

2706 The same things that are valuable now; nature and wildlife.

2707 Maintain the natural habitat.

2708 The inner city is rapidly losing trees and greenspace. It is funneling more and more people into the only
2709 remaining greenspaces such as river park and weaselhead. As a result, they are degrading quickly and
2710 have multiple conflicts. Its really hard to see happen now and I don't imagine it will improve in the
2711 future.

2712 Mostly leave things as they are with some minor adjustments as noted above

2713 Preserving highly naturalized areas easily accessible to Calgarians.

2714 Preserving the natural environment, especially for those who do not get to our mountain parks regularly

2715 Recreational space

2716 Over all the time horizons the most important thing is that it stays natural, free of garbage and poorly
2717 behaved visitors (and their dogs!) and is a space that we can continue to enjoy connection with nature
2718 and also to be used for children's education programs - bird watching, snowshoeing, canoeing, habitat
2719 studies etc. Did a lot of really cool outdoorsy class trips growing up in a small town in BC and that should
2720 be available to city kids too.

2721 Managing densification in adjacent communities. More people bring more pressure on the
2722 environment, more pets, more vehicles. This goal is in conflict with the city's desire to increase tax base
2723 in existing communities that are close in.

2724 Preservation of as much natural habitat as possible.

2725 It will always be the nature for me. Without the biodiversity in the Weaselhead, there will be nothing
2726 that separates it from just another green space in the city.

2727 Limiting useage.

2728 Leaving the park untouched so that wildlife, natural areas continue to co exist with responsible citizens

2729 As the city continues to grow these natural areas will become even more valuable and needed. It's
2730 important to be able to connect with nature when you live in an urban area. I worry about the
2731 degradation to the Weaselhead from the ring road's proximity—the noise alone really takes away from
2732 the experience.

2733 This is really a strange question. As the city gets denser and more congested it will become a more
2734 valued place to walk and enjoy nature as there will be fewer places that one can enjoy. The only way we
2735 can keep its value is to ensure it does not get developed into a manicured park full of pathways and no
2736 natural spaces that make it so special.

2737 Retain nature. Enhance or maintain safety. Don't increase parking. Education areas... re plants, animals,
2738 indigenous history, etc.

2739 That it still exists in a way that everyone can be outdoors enjoying nature while exploring

2740 Water. Water. Water.

2741 I hope to see as many or more animals and people accessing the area to respectfully share it with
2742 nature.

2743 The natural area. Parks in Calgary are becoming way too structured. Too many huge "safe" playgrounds,
2744 too much infrastructure In every single green space and park. There are already very few places in each
2745 quadrant that kids can be exposed to nature without leaving the city.

2746 As the city grows, new housing is increasingly dense and often comes with no access to pleasant outside
2747 space. As a result the city's green spaces become increasingly busy and a valuable asset we must
2748 protect. A balance is difficult and requires money, we must learn that our property taxes allow us to
2749 keep the things we value.

2750 I think the paved paths are very busy in the summer, lots of cyclists and pedestrians, it will be important
2751 for more pathways to be built elsewhere as the city grows so the park stays healthy/doesn't get
2752 damaged.

2753 To manage the park and try to keep its natural state requires user education and enforcement. Start
2754 with effective signage, close some areas, and have park ambassadors monitor the area. If this is done
2755 the areas biodiversity should be intact in 20 years.

2756 It's extremely important to protect the habitat for the indigenous wildlife. It's appropriate to fence off
2757 temporarily breeding/nesting areas for example for the long-term health and biodiversity of the park. I
2758 support the maintenance of the pathway system. your question about dog free zones is interesting. Back
2759 almost 20 years ago, we brought our family labrador with us on a walk. She sliced her paw on a broken
2760 beer bottle chard and required surgery. I've never brought a dog there since.

2761 Sustaining the natural environment as the population continues to increase and the usage will grow in
2762 the future. Calgary will continue to be a desirable place to live in years to come with it's access to the
2763 Rockies. We need to support our local environment from further development.

2764 We need to maintain the Weaselhead area as it is now, a natural area with no washroom buildings,
2765 picnic areas or fire pits. Just the pathway.

2766 Nature trails, canoe access

2767 I would like to see the park remain much as it is today, with unofficial pathways to be explored, lots of
2768 quiet areas to find solace, extensive hiking and bicycling pathways, and beautiful views.

2769 Trail network planning, so humans do not infringe on the wildlife that lives in the area.

2770 Five years, ten years, twenty years... I would hope that the area shows less human 'wear' than there is
2771 now

2772 Protect the space and the wildlife.

2773 Nature conservation (animals, trees, water) is key on all projected timelines.

2774 It will remain a Green space oasis as inner city densification increases population providing city folk with
2775 the opportunity to decompress and be in nature

2776 disc golf

2777 That it is the same as now, same as it has been for years and years.

2778 don't understand your question.

2779 For me being able to access the Weaselhead/Glenmore by the paths while still maintaining a habitat
2780 suitable for wildlife for the foreseeable future is the most valuable.

2781 If Calgary continues to grow, the Weaselhead/Glenmore area should be maintained as a natural oasis in
2782 the middle of an urban setting, and should also be maintained in a way that encourages more Calgarians
2783 to appreciate and recreate in nature.

2784 The preservation of wildlife habitats. We share the land with the wildlife, our usage of the area should
2785 keep this foremost in our thinking.

2786 What we have now is good. The recent recreation enhancements are great. Maybe mor if that.

2787 Walking & cycling trails. On-leash dog trails. Access to Weaselhead by kayak & canoe .

2788 More paved and gravel pathways and washrooms.

2789 Overuse as the City's population grows will present the greatest threat to the area. Some restrictions on
2790 use to allow the continuation of healthy biodiversity will be required. Educating the public on that need
2791 will be very important

2792 Altered park hours and wildlife friendly fencing(Like Fish Creek Park) would benefit the park. Educational
2793 signs would be useful for park users.

2794 Preservation of the weaselhead in a more natural state and the increased recreational use of both the
2795 north and south Glenmore parks.

2796 No dogs allowed, no charge to use park or parking

2797

2798 keeping the area as a natural area with the same paths and nature

2799 I hope that it will still be here for all the years to come.

2800 In terms of seeing results of the above actions - bylaw - start making people pay for infractions. Give up
2801 on the educate first. 5 yrs - dog free zones, seasonal park closures 10 yrs - naturalization, trail network
2802 planning 20 yrs - condition of the park will have improved as a result of all the actions collectively. They
2803 all matter. Just some are easy wins and others take more time

2804 Leave it natural and stop the building of skate parks etc

2805 That it's a natural wildlife park and not all mowed and groomed.

2806 Plan spaces for all to use and enjoy. There is a need for separate walking and cycling lanes in South
2807 Glenmore Park similar to North Glenmore Park. The current walking path is too busy and becomes
2808 dangerous as there are too many cyclists who pass when unsafe and have near collisions with other
2809 pathway users.

2810 Most valuable? Perhaps not to the majority...but it would be nice to see more 'accessible' areas for
2811 people taking care of handicapped persons that need to use wheelchairs.

2812 Keep it wild. Control usage so it does not degrade.

2813 Access to walkable nature

2814 Well maintained walking a cycling paths to encourage Calgarians to be active outdoors in as natural an
2815 area as possible. Same for 10 and 20 years

2816 Same - access to nature and wildlife living their as a result of a protected environment.

2817 We have to keep the area working. The development of the freeway was a tragedy in my mind. We need
2818 to do everything we can to mitigate damage from the construction and ongoing use of the new
2819 roadway. This includes rebuilding relationships with the indigenous peoples.

2820 Water protection. Wildlife habitat. Quiet places. But only if we limit human impacts.

2821 A preserved 'natural' area will always be of value. Granted it is not entirely natural as we have trails and
2822 we will be able to keep future generations aware of what this is all really about - the whole of life and
2823 not just human beings.

2824 Balance habitat preservation with Calgary's population growth. More density means the public will put
2825 more pressure on parks and natural areas. Need temporary closure of sensitive areas to rehabilitate and
2826 remove invasive species. Need lots of public education and engagement. Remove newly constructed
2827 stairs from the upper to the lower path at the point south east of the sailing club and restore to natural
2828 grassland. Avoid this type of development that can cause erosion & fragment wildlife paths

2829 "5 years - more clear management of space for habitat renewal and human use 10 years - habitat
2830 renewal 20 years - habitat protection"

2831 The trees will be the most valuable as they will help govern a healthy environment.

2832 Keeping it the same, maintaining what is there and leaving it as a path to the businesses in Glenmore
2833 landing. It's fine and doesn't need restriction beyond adding another lane for cyclists exclusively.

2834 Access to a pseudo foothills wilderness without the costs of going out of town to the west

2835 Hopefully it's as beautiful as it is now. With a strong support of wildlife & citizens being able to use it
2836 responsibly.

2837 "Diversity of available activities and easy access to natural areas is its greatest asset but I do worry about
2838 it being loved to death as the city grows in this area with ring road based housing developments but
2839 there has to be a balance of continue access and preserving the natural beauty. Perhaps a better
2840 delineation of public access areas and wildlife corridors would help. The continuous path around whole
2841 area is one of it best features and I would hate to see that lost though"

2842 A safe location for wildlife, and a natural area to enjoy by Calgarians. Having a balance of recreational
2843 areas for friends and families above and a more regulated, monitored, natural area allowing for low
2844 impact enjoyment of the natural beautiful world will enhance the flora and fauna and lives of Calgarians.
2845 It is so nice to see the increase in diversity of people using the park since the pandemic, but this requires
2846 some education and potentially some regulation and limits to avoid harm.

2847 Natural environment is the most important thing in that area. Vegetation and wildlife and water.

2848 Naturalization, stewardship events and education paired with enforcement.

2849 I think, for the near and distant future, maintaining the health and biodiversity of the area is key.

2850 Dogs must be on leash and under control. That is my only concern.

2851 Preserve its natural beauty. Better facilitate multiple activity types through separated pathways, better
2852 signage and public education. And definitely no more parking lots!

2853 I think the strongest message will be that you set this area aside as a nature preserve and kept your
2854 promise for future generations.

2855 The water land intersection and access by people who respect and understand their impact on this
2856 beautiful natural area and the importance of protecting our water resource.

2857 Progressively more green areas, enhanced wildlife habitat.

2858 Nature conservation and access and maintenance of walking trails.

2859 Replanting of native vegetation has succeeded and the new highway now has a mature green wall
2860 isolating the park.

2861 A natural space that can be used by animals and humans.

2862 Close the park, drain the water and remove the dam. Leave the Elbow valley like it used to be

2863 The areas that are naturalized to their pre park status.

2864 Continuing to minimize impact from new ring road

2865 Access for recreational activities. More trails.

2866 Seeing the results of the Stoney trail ring road on this area. The noise pollution in the weaselhead flats
2867 can be loud.

2868 "5 yrs - create a management plan that is a common sense plan that improves the experience for
2869 everyone. 10 yrs - implement the plan 20 yrs - review the plan and adjust based on population
2870 increases"

2871 Preserving natural habitat

2872 Recreation opportunities in a wild area easily accessible to Calgarians.

2873 The skating oval is a good idea and should be continued. Would be good to have a warming shelter to
2874 use in winter . Perhaps a snack bar or cafe? But would also hope the natural aspects / environment
2875 could be preserved if there is a way of keeping the bears and cougars out.

2876 The access into a natural environment.

2877 Educated accessibility, with emphasis on protection of wildlife. Fines imposed on those that damage the
2878 area or endanger wildlife. No access from sundown to sunrise so that wildlife can freely roam the area
2879 without human intervention.

2880 "5 years. Developing bike paths walking paths. More courts. Education. re forestation. No more fire pits.
2881 Enforcement 10 years 1"

2882 Preservation of ecosystems

2883 The most valuable thing about the Weaselhead now, and hopefully in 5, 10 and 20 years, is the natural
2884 habitat for many resident and migratory birds and animal species. With constant human encroachment
2885 on these types of spaces, we need to treasure and protect the ones we have left.

2886 "Assurance and focus on keeping it natural for the wildlife. The opportunity for calgarians to experience
2887 so much diversity in our own city is most important. In 5 years it would be cool to have easily accessible
2888 public information about all species at risk in the park and which should be along with plans to protect
2889 and support them. In 20 years I would hope there be a culture shift where the park is wildlife centered
2890 design where humans are fitting into their world rather than the opposite."

2891 THIS AREA NEEDS TO BE DEVELOPED FOR RECREATIONAL ACITITES WHILE STILL MAINTAINING THE
2892 ENNVIRONMENT.

2893 The quiet and the wildlife and trees.

2894 Water and naturalized areas. These to me are key for humans and wildlife, especially as the climate
2895 continues to change over the long term.

2896 Easy access to nature for the surrounding communities, and easy access to rec activities. I think the
2897 Eastern edge of glenmore that feeds into Sandy Beach could serve as a great cycling feeder into

2898 downtown from the SW. Outside of that I think the walking paths and park spaces in South and North
2899 Glenmore park will continue to see increased usage so planning for that is key.

2900 As climate change continues to advance and challenge biodiversity, it's incredibly important to maintain
2901 respectable access to nature for education and engagement. I would like to see more
2902 signage/information/education on the impact this has on Calgary, the water supply, and natural areas to
2903 create generational education. This will be even more important as the Tsuu'Tina area continues to pave
2904 the adjacent nature area.

2905 Management of cumulative effects to retain a functioning ecosystem. Water in particular - quantity,
2906 impacts of changing reservoir levels, ring road impacts

2907 The access to natural areas within the city is priceless. Please don't close the park or restrict access

2908 Access to natural areas with dirt trails within the city. Watershed protection for the city.

2909 Protecting what it has so it can continue to grow and shelter wildlife, and secondarily, be a place for
2910 humans to retreat to join the quiet. But it is important that the human part is secondary.

2911 We have seen a massive upsurge in nature goers, anecdotally. Our landscapes and wildlife will continue
2912 to lose quality and vibrancy unless measures are taken to protect it. Even the fencing idea - previously
2913 people have always shirked the need for fencing and plowed right through sensitive areas. So, if the
2914 fencing is a mediocre deterrent, then we need some sort of other measures.

2915 I want to have access to this area to share with generations to come. It is a wonderful opportunity to
2916 experience nature in the city, fostering appreciation and understanding of future generations.

2917 As the city grows ever outward, more communities in the outskirts make private resort style parks for
2918 only their community members. These public natural parks will be extremely precious areas where
2919 everyone can access nature and recreational opportunities on dirt (like we were meant to). The city
2920 should not be completely sacrificing great trail recreational opportunities for extremely fragmented and
2921 poorly enforced wildlife habitat. T

2922 Maintain or improve the biodiversity of the Weaselhead.

2923 A place for nature, protection and education, the water

2924 The whole green space is a gem allowing people to enjoy the outdoors. This is an urban park, so people
2925 should not be so restricted that they cannot enjoy it. There are lots of rural places for wildlife to
2926 proliferate. The Weaselhead has lots of areas for wildlife between the trails. Most people never access
2927 those areas. I hope that will not change.

2928 The most valuable thing about this area now and into the future would continuing to protect and
2929 maintain it as a natural habitat zone with focus on what is best for both flora and fauna in the area. This
2930 statement should apply to 5, 10 & 20 years into the future and beyond.

2931 No further development of housing in the area. Planting more trees. Less mowing and grass
2932 maintenance. No enlargement of parking spaces. Providing more park spaces and green spaces within
2933 existing and new housing developments so people don't have to travel to access nature! The bike path is

2934 a bit of a race track... perhaps some traffic control devices like gates on the bike paths? To slow bike
2935 traffic?

2936 Most valuable would be to protect what we have. There are rules in place wrt mountain bikes, dogs etc
2937 but since they are rarely enforced some people see no reason to follow them. Also education of the
2938 public of why these rules or guidelines are important would go a long way in helping to protect the park.
2939

2940 Continued support of biodiversity.

2941 Most valuable will be the challenge to preserve the existing biodiversity in the area as the city grows and
2942 area becomes over-used. Education on overall biodiversity is needed - much more than animals and
2943 wildlife, but also vegetations, insects, riparian areas.

2944 The fact that, in a continued protected state, it will continue to provide safe habitat for flora/fauna; it
2945 will provide users with that connection to nature; the wetlands will provide a lifeline for the
2946 inhabitants.

2947 Protecting the wildlife and trees. Limit trails to a few select corridors.

2948 Keep it as natural as possible, please.

2949 Planting more trees.

2950 Most valuable is the large forested area adjacent to a river

2951 Spawning areas for the various fish species which reside in the Glenmore Reservoir.

2952 Preserving it, minimizing any new development around the park. Investing in habitat protection

2953 I do love the renewed support for outdoor recreational activities (i.e. skate track, ski grooming, disc golf)
2954 that has brought more visitors to the landscaped areas of the park, but I want to ensure that wildlife and
2955 natural areas are also respected and maintained.

2956 "5yr - Walk, run and bike through this area without having to deal with dogs, dog feces and poop bags
2957 littered through the area. 10 yr Walking and running through the area with lots of opportunity to see the
2958 flora and fauna of the area. Some mountain biking on specific trails. Pets staying on the paved pathways,
2959 on leash. 20 years - Controlled access and limited parking to keep the trails in good shape. Self
2960 propelled travel on the dirt trails. E-bikes and dogs stay on the paved pathways."

2961 "5 years I hope to see that the area becomes a dark sky preserve. 10 years - the owls have been
2962 protected by planting trees that will keep them away from the new road. 20 years - accessible to my
2963 grandchildren so they can enjoy the park that 2 generations of our family have already used"

2964 Fresh water, and green space for fitness activities around the kayak/rowing/outrigger/hiking
2965 community. The wildlife is active, with beavers up through the weaselhead flats, and occasional deer.
2966 My concern would be the distortions, where some of the visitors are specifically feeding birds around
2967 the weaselhead flats for pictures. In 10 years time, the city will be bigger, and may need an additional
2968 watersports park area to avoid overloading the reservoir.

2969 Should increase non-motorized access and connectivity by building a MUP connection through TAZA to
2970 Discovery Ridge/Griffith Woods.

2971 The green space in the middle of the city is the most valuable aspect to me. Though amenities are great,
2972 natural areas are most important. It is a high use area, so maintenance and prohibition of certain
2973 activities (off trail biking and off leash dogs) will be key.

2974 Education. Ensuring people are educated about how to treat the park, the plants, and the animals.

2975 "I would love to see more wildlife, more naturalization, more programs for people to learn to connect
2976 with the wildlife and plantlife in the park, more accessible (read: low cost, and easy to register for)
2977 programs for people to get out on the water through canoeing and kayaking, etc. I would love to see
2978 some kind of noise reduction barriers so that the park isn't as affected by noise coming off Stoney Trail."

2979 Control of access to the park's sensitive areas, specifically access by cyclists and dogs which tend to have
2980 a high impact.

2981 For many Albertans, natural habitat and biodiversity in the Weaselhead/Glenmore area are more
2982 important than the Saddledome, Jubilee Auditorium and Glenbow Museum combined. Preservation and
2983 conservation of natural habitat and AMAZING biodiversity should have the highest level of protection.
2984 Ridiculous development of river and stream valleys, floodplains and wetlands in favour of industrial and
2985 residential areas in the face of climate change is risky mismanagement. Global biodiversity crisis NOW.

2986 Preserving it as is.

2987 I think this city park will continue to be valuable to Calgarians in the coming years and decades: as a
2988 place to enjoy nature and one that is accessible to the diverse needs of the community. I hope this
2989 continues to be a place Calgarians can freely access and enjoy, a park where the City balances preserving
2990 the biosphere but also welcomes its citizens.

2991 This question is not worded very well, but I think the most valuable ATTRIBUTE will be the park's
2992 accessibility/interface to nature, if it is well protected.

2993 Nature - protection of local plants and nature. The Weaselhead becoming an urban night sky reserve
2994 would be a source of pride for the city, and a biodiversity exemplar.

2995 If a natural area is restricted by too many prohibitions then people just ignore the prohibitions or are
2996 forced to overuse unrestricted areas. There are more and more people in Calgary and Covid has taught
2997 use to be outdoors. City of Calgary needs to work on making more park facilities available throughout
2998 the city and access to natural areas to families, dog walkers (dogs on leash), bikers and other wheel
2999 based users including wheelchairs. Put in more disc golf courses too.

3000 Walk in access to nature

3001 After the big expansion of parking in he last few years I would se the park remaining much as it is in the
3002 next 20 years.

3003 No further development. If possible contemplate seperating walkers from bikers.

3004 I think going forward 5, 10, or 20 years from now the park should expand the useable area for the
3005 public. The population will increase and there will be a need for more space. If the area is managed

3006 properly humans and wildlife can coexist quite well. What I'm afraid will happen is that an over
3007 aggressive biodiversity plan will only satisfy a select group and ultimately restrict public use and
3008 enjoyment.

3009 Banning all dogs from the area

3010 I think continued access to a natural area (recognizing that it is not pristine) in close proximity to
3011 Calgary, especially the river and riparian areas, is valuable.

3012 The ability to access a sort of "wilderness" kind of environment so close to the city

3013 All of the above

3014 Kayaking

3015

3016 [Question 8: Is there anything else you'd like us to know about the](#)
3017 [Weaselhead/Glenmore](#) are?
3018

3019 "As Calgary continues to grow, large wilderness green spaces will be more necessary. There are very
3020 few large parks in Calgary. I fear the existing ones will become "beaten down" by overuse*. Ideally I'd
3021 like to see other large park-like areas set aside for future use. Eg. the City-owned golf courses.*in my
3022 opinion the provincial park, Fish Creek Park is an example of a "beaten down" park. The result of way
3023 too many visitors going to a jewel of a park and wearing it down."

3024 The history before the park, the military, the Weekend days before the Park was established, the wildlife
3025 information on plants, animals, insects, water organisms

3026 It is a refuge in an ever-expanding city and needs to be valued. The SWCRR is an example of the how the
3027 value was not placed on environmental concerns and we need to do better.

3028 We are so fortunate to have such an area in our city.

3029 please no personal use drones in the North Glenmore Park area and the Weaselhead

3030 "It is such a special place I wish we had more of. All of the construction that has gone on around it has
3031 felt frustrating and backwards and we hope that instead of continuing to develop, we can undevelop
3032 and protect what we have.

3033 An important note for us is that having wild places like this that are accessible to all have a great positive
3034 impact on the mental health of everyone. We want to see more youth and children experiencing the
3035 benefits of more time in the wild."

3036 It is a gem within the city and very much beloved by me and my friends.

3037 Avoid unnatural impacts from horses, dogs, & invasive human use. :) Note the Calgary Metropolitan
3038 Region Board is proposing setbacks from rivers to the 1 in 200 year flood level so the City should work to
3039 that target (step back from the river as opportunity arises). Ensure NO motorized boats on the reservoir.

3040 The Springbank Reservoir upstream will remove the beneficial rejuvenation to biodiversity, locally &
3041 downstream (also in terms of time) from high water from a more than a 1 in 5 year event

3042 I would like to see the encouragement of ethical citizen science activities within the park. We should
3043 encourage people to engage with their environment, learn about it, and to become stewards of it. This
3044 will require City of Calgary staff to have a better understanding of what citizen science is and how it can
3045 be used as a tool rather than just an activity conducted by people. We encourage participation while
3046 leaning into the greater knowledge being provided by park users.

3047 This is one of my favourite places to be. I find comfort there. Don't fence everything off so I can't enjoy
3048 it. Construction in the area can deter animal friends who just want to be. I like to quietly walk on the
3049 back pathways, less frequented by people. Keep those accessible. Yeah. No races or public running
3050 events in Weaselhead. They disturb the animals and people don't clean up after themselves. Perhaps a
3051 garbage bin or two along main Weaselhead pathways.

3052 We have observed disrespectful behaviour by naive users ie individuals dancing on beaver dams,
3053 individuals blasting music, groups partying wherever they feel. This has to be prevented if we are to
3054 protect the biodiversity of this precious wildlife corridor.

3055 I think the path way will need to be divided into a cycle and walking path the entire route around the
3056 rez. That planning should begin as the park is awesome and will be more valuable as time passes

3057 Extremely valuable area that needs good stewardship. Thank you for moving forward with a
3058 management plan.

3059 This is a valuable special space for the North Glenmore community, keep it open and accessible

3060 Allowing horse use to continue is valuable for those of us that use it.

3061 "This area is a gem and should be honoured, respected and treated with the upmost care for the wildlife
3062 and nature. We need to understand the entertainment value is to walk quietly and observe and accept
3063 this beauty - not commercialize it any further because once that happen there is no going back. I think
3064 educating users is the key to respect what is here ... once one realizes human impact one can learn to
3065 take care and take responsibility for it not just used it and leave big big footprints"

3066 Please be courageous. Reducing hours, access to paths or areas for dogs won't initially be popular but
3067 they are necessary. Wildlife don't have a lot of choice now for alternatives. We do. I have seen off
3068 leash dogs allowed to harass coyotes on the ice and people also disturbing wildlife. We can do much
3069 better with positive reinforcement and education. City run ambassadors would be terrific.

3070 "Yes, its one of my favorite spots to go for a nice walk any time of the year, in peak summer however,
3071 1. Mosquitoes need to be managed better (Bringing in fish to feed on larvae?)

3072 2. Most cyclists are very considerate but there often times when a few over zealous speed demons go
3073 zipping past pedestrians and I find that very annoying and dangerous - that speed limit sign at the
3074 beginning of the pathway means nothing to them. They must somehow be made to understand the
3075 need to slow down."

3076 IT IS A TREASURE! It is so beautiful, just the way it is. Please do not over develop it. Not everyone can
3077 afford the gas to travel out of the city for green space and a water view. You walk the jackrabbit trail and
3078 you could be in a forest anywhere in Canada. But it needs PROTECTION and ENFORCEMENT OF
3079 CURRENT BYLAWS. How about a positive Team GlenWeasle approach, T-shirts, "lets all work together to
3080 protect this amazing natural area". PS: Kite making day/Fathers Day events were awesome !

3081 We love it and have for 30 years.

3082 The city has attempted to inform the public about the bylaws in this natural area but many of the signs
3083 are confusing. For example one sign says dogs are allowed only on pathway but it is at a point entering
3084 the trail system. The sign needed only one more word, that being the word PAVED in front of word
3085 pathway. People don't seem to be able to separate trails and pathway.

3086 Tsuut'ina trail construction and associated wetland destruction has likely negatively impacted hydrologic
3087 and hydrogeologic contributions to the wetlands in the Weaselhead and should be monitored and
3088 mitigated.

3089 Connect it to other green spaces like Griffith Woods.

3090 Don't screw up the little good we have left in Calgary with this revitalization.

3091 Paths for cycling, dog-walking are a good idea but there needs to be strong enforcement of on-leash
3092 dogs, off-path cycling. Seasonal closures are great both for the wildlife and for the ground. Bike tracks,
3093 dog and people prints on mud take a long time to heal. Volunteers are great if they know what they are
3094 doing. I like signs but I am not sure that they are read by many people and are a target for graffiti artists
3095 which is expensive to fix.

3096 I have long lamented the lack of informative signage regarding what uses are permitted in what areas,
3097 especially when it comes to dogs. It's not scientific but I have found the farther off the main paved path
3098 people & their dogs go, the more likely they are to have them off leash. I would like to see the Beaver
3099 pond area rehabilitated after all the damage caused by the Ring Road construction. It really is a smelly
3100 mess there. It would also be nice to have some noise barriers.

3101 I am a bit surprised that the former reserve lands that are not between the new freeway and 37 ST and
3102 the regional pathway are not shown in this plan. By opening that fairly large area for the public and
3103 recreation, you may actually take some pressure of the lower wetland areas.

3104 There are volunteer organizations working in the weaselhead area, such as the weaselhead preservation
3105 society, that deserve recognition and support for their efforts to maintain the natural area.

3106 Put people first.

3107 You have to make people aware of the laws regarding animals. Young adults are abusing this area and
3108 some are even walking around without clothes as I was told that there is nudist beach somewhere???

3109 Please protect everything native to that area. Nature will not miss mankind who doesn't.

3110 Please get rid of the access/use of a nude beach. Inappropriate and not necessary in the city of Calgary.
3111 No one needs to do that, and no one needs to accidentally see that.

3112 Please add wildlife bridges across Stoney Trail to the west of the park. Deer are frequently hit and killed
3113 on this new stretch of road. This road had created a new barrier to wildlife and they can no longer roam
3114 from the park to the west as they once could.

3115 Plant more larch!

3116 There are a number of cyclists who use the pathway system around the reservoir, unsafely. This
3117 pathway system is not suitable for road racers who are using it for training. I've seen many near misses
3118 with people and this poses a risk to wildlife, too. Perhaps an educational campaign and intermittent
3119 enforcement of speed limits could help. In some areas, the speed limit should be reduced.

3120 Occasionally nudists are on the other side of the river from where their area is.

3121 The global chopper gets the best pics there. They spotted 7 moose at one time a couple of months ago.
3122 The camera is incredibly powerful one heck of a zoom lens. They don't share where they spot animals. I
3123 think they saw some wild horses a few weeks ago. Or unless horses are still allowed to graze there. For
3124 me this park is 2nd to k country.

3125 Stop pesticides

3126 Dredge the lake

3127 It works just the way it is.

3128 It's frustrating that by-law doesn't crack down on the perverts who use the park as a sex cruising ground
3129 or nude beach, but will come down hard on dog owners letting their pets take a dip. The city's priorities
3130 are completely out of whack. You need to stop only listening to the rich seniors who live adjacent to the
3131 river/reservoir for the greater good of the rest of the SW.

3132 The boardwalks need to be addressed- need a long term solution

3133 I am saddened by the ring road development which has affected that movement of bears, moose, and
3134 other animals. Recently a bear that has lived in the Weaselhead for 10 years without issue, came into
3135 Lakeview and was shot out of a tree after eating pumpkins. I think the animals sort of get trapped in the
3136 corridor because of the road

3137 Keep it natural! Keep its biodiversity! Limit activities to protect its natural environment.

3138 Please do not stop horse usage. There needs to be better signage so people know we are allowed in the
3139 area.

3140 I know of a number of horse riders that use this area and are likely unknown to park management, many
3141 of these have used it for decades and quietly ride there, knowing that other users have no
3142 understanding of their rights and privileges to be there and enjoy this special place.

3143 Humans need a nature to help calm, resettle and bring balance to thier lives. It is a shame that you are
3144 thinking of excluding dog people. They tend to be big on walking and they enjoy be out with thier fur
3145 friends.

3146 I've lived in Calgary and Alberta for nearly 50 years. In that time I've watched every park I'm familiar with
3147 (both municipal and provincial) deteriorate, some massively - despite being nominally protected, though

3148 obviously not protected from the very people whose job it is to do the protecting. Changes or
3149 'developments' - however minor they may seem - add up over time. This seems difficult to understand
3150 for many. Just leave the park alone, and come down hard on those who ignore the rules.

3151 Wildlife and nature protection should be the primary consideration before development for humans.
3152 No commercial development should ever be brought into the park.

3153 Please keep current bylaws re no dog use and no biking. Except regional pathway.

3154 It is the Weaselhead that draws me to come, not so much Glenmore Park itself, whether the North or
3155 the South sections, though it does appear well utilized by joggers and cyclists, and I've seen horses and
3156 riders use some of the sections in South Glenmore which was fun to see. I like most of the ideas
3157 suggested for the Weaselhead, and can support those for the long term.

3158 congratulations on the work that goes into this area,,

3159 Signage needs improvement to clarify that dogs and cyclists are permitted only on PAVED paths -
3160 current signs do not make it clear that "Pathways" refers to paved pathway and not all paths.

3161 Yes, even though this was not part of the question. I think there should be more publicly accessible
3162 bathrooms available in the Weaselhead/Glenmore area. Somehow the amount of dog poo needs to be
3163 mitigated, but I don't know how. Sorry.

3164 "We hope you are consulting experts like Kevin van Tighem, author of ""Heart Waters: Sources of the
3165 Bow River, 2015, in your planning.

3166 We have lived in Lakeview since 1973, 50 years!, and know and love every corner of the Weaselhead. It
3167 is the most important ""natural"" space in our lives."

3168 Yeah, don't screw it up. Sounds like you're trying to micro-manage a resource that is currently working
3169 very well. I'm not interested in having my access to this area limited in the name of some woke eco-
3170 diversity project. If you need to limit access to "sensitive " areas, make it as limited and unobtrusive as
3171 possible.

3172 The idea of building wildlife fencing to protect sensitive areas....I would direct you to look back at what
3173 occurred in fish creek park back in the 1970's. The area between Parkland and Midnapore where fencing
3174 was built to protect the great blue heron nesting site and within 5 years the huron had left and never
3175 returned. The investment of all the fencing and signage and interpretive viewing centre that was built,
3176 all to become wasted expense. Then the area sat fenced off and unusable for years.

3177 Maintain the pathways. Sometimes they are full of holes and cracks, or the asphalt is crumbled and
3178 fallen. It's dangerous.

3179 I have been going to the Weaselhead/Glenmore area since I was a toddler and am now 54. I have
3180 always thought of it as my "large backyard". As a child, I didn't realized what a special place it is, but as
3181 an adult I now know how truly special places like these are and want to see it protected.

3182 It's a great park, a real treasure. Enforce the rules around dogs and bikes please. Dog waste is gross and
3183 dogs shouldn't be running around off-leash near the reservoir but there is little to no enforcement.

3184 Perhaps some dedicated winter trails for cross country skiing or fatbiking

3185 People still need to have access to mowed space for picnics, etc. This area is well used by our immigrant
3186 families.

3187 It's so noisy now with stoney being built, did the city not plan for this, terribly disappointment t.

3188 QUIT BUILDING. LEAVE IT NATURAL!!!

3189 Garbage and dog-droppings contaminate the water and soil here; park users need to be held more
3190 accountable for their actions. Anything people/pets bring into the area should also be removed by them
3191 - users shouldn't be relying on City of Calgary garbage bins for disposal.

3192 I have found the pathway signs in the Weasilhead to be devisive and out of touch with the users of the
3193 area. On many days everyone I encounter in the area is doing something that violates the rules (dogs,
3194 bikes, feeding critters, allegedly closed areas). Who do you think the users are? One of the most comical
3195 aspects is that one of the west meadow signs is 100 meters from where it is supposed to be.

3196 Please leave the Weaselhead alone, there is no need for "management" that will only destroy the
3197 natural aspect of the park.

3198 There are a few residents in Lakeview who live along the park who think they own the park. One
3199 resident demanded that the disc golf course go because it was near his place. This person always let's his
3200 dog out into the park to defecate in it. Privileged doesn't mean breaking bylaws. More monitoring of this
3201 activity needs to be done

3202 You do great work already, which is why the park is so popular! This popularity needs to be managed so
3203 that the park is not overrun and impacted in a negative way in the long run. Fencing in natural areas that
3204 are more sensitive and providing pathways/trails that are wide enough to concentrate human access is
3205 really important. Currently the bridge over the Elbow River is not wide enough and the same can be said
3206 for the pathway that connects to it on each side. Widening or twinning this will help

3207 It's an incredibly special place, and the City should consider appropriate human restrictions to better
3208 protect the species that call it home, and better educate visitors about its rich biodiversity, and
3209 importance as a wildlife preserve, and water supply area. It should be re-wilded as much as possible.

3210 The river took a major course correct a number of years ago will likely happen again. Spending money in
3211 understanding and monitoring the wildlife at the weaselhead will probably provide valuable insights on
3212 how best to minimize impact on the wildlife there. Natural wildlife corridors ie Elbow River and others
3213 not yet identified should be respected and mitigation measures implemented where appropriate.

3214 Dog owners need to be accountable for their animals and need to clean up after them. Not everyone
3215 wants to come in contact with an off leash dog.

3216 No use putting bylaws unless enforcement is part of plan. Biking needs to be kept out of the
3217 Weaselhead .. every evening I am there, I see fat bikes ripping around. Also dogs on the reservoir shore
3218 , in and out of the water, swimmers jumping off bridge and waders in same area. If the intention is to
3219 limit access to areas or at specific times, be prepared to enforce.

3220

3221 Hard to limit people going to this area, but sometimes it is too crowded with walkers.

3222 Weaselhead natural area requires high level protection of natural habitat and species. Glenmore area
3223 maintain picnic areas, pathways, benches and buffer to prevent city encroachment. Have public
3224 meetings for proper fulsome engagement

3225 "Would be great to have one biking trail through the woods
3226 -separate bike/walk paths"

3227 Need enforcement of uncontrolled dog owners

3228 We are glad there is awareness that the area is being destroyed by over use and misuse. Excessive bike
3229 traffic and electric bikes is driving people off the paved paths and into the natural areas - dogs and their
3230 feces are all through the park now, including along and in the waterways.

3231 Support designation as a Nocturnal Preserve.... Protect the night sky. Promote light reduction in the
3232 surrounding communities and businesses.

3233 The survey above mentions rehabilitating underused trails and areas. Taking the trail away that leads to
3234 the clothing-optional area would give the appearance to the City trying to take the clothing optional
3235 area away, and it would effectively doing exactly that. It would result in people using the trail anyways,
3236 as well as promote trespassing on treaty 7 land to access the clothing-optional area. The City would
3237 need to provide a new location for people to use.

3238 It is a park so let's use it that way. We need to keep it as is and not change things that require constant
3239 upkeep.

3240 "This space is not alone. Fishcreek, Nose Hill, Nose Creek are just a few areas we can do better. I'm an
3241 expert in native bird species here in Calgary. I would offer any assistance required from the City of
3242 Calgary with this project or others. I have worked with [personally identifying information removed]
3243 from the City Parks Division and I have established the only Purple Martin active colony here in Calgary
3244 in 50+ years. Please check out my website for further details. [personally identifying information
3245 removed] "

3246 Keep the area wild. There are a lot of parks in Calgary where folks can jog, walk the dog, bike, etc. Keep
3247 this area for the wildlife and those that respect the wildlife and their habitats. Ban dogs if people cannot
3248 keep them on leash.

3249 The City's lack of enforcement of dog related bylaws has been a dismal failure. In the Weaselhead and
3250 Glenmore areas I have seen dogs roaming paths unleashed and uncontrolled thereby putting cyclists
3251 and pedestrians at risk, pooping in the wilderness with no pickup by the owner, and dogs without collars
3252 (probably unregistered). I have never seen a Bylaw Officer on the pathways. I like the idea of
3253 remediating low use trails BUT high use informal trails should be formalized with proper structure.

3254 There is an by urgent need to slow cars down in Glenmore Park - many do not drive 30km/h. Could we
3255 use speed bumps like in Bowness park or other ideas?

3256 Have seen cougars and coyotes in this area. Should have fencing and/ or signage to protect children,
3257 dogs, and animals listed above

3258 Resist the urge to allow more uses or development. This should be a natural space where biodiversity is
3259 cherished and the ecosystem is protected.

3260 You are ruining the park. Leave it alone, stop the development of it. Stop making it more attractive to
3261 more people it can't take the pressure.

3262 "Get a restaurant on the water. Make the bike pump park bigger. Basketball courts and soccer field with
3263 nets. A pool would be awesome."

3264 Many families and seniors enjoy connecting with nature and walking on the smaller trails. But when
3265 everyone is travelling on one multi-use pathway, cyclists speed past at high speeds. While there is a
3266 must for accommodating cyclists, we should acknowledge that there is a safety risk for walkers and to a
3267 lesser extent the environment on these narrow trails. I think it would be helpful to look into widening
3268 these high traffic trails without damaging the environment, or mitigating high speeds.

3269 This is an incredibly beautiful area which must be carefully preserved and treasured.

3270 If you aren't planning on enforcing new rules, area closures, etc, then there's no point in making any
3271 changes or spending any money on a new management plan. If you are serious about making changes,
3272 please make sure you serious about ticketing violators.

3273 It would likely not exist if it were not for the Glenmore dam.

3274 It seems like human traffic has increased quite a bit, possibly due to the better accessibility of the area
3275 and improvements made to Glenmore park (e.g. bike skills park, playground improvements). Also, while
3276 I understand the restrictions for dogs on the trails, as a female solo runner who uses this area almost
3277 daily, I would very much appreciate being able to bring my dog with me for safety.

3278 In my opinion we should leave it as natural and untouched as possible for as long as possible. I very
3279 much like the option of walking off the paths there and so I value keeping the park open to that too.

3280 I think it's great the way it is. Don't overthink it, let people enjoy it.

3281 I have observed dogs off leash in the field near the parking lot on several occasions. I love this park.

3282 This is an area we are privileged to be a part of and visit - we do not have dominion or 'rights' to it. It is a
3283 privilege and one we should care for so it continues to exist.

3284 "I am enjoying the new recreational areas. (Ping pong, Telescopes, skating and curling.) Do not want to
3285 see them extended into the natural areas and am more in support of naturalizing the underused areas.
3286 Need to be more careful with the size/frequency of events allowed in the park as some seem to really
3287 restrict the general public access and use in the summer."

3288 Keep it raw. No paved walkways. Absolutely no dirt bikes, no fat tire bikes. Open only to hikers,
3289 runners, and walkers and dog walkers. Have strategically placed doggie do and garbage receptacles.
3290 No horses.

3291 "Less restrictions on dogs and bikes. Open weaslehead up for biking and taking dogs."

3292 Keeping the regional pathway free from light intrusion will be important. There is no need for fixed
3293 lights outside the parking lot area.

3294 It really is a special place to a lot of people. When I went there many years ago as a middle-school
3295 student I was able to discover my love of nature and I knew there was a place I could go to rediscover it
3296 whenever I needed.

3297 We need to stop encroaching and then punishing wildlife when they visit our residential streets. Would
3298 like to see natural area with footpaths where I don't meet a speeding cyclist coming in the opposite
3299 direction.

3300 "I really like the addition of the bike path on the reservoir side of the golf course. This area is so pleasant
3301 and sunny. The hill at the south end of Weaselhead Flats could really use some proactive design
3302 upgrades - that whole section from the flats & washout up to the ridge have needed so many repairs
3303 which doesn't seem sustainable and can also be quite dangerous."

3304 What happened to hothead beaver pond area at the SE side. What was once interesting habitat seems
3305 have been demolished.

3306 I love the area. I love stopping to take photos or just a rest break while I'm going through the park. I also
3307 love how I can traverse a safe pathway loop of the city with my bicycle and the park is in that loop.

3308 Just keep the trees and the bike path and I'll be happy.

3309 It would be great to preserve the current trail system in the Weaslehead flats.

3310 There is even the occasional mountain lion in the park. I encountered 5 years ago. I think it was after the
3311 deer as it was in the area where I mostly see the deer.

3312 There is grest enviro organizations and signage already. This park needs more than education to be
3313 successful in its conservation needs

3314 Please don't get carried away with romanticized ideas or indigenous lore to the exclusion of non-
3315 indigenous users and values.

3316 "Consider noise cancelling barriers on newly build Stoney Trail highway (Calgary Road Ring SW). Plan, if
3317 feasible, the expansion of the public access parkway walking / biking path along the Elbow river
3318 connecting Griffith Woods with Weaselhead Habitat."

3319 I have lived around the Weaslehead for 59 years. Please do not make it difficult for us humans to enjoy
3320 it.

3321 The hardest part to manage are the small amount of people who abuse their rights within the park. My
3322 experience is this is a very low number but is a concern. The ability to explore and appreciate all the park
3323 has to offer is priceless

3324 It is important area for people to be in nature, as well as for wildlife. Both can exist at the same time.

3325 While hardscaping projects like a spray park etc. are a welcome part of the area, they should not
3326 interfere with the integrity of the naturalized spaces - keep them closer to the road interfaces.

3327 It needs to be protected to survive the daily use.

3328 I realize that it is hard to find balances, but I am always in favour of finding the balance point of where
3329 humans, pets, wildlife, and vegetation can live together. Siloing of each group doesn't result in better
3330 overall outcomes, just in ease of management. So while it may be more work I think it is worth it to find
3331 a way for all to intermingle all groups as much as possible. Thanks again for your thoughtful
3332 consideration of this special area.

3333 Addressing the issue of dark skies.

3334 The ring road caused a lot of disruption and cut off wildlife from a natural corridor. It would be nice to
3335 see any possible steps to remediate the natural space.

3336 Love this area and happy to have foresight of maintains an important place....

3337 "i built the earliest trails through this park with the opportunities for youth program. there's a plaque
3338 that talks about that.

3339 looking back i believe it was to get people out to enjoy the outdoors. i believe it is to be enjoyed by
3340 people. yes, animals live there, always will.

3341 i'm tired of the us and them attitude that exists. hikers don't like bicyclists. bicyclists don't like scooter
3342 people. some people love animals, others not so much. the park should be available for all to enjoy."

3343 I have seen a dramatic increase in pedestrian and cycling activity since Covid. My experience has been
3344 that people have been friendlier and seem happier to be outside in the this environment. Much
3345 gratitude!

3346 Use of the park has expanded. In the far west part of the park the nudists have slowly taken their space.
3347 It started as a couple of people and a warm weekend you can find up to 50 individuals. I have no issue
3348 with nudity at all. However large groups of people tend to defecate in the woods compromising water
3349 quality. The beach has a website and is on google maps. It appears the city endorses it or is not doing
3350 their job enforcing bylaws. Clean Drinking water trumps freedom of expression.

3351 Don't put in anymore playgrounds, bike jump parks (or have better access).

3352 Put the disc golf course back in

3353 it is a special place and we've seen considerably higher numbers visiting the park and will be challenging
3354 to prevent overuse or abuse

3355 The ring road not providing truly safe passage for wildlife is a huge broken promise for the area that I
3356 think about often. I also do not understand how disc golf, a fairly quiet and low impact sport was
3357 removed from the park while pickleball games can go there at all hours making the loud, extremely
3358 unnatural sounds that they do. I wish for that game to removed from there or restricted to only a couple
3359 of hours a day, it sucks to listen to in a natural park like this.

3360 I was born here in Calgary and spent my childhood in and around the park. So much has changed in the
3361 city more crowded and congested. So to have this park protected so that it retains its natural beauty is
3362 in my view a priority. When I was young we could go throughout the park have very little impact on the
3363 environment, now with the population it's simply not possible and must therefore be managed for its
3364 protection.

3365 a walking pathway and cycling pathway around the entire reservoir (heritage park area) . winter xc
3366 trails in weasel Head and around the reservoir where they get shade and the sun does not melt them a
3367 fast . you are kidding your self if you think you are protecting our water keeping people away from the
3368 water when we have that many housing communities golf courses and developments just barely up
3369 stream .

3370 I grew up in Lakeview walking dogs with friends in the weaselhead area. We always kept our dogs on
3371 leash and picked up after them. I don't think keeping dogs out of certain areas would solve the problem.
3372 I think more needs to be done to enforce the bylaws including fining dog owners who don't keep their
3373 dog on leash or pick up after their dog and fining anyone who litters, doesn't stay on designated trails or
3374 feeds wildlife.

3375 Without actual by-law enforcement and possibly use of a community watch group, this park will be
3376 quickly ruined and any work done with this study will be wasted.

3377 There are an awful lot of rules for a park. I have noticed increased divisiveness over the years, especially
3378 since the new signs went up. I don't encounter many users who aren't doing something that violates a
3379 rule.

3380 "Please do not build extra recreational structures in S Glenmore Park. Please ensure the City / Province
3381 influences the Tsuut'ina to avoid development & building to the very edge of the Weaselhead"

3382 Please do not turn this into a city park for recreation and dog walking. Appreciate some of the activities
3383 up top (skating in winter, frisbee golf, picnics) but do not want lower reservoir to be disturbed by
3384 development or designed for human entertainment. This isn't a theme park - should be a wildlife
3385 reserve with thoughtfully planned and managed access. Paved path as is now is great but do not want a
3386 system of pathways for bikes, strollers, dogs etc. Natural paths should be for walking only.

3387 If the management practices you have listed above are seriously what you are planning, you have my
3388 vote. This is a crisis situation.

3389 We need more areas like it, in that we need more forested parks, with adequate cycling infrastructure
3390 and wildlife, closer to communities. The reason some people drive here is often because it's too far for
3391 them to walk or bike to, and places like this should not be that far away in the first place. Hence, we
3392 need more places like this.

3393 Dogs are not allowed within the Weaselhead or along the reservoir. Enforce the laws.

3394 Keep it wild; resist the temptation of introducing commerce in the area.

3395 Preservation of our green spaces critical

3396 Love this area so much -- please help us keep it wild and protected now and in the future.

3397 "It is a jewel in Calgary's crown.... please do not change it very much. There are some "" look out"" areas
3398 with benches that are crumbling and need repair for safety as well as aesthetics. There are still a lot of
3399 irresponsible dog owners that do not pick up their dog poops and/or leave the poop bag on the side of
3400 the path. This is not acceptable. Nor sure how to monitor this and enforce the bylaws...maybe cameras
3401 in certain areas?"

3402 You have the power currently to protect the area. Enforce your current bylaws rigorously particularly as
3403 it pertains to dogs on leash. Rehab informal pathways particularly on the north slopes of the reservoir
3404 and Weaselhead.

3405 I agree with no bikes on the trails but would support use of Fat Bikes in Winter ONLY as it's less likely
3406 trail damage would occur. I've taken note of this while out there.

3407 The ring road was a serious mistake. As one of the primary regulators and stakeholders for the project
3408 the city should be embarrassed by its approval and lack of appropriate mitigation for protection of the
3409 cities watershed, primary wildlife corridor, and dense biodiversity. Not only is it embarrassing for the
3410 environmental process it is embarrassing for the social process associated to project approval.

3411 It's great finding quiet places away from the noise of most roads until you get closest the ring road that
3412 is. Isn't there a nude beach near weasel head?

3413 It's a special place. Not an expert, but I'm assuming that building the ring road may have kneecapped
3414 conservation/biodiversity aims. At least I assume so.

3415 Try and keep it wild

3416 Concerned about resilience of shoreline, especially up to the Weaselhead and around the Barry Erskine
3417 bridge as the reservoir levels rise and drop so much, and with the higher "normal" full level of the
3418 reservoir

3419 "I trust experts, with the ring road being built I have noticed moose coming more into areas I have never
3420 seen them. I think it's important to counter that with giving them more area with out human
3421 interference. Driving on stone there are large grass areas I hope these are turned into forest or native
3422 plant areas instead of areas needing mowing."

3423 Don't be scared of the coyotes.

3424 I'm so glad that my husband & I discovered these areas.

3425 I find my experience on the trails diminished by heavy bicycle traffic.

3426 I've been regularly using this area since 1975. Love it, to a large degree, because outside the main bike-
3427 path, there is little formally imposed on the landscape.

3428 Growing up nearby the Weaselhead gave me place to get in touch with nature without having to leave
3429 the city. I have so many memories of wandering through the forest and finding all sorts of flora and
3430 fauna. This has stuck with me into adulthood and I hope that future generations of Calgarians will be
3431 lucky enough to be able to escape to the weaselhead like I did.

3432 This is a great area of Calgary that should be continuously enhanced to support recreation.

3433 Dogs should be limited and off leash must be enforced with increased fines due to the delicate
3434 environment.

3435

3436

3437 The completion of Stoney /T'Sui T'ina trail impacted this area a lot..the animals lost a wildlife corridor
3438 and now there is constant noise from the highway. I know the highway was needed and is a good thing
3439 but it is important to not disturb this area any further.. I have already seen many more deer in my
3440 neighborhood since this highway was completed

3441 unsure about sheep grazing - more information required.

3442 There needs to be urgent repairs to pathways as some are crumbling into the pond and is very
3443 dangerous- there also needs to be planning for separate cyclist paths on south glenmore like along north
3444 glenmore. Upkeep to prevent ice is also needed

3445 Some more bbqs etc. would be nice but keep them out of the deep areas so as not to conflict with
3446 nature.

3447 It should be kept in mind that it is a natural area, but that there has been a large amount of human
3448 activity there over the course of history.

3449 It is also a nice area to xc country ski in, which I would like to see as still possible. (Without official track
3450 setting per se...or with but not a priority).

3451 Enforcement at the new 4way stop on 66 & 37th? Cars rarely stop. Please have better outlined
3452 pedestrian crossing markings at least.

3453 Preference for Lakeview residents who walk or bike - some of us moved here to enjoy nature

3454 The bicycles off paved trails need to be better monitored. Also - I worry about kids jumping off the green
3455 bridge over the river down in the Weaslehead with varying water levels. Don't make more trails, but also
3456 don't restrict access to walkers/joggers without REALLY good reason!

3457 This is a great park and I think a big draw is the natural aspect of it. I do think the preservation of habitat
3458 and waterways should be prioritized.

3459 I love the addition of the red chairs. I also love the skating area and groomed xc ski trails in the winter. I
3460 love playing pickleball at the tennis courts. It is an amazing natural area with so many activity options. I
3461 don't think there should be much more development though; otherwise it will lose the natural feeling
3462 and it will become overcrowded.

3463 People walking off trail and having pets off leash are major threats to the wildlife in the park!

3464 Restricting activities and use of this area will force people to go further afield for outdoor activities.

3465 Why can't we have a cafe/pub with a south facing patio and view of the lake?

3466 This is a treasured place and provides amazing opportunity for all Calgarians and the wildlife found
3467 within the region, and should be treasured and expanded (if at all possible). Thank you so much for all
3468 that you do!

3469

3470 More Indigenous education signage info re: history of the space

3471 I'm happy to be given an opportunity to give feedback on an area of the city that my family and I really
3472 love.

3473 If you are to ban mtbikes from the park, you must also ban horses. Discriminating against one user
3474 group is not acceptable. No valid argument can be made ecologically for this rule.

3475 Please please please have "multi-use" trails that can be shared by hikers/xc skiers/mtb riders. I
3476 appreciate walk only trails but the reality is we are limiting the use and the appeal of the park. Fish
3477 Creek has done a nice balance, let's work to find the sweet spot as they have between walk only and
3478 mtb/hiker multi-use trails.

3479 i would volunteer if there is opportunity to help cleaning the area or any area that I can participate to
3480 conserve the few green areas in the city

3481 Wait a minute. Aren't sheep an invasive species?

3482 It is encouraging to see the City of Calgary taking the health of the Weaselhead seriously. I appreciate
3483 the nature (no pun intended) of the questions in this engagement and strongly support the direction of
3484 management practices listed above. If there are further opportunities to engage or provide input I
3485 would be interested in participating further and can be reached at [personally identifying information
3486 removed]

3487 Please consider a ban on all dogs. There's many other areas they can do. I'm a pet care professional and
3488 I love dogs, but they don't need to be here. Please enforce tickets for off leash and patrols on summer
3489 evenings to prevent homeless encampments from destroying this beautiful area. This is a unique spot in
3490 the city and it needs to be saved from the destruction by careless people.

3491 A most amazing, special and precious gift that we are privileged to be stewards of.

3492 Leave it alone - keep planners away

3493 It is one of our greatest natural areas in the City but it can only stay that way if the pressure from people
3494 is managed. Keeping people out of sensitive areas, providing safe spaces for wildlife and ensuring
3495 wildlife movement out of the park is maintained will help.

3496 The Covid times proved the value of open and quiet places. All the development in South Glenmore Park
3497 could have been accommodated in current manicured green spaces and sport fields without any
3498 disruption to their uses and would have preserved the open ambiance of the South Glenmore Park and
3499 Weaselhead environments.

3500 Wetlands are proven to improve water quality, mitigate flooding, water storage during peak river
3501 flowrates, reduce erosion and also reduce greenhouse gases by storing carbon dioxide. They support
3502 biodiversity of plants & animals. Weaselhead is a precious resource we must protect. The pathway
3503 system provides opportunities for exercise and stress management, and needs to be maintained and
3504 extended. Separate paths for bikes and pedestrians would be greatly appreciated by both groups
3505 would like to see more gravel paths

3506 The municipality should walk away from from the Weaselhead/Glenmore area and leave it exactly as it
3507 is currently. The area is a sanctuary and a beautiful area that has thrived and will continue to so - the
3508 only caveat to this statement is that no motorized vehicles or development should be permitted

3509 Its getting busier and busier because the city continues to erode other public park and greenspace and
3510 densify the inner city

3511 Calgarians should be extremely proud of having these areas available to them. This was especially true
3512 during the pandemic.

3513 Limiting public access to the park (seasonal closures, pathway closures, decreased hours) defeats the
3514 purpose of having a space like this. I do not support those initiative.

3515 Amazing asset to the City

3516 The diversity of wildlife should be protected by whatever means are required.

3517 As a user who brings my leashed dog into Weaselhead with me fairly often, I think a garbage bin or two
3518 along the bike path would make a big difference. There are complaints from others of people leaving
3519 their dog waste bags around the flats, and I will admit I don't enjoy carrying a poop bag around with me
3520 on a long loop. Having trash bins only at the top of the hill near N Glenmore Park is inconvenient. I have
3521 noticed some trash left behind by school groups too, although not much.

3522 Control of unleashed dogs

3523 It's a natural treasure in the city of Calgary

3524 We bought our house in Lakeview in large part because of the proximity to the park and natural areas
3525 and hope to see its continued preservation.

3526 Whatever we do, lets not look at any parts of the area and decide to develop it further. For example,
3527 leave the grassland along 90th ave S.W. natural and no more development there. I find it disgusting
3528 that all the Richardsons Ground Squirrels have been poisoned by the city in previous years. This is not a
3529 way to treat a natural creature to that area that became a food source for other natural animals. Having
3530 seen the "gophers" eliminated, has also decimated the hawk population.

3531 The only conflict I find are the small minority of bike users who do not respect the rules, trail system and
3532 respect for walkers within the park, they are actually dangerous

3533 North and south glenmore are getting too developed. How many playgrounds does one park need??

3534 I often see people with dogs off leash either on the paved path or along the paved path along the south
3535 end of Glenmore (just west of the south Glenmore waterpark). It is sad to see coyotes standing in the
3536 middle of the path just watching people going by.

3537 Cycling pathways away from walking pathways must be established. The system is well over capacity
3538 and it has become dangerous. Perhaps do not allow dogs in the park in the spring during nesting season.
3539 As this is a sensitive time also have more patrols in the area. This also goes for other natural areas like
3540 Bowmont Park.

3541 I think that it would be appropriate to have staff (pathway walkers) on the pathway system. Also, more
3542 animal resistant trash containers and seating would support appropriate usage of the park.

3543 Do NOT OVERDEVELOP it even with recreational sites..... leave it in a natural state.

3544 This is a great park and we love it.

3545 It is a jewel park in the city that permits citizens to access an area that is quite natural and peaceful
3546 without leaving the city. One has the feeling of being at a lake, close to the mountains, etc, without
3547 spending hours driving, wasting gas etc. Also, as the majority of Calgarians are approaching or in their
3548 senior years, this is a way to remain active and in nature, as much as that is possible in a highly-used
3549 urban park.

3550 Keep this space natural with pathways dedicated to human use. It is a beautiful place! Possibly more
3551 snow removal in the winter.

3552 Nature cannot be easily recreated. It should be viewed as a precious and cherished resource

3553 It would take just a few visits from bylaw to reduce the nuisance of offleash dogs that are now
3554 commonplace. There is no reason to decrease dog available walking areas, a leashes dog does not
3555 disturb wildlife. And let's face it deer are overrunning this city same for coyotes, this park is for the tax
3556 paying public to enjoy. I've lived and loved and responsibly enjoyed Glenmore for over 40 yrs, could
3557 have done with out the skateboard park it does not fir in the esthetic.

3558 No, because the city is going to do what they want regardless of citizen input.

3559 I'm very grateful for it.

3560 "Why is the pathway between the Erskine bridge and the west edge of south Glenmore park not cleared
3561 of snow? Why was the beaver pond at the southwest corner of the weaselhead left to dry out without
3562 considering the beavers panic response? They chewed down so many trees and dug channels to no
3563 purpose ... in the end they had to move and start over."

3564 more disc golf!

3565 Don't spend a lot of money on this, continue to use it as a multi-use green space in the city, nurturing
3566 thoughtfulness via signs and education, not fences and penalties.

3567 Don't break what's not broken.

3568 Better design and maintenance of the paved path, especially near the beaver pond, is needed.

3569 I'd like to see the area expanded and more habitat created. Effective enforcement of existing bylaws
3570 would stop the small minority from abusing the area and improve everyone's enjoyment. More
3571 educational opportunities would help the next generation see the value of preservation of the
3572 environment. What can we do to encourage growth in the local wildlife population and flora?

3573

3574

3575 Maintaining free public access for adults, children , parents & seniors essential to a healthy lifestyle in
3576 Calgary

3577 I enjoy the area and hope it can stay beautiful like it is.

3578 Leave it as natural as possible

3579 Given the mess that the ring road created in the Weaselhead, the re routing of the river, the impact to
3580 wildlife movement both in and out of the city, the design of the bridge, anything Parks can do
3581 improve the area and mitigate some of the damage caused the better. Do it all.

3582 I Hope were able to continue to use the park and still keep wildlife in the area. I think people need to
3583 learn how much what they do impacts the wildlife and nature. I don't want to close the little trails
3584 because sometimes it's nice to get off the beaten track and places like that are hard to find I. The city.

3585 Please increase bylaw officer visits to enforce existing bylaws governing the park. Also install proper
3586 signage to educate people on why the bylaws are there. People listen/ behave when they understand
3587 why

3588 Many racing cyclists and those on small motorized vehicles add an dangerous feeling to others on
3589 pathway. I'd like to see either dedicated cycle paths, or speed limits on wheels.

3590 The park is busy on weekends and worry about sustainability, while having access.

3591 There are limits to how natural the area can be unless people are excluded, which I would be strongly
3592 opposed to. The extension of the South Stoney trail has degraded the Weaselhead component through
3593 noise pollution and wildlife fencing. The Glenmore reservoir is itself a mad made facility that is not
3594 natural and has serious limitations to meeting biodiversity targets

3595 The bombing range to the north will have ongoing concerns.

3596 I cannot believe the city allowed Stoney Trail to come so close. That whole end of the park hums with
3597 traffic. I can get that noise at home. Very disappointing.

3598 The skating areas developed over the past few years has been a tremendously wonderful project that
3599 brings families outside and participating in a healthy activity in a beautiful environment.

3600 Work with adjacent property owners and landscape companies to reduce pesticide/fertilizer use and to
3601 modify landscaping with natural species, xeriscaping. Also tactics to reduce bird collisions, add bat
3602 houses, avoid feeders and plants that attract coyotes...in other words expand healthy habitat to
3603 include private land but be mindful of managing human-wildlife conflicts. Establish targets for wildlife
3604 populations, given what the habitat can reasonably support and the public can tolerate.

3605 You need a full comprehensive plan if you're going to do this right. Everything planned, right down to
3606 tree placement, picnic areas, and paths. Even garbage can placement can have an inverse effect on the
3607 functionality of the park. And for bloody sakes, stop killing the coyotes. They help keep the pest
3608 population down.

3609 Sell some of the land to the mcdonalds, so they can fix their drive through drainage which damages the
3610 Asphalt very heavily. Beyond that leave it how it is

3611 It is a jewel of an area and one of the reasons our family chose to move to a nearby community. We all
3612 use the entire area regularly for exercise, recreation, stress relief and even education (MRU science
3613 student research).I do think bylaw enforcement and education could do a lot to help with some of the
3614 problems in the area(ie Speeding bikes, people out on the ice, off trail damage). I also worry about
3615 some clamorous residents in the area that would prefer all activities and access reduced

3616 I'd like to know how the impact of the water bypass system going in west between highway 8 and 1 and
3617 climate change is being factored in and what it will look like in the Weaselhead over time. Thanks for
3618 the wonderful job on the park facilities enhancements up to!

3619 I know people like to walk dogs in there but people always let them roam off leash. I have a dog so I
3620 know people never follow rules about them. Maybe there should be some no dog zones there? Asphalt
3621 pathways only?

3622 The Weaselhead/Glenmore area is a gem within a large sprawling city. Areas like this should be
3623 maintained at all costs, so that my generation and future generations can enjoy it.

3624 It's a huge value to people living in Calgary, something that cannot be replaced.

3625 Incredible area. Leave it as it is.

3626 Keep it beautiful but don't close it to cyclists.

3627 We wish that the shore along the elbow River was not flooded. For the past 2 summers, since the
3628 reservoir dam construction has finished, water has been flooded over the river bank, which has flooded
3629 and destroyed a large section of trail, created many areas of standing water (horrible mosquito
3630 conditions), and flooded the 'beach' area allowing zero access to enjoy the river. We would love to see
3631 it return to pre-2020 levels

3632 A paved pathway should connect Griffith Woods to the west end of North Glenmore park. Passing under
3633 the new highway bridges.

3634 Unclear to what degree you would consider restricting park hours and trails so hard to say to what
3635 degree I would support it. Would need details to say.

3636 Thank you so much for asking. I appreciate Glenmore Park a true treasure in Calgary. One request.
3637 Please don't let the rest of the city know what a great park it is!

3638 "Also appreciate the xc grooming Bike bike on south side is a nice addition, but always seems to be
3639 crowded"

3640 Leave this alone. This survey is terrible and is just a thinly veiled way to force closures for no good
3641 reasons. Same crap that the city tried to force on nose hill users. Utter waste of tax payer's money

3642 Please, please, please I am begging you please get the washroom/toilet situation figured out. Its
3643 disgusting with the random portable toilets and the toilets are usually closed most of the time. Please fix
3644 this!! ppl usually defecate and urinate openly because of the lack of accessible clean washrooms. It's
3645 really bad.

3646 It is a very popular place among Calgarians and needs to remain accessible for all. The city needs to
3647 maintain it in a way that it remains accessible. The traffic/parking management needs to be improved.

3648

3649 Limit dogs to protect the wildlife. Many dogs are there swimming in the water and off leash.

3650 Would appreciate an indoor washroom somewhere, especially for winter.

3651 To keep it safe for people please widen pathways so bikes and walker/runners aren't colliding.

3652 I have visited the Weaselhead area since the early 1970's when living at CFB Currie. Spent time there
3653 with Girl Guides as well as school trips, plus my father was friends with Chief Crowchild, so we were
3654 granted access to areas most Calgarians were not. I feel the area is "generally" in the same shape that it
3655 was 50 years ago, and would prefer that it stays that way for future generations to be able to appreciate
3656 and enjoy. No commercialized areas, please!

3657 Are you planning paid parking

3658 It's a unique place to enjoy relatively untouched nature. I love that the preservation of the ecosystems
3659 and public education are priorities

3660 Do not over-develop it. While I do love the amenities of North Glenmore Park and can appreciate recent
3661 efforts to add to our outdoor enjoyment of it (such as disc golf, skating, etc.), I would be extremely
3662 disappointed if these types of things started to filter down into the more natural Weaselhead flats area.

3663 I like the idea of increased grassland naturalization and decrease mowing. I hope that wildflower seeds/
3664 plants can be included in these naturalized areas. I would be more than happy to help volunteer my
3665 time for the park.

3666 BIKE TRAILS OFF THE MAIN ASHPHALT SHOULD BE PERMITTED.

3667 It is a great area. Sometimes there is vandalism which should not happen. And no homeless people
3668 should live there.

3669 I love this space! Its (more) natural, its not a constructed lake/ wetland like in new communities.

3670 We are responsible dog owners and cyclists, so it pains me to see others make a bad name for all by
3671 leaving waste, tearing up the trails, and disrespecting the area. I would rather restrict the area for all
3672 than continue to allow a small percentage of park goers to create that much damage. I've also had
3673 multiple encounters with naked people on the trails or near the west parking lot engaging in sexual
3674 activity which may be connected to the nude beach, but again ruins it for all.

3675 It is on the verge of failing.

3676 Please maintain the pathway during the winter around the whole Weaselhead. I am a frequent walker as
3677 are so many people and it gets pretty treacherous. Would be open to discussing further. I have ideas!
3678 [personally identifying information removed]. Thank you!!

3679 The trails are not underused. The habitat fragmentation was caused by the ring road. Please do not
3680 remove some of the only places we can run without having to worry about aggressive off leash dogs.
3681 Such as I do in Edworthy, Bowmount, etc.

3682 It is an amazing part of our city and deserves the utmost respect and protection.

3683 "I run there all winter long (more than I run in the summer) and there are dogs and fat bikers on the
3684 Oxbow Trail (where a sign states they are not allowed) all winter long. If the dog free zone is for wildlife
3685 then it should be better enforced. here needs to be a balance and taking out ""underused"" trails is a
3686 major flaw in this plan because the trails are not as underused as the city implies."

3687 What about some noise buffers and fencing on the ring road?

3688 It could use a couple more garbage cans :)

3689 The mowed space can get decreased with natural pockets of plants and trees. Possibly introduction of
3690 wildflower areas that do not need to be watered. I like the idea of the pump track and ice skating track
3691 for people to enjoy. Upgrade Weaselhead trails with gravel in low spots, so people do not make new
3692 trails to avoid muddy or wet areas. Allow fat tire bikes off pavement. They help smooth the trail and
3693 are considerate of walkers.

3694 With the forethought of previous city & parks planners, we have been given the privilege of a natural,
3695 beautiful and soul healing sanctuary right here within our city limits. Both thoughtful management and
3696 public education/engagement need to be ongoing to ensure this precious privilege is protected for
3697 future generations.

3698 I suggest a paved sidewalk leading into the park off 90 ave and 24 st. as pedestrians often walk on the
3699 roadway on the right side of the South Glenmore Park entrance. Safety first!

3700 There are opportunities to learn from this valuable park. Ongoing research is being conducted by the
3701 Weaselhead Glenmore Park preservation society that helps us understand how urbanization affects
3702 natural areas. As we encroach ever more on nature, we must learn how to coexist for all of us and
3703 future generations.

3704 I'd really not support additional new development in this area (e.g. the bike pump track, curling and
3705 skating lanes). I think the focus should be preserving what is there already.

3706 Calgarians are fortunate to have this accessible area but more needs to be done in terms of protection.
3707 Dog owners, cyclists and even walkers disregard the off limits signage for proper usage. I'm hoping that
3708 the beaver ponds will have more water this summer and that the low water level was due to drought
3709 conditions and not work from the Ring Road. Noise level from the Ring Road/90th Avenue is disruptive.
3710 Am seeing less birds and other wildlife due to the loss of habitat due to Ring Road.

3711 Please find ways for Calgarians to enjoy natural and wildlife to have safe havens

3712 Please eliminate electric bikes - because enforcing laws around them for safety will cost a fortune.

3713 I don't use it in the winter. I think it has too many picnic tables that tend to be used by the same smaller
3714 group of people.

3715 Vagrant encampments need to be removed and enforcement for littering must be upheld.

3716 Enforce "no dog" rule in the oxbow please.

3717 While pathways provide great access for non-motorized travel, access by public transit is very limited
3718 which continues to encourage vehicle access to the park. It would be great if shuttle transit from
3719 chinook/heritage station/BRT stops could be part of the plan.

3720 "It is a wonderful area, but the Weaselhead area is becoming a dog-walkers retreat and some folks are
3721 quite disrespectful. People leave poop bags in the woods, and ignore signs. There is no enforcement, so I
3722 have witnessed heated arguments due to the disagreements. Unfortunate with the noise of the Ring
3723 Road. Hoping that over time the area will return to nature. Beaver pond is in pretty sad shape."

3724 Ensure that the Weaslehead Preservation Society has lots of input into your decisions. They are a
3725 knowledgeable group with the park/area's best interests in their focus

3726 consider adding more adult exercise areas along the north shore. there are a lot of casual
3727 fitness/running/xc skiing groups that may form up. consider encouraging the food trucks/food festivals.
3728 Car parking is currently ok, only concern is overuse of the calgary canoe club parking and off road
3729 parking along the access road to the canoe club. Most of the people don't leave a mess, and are
3730 hiking/kayaking. Weasel flats is developing a lot of cross country paths, this should stop.

3731 Should increase non-motorized access and connectivity by building a MUP connection through TAZA to
3732 Discovery Ridge/Griffith Woods.

3733 I live in Lakeview Village and see how the park is used daily. I had no problem with disc golf, and saw it
3734 as a good use of public land. More of concern are the off leash dogs (I have seen bylaw officers 2 times
3735 in 11 years), off trail bikes, and the speed of traffic going in/out of the park (30 km signs on Crowchild
3736 Trail are RARELY observed). Deer, coyotes and moose have been in our yard, so enforcement and
3737 preservation of natural areas at this end of the park are also important.

3738 Most people who use the park are respectful. I work for the Weaselhead Preservation Society and I have
3739 lived in Lakeview my entire life (since 1967). I would be willing to work more hours, in the park, to help
3740 educate park users.

3741 "I am for more wildlife protection and naturalization, but I would be really sad to have reduced hours.
3742 Many of us come down and respectfully view the wildlife, enjoy the scents, sights and sounds at sunset
3743 and at night. Perhaps there might be some protected areas that are closed off at certain times of year
3744 as needed. I am really disappointed that these decisions weren't made earlier, prior to the ring road
3745 construction so that a more comprehensive plan could have been created."

3746 Thank you for asking for input!

3747 The Tsuu Tsina lands which border the Weaselhead/Glenmore areas are slated for real estate and
3748 business development like the rest of Calgary. New Communities in Calgary river and creek valleys, &
3749 floodplains site nature as a drawing point for sales but they are in fact degrading or destroying habitat
3750 and destroying biodiversity. Other cities are awakening to the importance of biodiversity. Save
3751 Weselh/Glenmre! Climte chge & insurance experts would say that blding in valleys is a disaster waiting

3752 This is one of Calgary's special places. Changes like the dry ponds, the twinning of the walk and bike
3753 paths, and the skating path have added to my personal enjoyment of the park. While I value the access
3754 the park gives me to nature, I also value walking by multi-generational picnics on summer weekends.
3755 The park cannot be everything to everybody but I trust the City will continue to find that balance.

3756 Please do not overdevelop this area. While the addition of the playgrounds, skating rink and other
3757 recreational amenities has been very well done, the park needs to maintain unstructured open spaces ...

3758 this helps make North Glenmore Park unique. The Weaselhead may also need additional protection in
3759 the future if it becomes overrun with too many visitors...it should remain a refuge for birds and wildlife.

3760 I would be excited to see Indigenous-City of Calgary co-stewardship/ownership of this area. I would like
3761 to see this area become a night-sky reserve. I would like to see plans to connect this area with other
3762 natural areas in the city. There is a need for bylaw enforcement to protect nature throughout the
3763 Weaselhead, and clear signage for areas that are dog-free.

3764 North Glenmore park needs a permanent disc golf course.

3765 Dogs are not the issue- volumes of cars with up close access, and large events brings too much volume
3766 of people, and detrimental behavior. Ensuring access is primarily self-propelled, dog owners are
3767 responsible (ie leashed in existing on leash areas) and reducing the numbers of festivals and large
3768 events occurring here is paramount. Those could occur elsewhere. no parking along 66th to reduce
3769 numbers and enforce parking rules. Also is a private golf course really necessary in a sensitive area

3770 You do a great job clearing snow on the pathways. Keep it up.

3771 The bike path is raidly changing to electric bikes, speed is up and safety is down. Saturdays and Sundays
3772 in the summer are becoming very dangerous.

3773 I love this area. I have notice a significant drop in wildlife since the ring road was opened. I'm sure it has
3774 a lot to do with the recent fencing in the west separating reserve land and the ring road from the park
3775 area. To bad.

3776 Ban all dogs

3777 Rather than closing trails, I think there is an opportunity to formalize the north pathway. This is a
3778 wonderful walk, and would help prevent some less-than-ideal uses of the more secluded areas of the
3779 park. A new pedestrian bridge near the 'nude beach area' would add value to the park.

3780 Access to nature, the wildlife, walking paths

3784

3785 Swimming should be allowed in the reservoir, Calgarians are missing out on a valuable public amenity in
3786 the name of "drinking water protection" while a major freeway and stormwater ponds are built
3787 upstream, the argument is flimsy and could easily be overcome with minor increases in treatment costs.

3788 walk here a few times each summer.

3789 walk here a couple of times per week

3793 I walk here weekly.

3794 I would love to see a means of walking over the bridge here safely. People do walk the peripheries of the
3795 Weaselhead and are faced with oncoming traffic to get over the river. In addition, more plants should be
3796 installed under the bridge for the wildlife crossing and to prevent people from going beyond the bridge
3797 to Tsuut'ina lands.

3798 This is one of the best places to view hummingbirds in the weaselhead during early summer.
3799 Unfortunately, it is due to the number of caraganas in this area. If these were to be removed they could
3800 reduce the number of hummingbirds which breed in the park annually. Should they be removed, native
3801 shrubs should be used which complement diversity of birds and prevent erosion of the slopes. This is an
3802 unofficial trail which is still heavily used. Providing appropriate access to users that is safe should be
3803 considered. I do not think this trail should be removed but made safer.

3804 The installation of a birding blind would complement users activities while lessening disturbance of the
3805 wildlife using the shorelines.

3806 The higher water levels within the reservoir have the potential to kill these imporant willow stands.
3807 When roots are saturated for extended periods of time they may damage the vascular systems of these
3808 plants. It is not only here but all along the low lying areas at the mouth of the reservoir.

3809 Several bird feeders and make-shift bird houses are often placed in this area. We need better signage
3810 and bylaw enforcement to reduce the number of people offering food for birds that don't require it.
3811 They risk altering bird behavior, introducing disease, and invasive species within the park.

3812 This is one of the most sensitive areas within the Weaselhead Flats. I refer to it as "the heart" of the
3813 Weaselhead. It hosts the largest trees and has a huge diversity of birds and wildlife that use this area.
3814 Pathways are currently diverging everywhere compacting soils. Creating natural guides to corral visitors
3815 to take certain trails (and avoid others) would benefit this area.

3816 To avoid people entering the sensitive areas on bikes, we need to provide adequate bike racks and
3817 signage where people can dock their bikes and explore on foot. This would be an ideal location where
3818 people can access several trails and the water when arriving on bikes.

3819 This area is critical for birds and other wildlife.

3820 Even on leash dogs represent a problem. They are perceived as a predator by local fauna. This type of
3821 disturbance has been documented as detrimental to the local ecology. That one of the reasons is why
3822 the city has the current bylaws in place.

3823 All along here is amazing for listening to and watching birds and other wildlife.

3824 Have noticed bright light encroaching from the west here. Need to keep this area better protected.
3825 Thank you!

- 3830 These bike paths are some of the best in the city!
- 3831 The introduction of a large highway here has negatively impacted the area. The highway generates noise
3832 and toxic fumes, which harm animals. It also makes it much harder to animals to move in and out of the
3833 conservation area. Rehabilitating this highway back into wilderness would improve the area immensely.
- 3834 This road is very loud and fast, and generates a lot of pollution. The pollution harms the environment for
3835 people and animals. The road also divides animal habitats.
- 3836 This golf course takes up a lot of space and it inaccessible. It would be a much better use of space if it
3837 were converted to park space with natural plants, etc.
- 3838 Horse Riding (I think this is part of the path system)
- 3839 Beaver area provides (used to provide...) a great area to watch/photograph birds. This has changed since
3840 the Ring Road.

3871 Having access to sailing in a public area right in the area is something we are lucky to have.

3872 LOVE the canoe club!

3873 Love the loop around the reservoir with the kids. They really dig going over the dam and being able to
3874 see where the water comes out down below.

3875 Love the terrain park that got put in. I hope it has cut down on people poaching the trails in the
3876 Weaselhead area.

3877 This whole series of trails is fantastic for our local Scout and Guide groups to be able to hike and be in a
3878 natural area right in the city. So many kids get introduced to the beauty of the forest here. Incredible
3879 educational resource.

3880 Cross country ski (winter), disc golf (summer, favourite holes were right here)

3881 Yay tennis! Wish they'd restrict the hours of pickleball though, the sound is pretty disruptive to wild life.

3882 Not birds, but muskrats, beavers and even mink love it here!

3883 Hikes and walks here near sunset are the best!

3884 Like others, I really miss the disc golf course here. With its low maintenance and minimal impact on
3885 habitat, it was a perfect fit for this corridor. With proper signage and tips for disc-golfers about sharing
3886 the space and right-of-way guidelines (let everyone else through and wait to throw, dogs should be on
3887 leashes etc.), this would have been a premiere local course and a shining example of a shared-park style
3888 course. Still miss it.

3905 going to drive their cars there anyway.

- 3948 This is a nice relaxing open field. Nice for general mix use, like walking, soccer, tossing a ball. Off leash
3949 dogs are a problem here and dogs often run up on you, or our children - not very nice.
- 3950 Cross-country skiing along side of road to get to groomed pathways.
- 3951 Kayaking up the Elbow River is amazing to see all sorts of wildlife.
- 3952 Hiking all year
- 3953 Sailing is a great and quiet addition to use the water also. Rental is good but putting in personal boat
3954 difficult.
- 3955 Cleared paths are nice
- 3956 Ed this it attempt 5!trying to get a walking icon to the south. This typing box is in the way. You may have
3957 lots of added stuff on the north but this is an artifact of a bad tool.
- 3958 This would be a good spot for more "development" to encourage more people use. Or a fenced in off-
3959 leash area. Away from the water and the most sensitive wildlife areas.

3960 I love sitting here and reading a book or sketching and writing.

3961 Nice paths here. I am concerned by the erosion that cyclists, trail threading and someone making bike
3962 jumps (with a shovel - making moguls of dirt) create.

3963 Ensuring dogs are leashed and cleaned up after (horses too IMO) by more signage and enforcement.
3964 Rutting caused by bikes on wet trails and trail braiding are an issue on the South side, might be worth
3965 doing some "trail days" to educate people and restore some areas. Love these areas and would love to
3966 keep it as natural as possible but still allowing people to enjoy nature.

3967 Can we call the bike lane the fast lane instead? I prefer running on the bike path as slow moving groups
3968 of people often take up the whole pathway. I stay close to the side to ensure passing is easily

3975 limiting mtb access. If horses are permitted on these trails, mtbikes also should be.

3976 At dusk you can often catch a beaver running across the pathway here. Much bigger out of water than
3977 you expect.

3978 The best place in the city to see cliff swallows and their amazing mud nests.

3979 This area is frequented by catbirds, warblers, swallows and thrushes. There's no better spot to
3980 birdwatch on an early summer morning.

- 4019 Starting point for my cycling route which usual goes (at the leas) all around the reservoir

4022 The concerns about dogs and wildlife could easily be remediated by having the unpaved paths be on-
4023 leash only rather than strictly no dogs. Improved bylaw enforcement is needed to educate and fine dog
4024 owners who have their dog off leash in these areas.

4025 Nice running/walking trail but a lot of it is overgrown, and after heavy snowfalls dead trees frequently
4026 fall onto the trail and peoples fences.

4027 People also frequently swim at Griffiths Wood Park - this is a popular spot for kayakers too

4028 This dirt trail south of the paved trail creates a second way to connect southern Glenmore park with the
4029 Weaselhead without having to run on pavement. Please do not remove it.

4030 There is a loop trail here that passes by the edge of the river and is very lovely to run. I'd be very
4031 disappointed if it was closed. The river part is one of my favorite areas of the park.

4032 Gorgeous walking/running trail, but too narrow and definitely not suitable for mountain biking.

4033 Many cyclists go way too fast down this hill, even with walkers/children/dogs on leash present. Is there
4034 any way to prevent or discourage this?

4035 The beaver pond provides important habitat for flycatchers, swallows, soras, orioles, rose-breasted
4036 grosbeaks, sapsuckers, various warblers and many others. It was fully drained last fall and I hope that
4037 was a one-time occurrence as the wildlife needs this wetland.

4038 Enjoying the NO DOGS (at minimum, LEASHED dogs) and BIKE FREE gravel pathways within the forest.

4039 Great viewing spot for waterfowl, shorebirds and especially the cliff swallows that nest here. It's not a
4040 good idea to allow dogs on the beaches below the bridge in springtime as the swallows need the
4041 shorelines to gather mud for their nests, and it's one of the prime spots in Weaselhead for shorebirds to
4042 gather.

4043 I enjoy cycling on PAVED pathways only.

4044 The waterfront trail is a great place to see waterfowl from April to November, as well as migrating
4045 passerines in spring and fall. There is signage barring dogs and fishing from the trail but it seems to be
4046 ignored by a significant number of people.

4047 Excellent spot to see shorebirds in spring

4048 A great spot for surveying migrants on the reservoir in spring and fall

4049 Great spot for surveying migrants on the reservoir in spring and fall

4050 Could these bathrooms be open all year? People have to go the bathroom in the winter too. More
4051 accessible bathrooms Year round is needed on the pathway.

4052 I love this new bike terrain park! Could be expanded and picnic tables added for families to gather at.

4053 "Better winter maintenance of the hill pathway is needed. It ices up terribly and is dangerous to
4054 navigate.

4055 Also add a few picnic tables to gather at the bottom of the hill to watch the pond life."

- 4056 My favourite place to run early mornings with friends.
- 4057 My father's memorial bench.
- 4058 Great for walking and enjoying the beauty of nature
- 4059 I photograph the flora and fauna of the Weaselhead.
- 4060 Excellent bikes paths that link up with our amazing bike path system. In the future it may be good to
4061 have separate bike and pedestrian paths on the south side, similar to the north side of the reservoir.
- 4062 Weaselhead flats are a special place for urban hiking. Really like the newer trail maps put in place. More
4063 educational signs could be displayed to point out why this area is so special.
- 4064 I walk regularly along the paths around the lake during all seasons, along with many other Calgarians.
- 4065 Kayaking in summer is a great outdoor activity
- 4066 There is a real need for a cycle path along 37th street. There is plenty of room here, and in the summer
4067 lots of cyclists use the road. Should have a separated pathway here.
- 4068 Lots of 'old growth' habitat birds
- 4069 Running along the bluffs weekly at least.
- 4070 Cross country ski (winter), disc golf (summer)
- 4071 Good trail running. Would be great to allow mountain biking in here as well!
- 4072 Excellent running trails!
- 4073 Trails in here are great for trail running. Lots of pathways, but some of them likely add to the erosion
4074 issues.
- 4075 Unsure about this area for mountain biking. Fun little side path to avoid the traffic on the big hill.
- 4076 Some amazing opportunities to see bird here in the spring!
- 4077 There are no signs here to indicate "No Biking" but there are some farther along on the Jackrabbit Trail.
4078 Without reading the big maps/signs, people don't always realize this is not an area for biking.
- 4079 Excellent place to watch wildlife
- 4080 boat tours. Mixed opinions for this, it is a big boat for a small reservoir, but probably also brings in
4081 money for the park/city.
- 4082 there has been a large bird of prey visible in the trees consistently for years.
- 4083 accessible by kayak, the groups I've seen enjoy the quiet.
- 4084 some cyclists seem to ignore the signs that this is not a cycle path.
- 4085 should either formalize and stabilize this path, or close it off.
- 4086 there are people who use this area for cardio. Can be slippery in winter.

4087 There were some casual fitness groups that used to use this area, but may have ended with covid
4088 quarantine. I-d like to see those be official, with timings, and get the food trucks here using the allocated
4089 reserved places.

4090 public accessible kayak, combined with rowing/outrigger/fitness/sistership activities

4091 Great area fo4 walking a dog on leash. Bike pats becoming dangerous due to EBikes an\$ thei4 speed

4092 This is a great area to relax by the river. This it is not on any pathway, it should not be prohibited to go
4093 here. I would not want this area to be overrun by people, but I don't think it should be closed either. Not
4094 sure how to accomplish this, but it's a wonderful area and a special part of the park.

4095 Access to the river is not adequate. This is a great spot to sit, relax and take in the area. It would be good
4096 to have other opportunities to do this elsewhere in the park.

4097 Thought will need to be given as to how City pathways will integrate with the proposed Taza
4098 development. There may be good opportunities to provide good access to the park.

4099 These 'inner' pathways are an amazing resource. They should be maintained. On-leash dog walking
4100 should also be allowed on these trails.

4101 A new pedestrian bridge in this location could connect the informal trail on the north side of the river
4102 with some of the underutilized trails to the south, and create a new walking circuit in the area.

4103 This informal trail could be improved and formalized and provide a new path in the area. It would also
4104 have the benefit of putting more eyes on some of the more secluded areas of the park.

4105 Dogs off leash in an onleash area

4109

4110 Noise level is now a significant impact with the construction of the SWCRR and need to work on
4111 solutions to mitigate the impact on the natural area.

4112 Need to seriously address the pathway from the top of the hill to the bridge. Some cyclists are travelling
4113 too fast and we need to correct the situation before tragedy strikes. Personally I have seen too many
4114 close calls and have been informed of collisions. Confederation Park changed a pathway to
4115 accommodate switchbacks after the death of a 14 year old in 2020. Glenmore Park on the South side
4116 was referenced in a Global News article as a concern due to injury collisions and the north side requires
4117 significant re-evaluation as well.

4118 Dogs and cyclists are only allowed on paved pathway. Dogs are a deterrent to wildlife even on leash.
4119 Weaselhead is a special protected area. Other conservation areas restrict dog and bike use for the
4120 health of the habitat.

4121 Agreed...need to reduce the artificial light at night in the surrounding areas and ensure no lighting
4122 allowed in the Weaselhead to protect the nocturnal ecosystem.

4123 I would like to see a balance of interests between trails being used by pedestrians and MTB riders.
4124 Ultimately, this is a public space and sharing a public space requires rules (more specifically signage and
4125 enforcement). That being said, this should be regarded as an urban habitat first and foremost. The park
4126 should recognize that off-leash dogs are a threat to biodiversity (specifically nesting birds) and act on it
4127 by using proper signage (and enforcement).

4128 Lots of swallows call this bridge home during the warmer months. I am not sure if educational signage
4129 exists here to let visitors know about them.

4130 Swimming should be allowed in the reservoir, there is no reasonable reason for it to be prohibited.
4131 Impacts to drinking water quality from swimming pale in comparison to land use impacts upstream of
4132 the reservoir and could easily be dealt with. This is a huge potential public amenity that is sitting unused.

4133 Dogs off leash and cyclists where they shouldn't be.

4134 The noise of the road is a concern here, as well as how non-navigable it is for wildlife. Need
4135 overpasses/underpasses and wildlife fencing which allows safe movement. Perhaps reduction of speed
4136 in the couple of KMs closest to Weaselhead should be observed.

4137 The new buildings facing this area appear to have large glass facings which is a major concern for
4138 window strikes by higher # of birds here, and also for light disturbing the wild area. LED lights facing
4139 parks should be disallowed.

4140 Watched a family walk their unleashed dogs across the ice. Two coyotes had been relaxed and hunting
4141 for mice. The family allowed their dogs to run towards the coyotes, disturbing them and then the kids
4142 took chase too. We need to do better.

4143 Dogs defecating in our drinking water. Against the bylaw you say? Phone 311? Where are the bylaw
4144 enforcers? Rarer than hens teeth.

4145 Too many off leash dogs in this area. This is a ground nesting bird area.

4146 Sign here or near here says you are entering the Weaselhead natural area. Please be informed of
4147 regulations. Then a website. Why doesn't this sign just list the regulations, specifically the ones about
4148 dog and bike usage.

4149 Signage regarding dogs is confusing. Needs to say dogs allowed only on paved pathway. By saying they
4150 are allowed only on pathway makes people think they are allowed on trails.

4151 Silt impacts from road.

4152 There are some rocks here that seem to be a dumping spot for dog waste bags. Maybe a garbage bin
4153 here would make sense since people can't seem to use the one at the bottom of the steps.

4154 The fencing along the Golf Course needs to be higher. I have almost been hit by objects going over the
4155 fence on several occasions in this area. (I am not sure why but something is detecting a banned word in
4156 this).

4157 Confusing signage re dog access

4158 "The concern here is about habitat restoration and preservation, not what your clothing choices are.
4159 Ultimately there should not be a ""beach"" use within this area for anyone if the City is designating it as
4160 a Special Protection Natural Area and are trying to reduce/control human activity in this highly sensitive
4161 wildlife habitat.

4162 ""Beach"" use implies a destination that needs at least toilet facilities and garbage control measures.
4163 These facilities would help with the impact of human waste on the environment but then that would
4164 only increase the number of humans using this area. What is really required is less human activity and
4165 waste so there is a better chance that the wildlife will continue to thrive in this area.

4166 The conflict here is between the ""beach"" use and the vision for maintaining/restoring this Special
4167 Protection Area. Current beach uses which are impacting and eroding wildlife use and habitat should not
4168 be allowed in this area for anyone."

4169 Glad this bridge is narrow and makes people slow down. Cyclists are supposed to walk their bikes
4170 through here. Imagine if it was wider which would only allow for more bikes at faster speeds.

4171 Drones overhead becoming more regular in this area. Not sure where operators are but they like to
4172 buzz this busy area.

4173 Off-leash dogs! Especially concerning in early spring (nesting season) when water level is low and basin
4174 of reservoir is exposed. Have seen dogs racing onto reservoir flats, chasing geese/ducks and digging in
4175 nesting sites. Owners not able to follow or control. One owner thought it was part of the "natural order"
4176 for dogs to chase birds so did not think it was a problem to let their dog loose. Need some
4177 education/signage perhaps for all users about sensitivity of habitat and importance of preserving it for
4178 all to enjoy - especially in nesting season. And where are bylaw officers when you need them? Rarely,
4179 if ever, see enforcement of bylaws for dogs and swimming in the reservoir.

4180 "Dogs off leash all the time. Some dog owners ruin it for all dog owners.

4181 Bad owners ignore reminders that dogs should be on leash.

4182 Need enforcement or nothing will change. Puts birds and ducks at risk - I have seen off leash dogs
4183 chase resting ducks off the shoreline of the creek."

4184 I'm concerned that road noise and pollution from this road makes this area unpleasant. It also harms
4185 wildlife that would otherwise use the banks of the reservoir as their habitat.

4186 It seems crazy that there can be a conservation plan that includes using city land here as a gold course.

4187 I'm concerned wildlife can't cross this road, and it is poisoning their habitat.

4188 A long term solutions for the boardwalks need to be found. Every time new ones are built- by the next
4189 season- the are damaged and many unusable

4190 This entire area is used by deviants as a sex cruising ground/nude beach. For some reason, a blind eye is
4191 turned to that behaviour (which is ACTUALLY illegal) but we're not allowed to have dogs here.

4192 Dog faeces everywhere. So disappointing how people let their dogs do whatever in this area.

4193 Bird feeding stations. It's crazy how many pop up. It's not just the birds that feed. The mice get in to it.
4194 The coyotes and other predators follow, increasing the chance of human/wildlife conflict - and we all
4195 know who loses there. Signage /education needed on that topic, and diligent removal of the feeding
4196 stations, with fines for those caught installing them.

4197 The noise! The connectivity! The noise will impact birds - some will have difficulty communicating,
4198 others may just not return. Some animals will still connect, but others will be extremely hesitant to cross
4199 this barrier - or may just not do it at all.

4200 Agree with SJM: Lack of wetland connectivity for amphibians and decreased water flow causing beaver
4201 pond to all but dry up in the summer.

4202 Cycling off of permitted trails.

4203 Off leash dogs! So many of them. We need better enforcement of on leash rules, and education for the
4204 public.

4205 Poor beaver area - drained almost dry. Not sure of the cause, but I can speculate that it was the Ring
4206 Road. Also, the noise is so loud here now since that Ring Road opened.

4207 "Walkers and runners will walk and run across making it impossible to pass if running or cycling. It's a
4208 shared space and we should all respect it."

4209 "The City of Calgary will not consider signage for the clothing-optional area, stating quite justifiably that
4210 they do not designate areas for every user group that uses parks. We find this fair. We wish to be
4211 treated like any other park user and we are. Calgary Nude Rec is somewhat opposed to signage because
4212 it unintentionally conveys that signage is required to be legal, which is not supported by law. Signage
4213 also has the unintended consequence of appear that we are ""taking over"" an area, which is not true.
4214 We welcome everyone to use this area with us, clothed or otherwise. Given that this area has been used
4215 for nude recreation for 20+ years (long before Calgary Nude Rec existed), we believe it would be fair to
4216 other park users for the City of Calgary to at least mark on maps that this area is used for such purposes.
4217 This would let park users decide for themselves as to which area of the park they wish to visit."

4218 This washout is deep and difficult to traverse. There should be a bridge over the washout.

4219 This I believe is a long stretch of multi-use pathway where cyclists can travel at high speeds, posing
4220 danger to walkers. Accommodating cyclists is a must, but accommodating all modes of transport should
4221 be prioritized.

4222 Many people with off leash dogs, and dogs on paths that should not have dogs, leashed or not. Bikes
4223 and all wheeled vehicles should only be on paved paths and only in daylight. Restricted hours should be
4224 in place to allow wildlife to thrive. Exception for wheeled vehicles for daylight wheelchair/handicap
4225 access.

4226 Dogs are an issue in these areas.

4227 The stability of the pathway in this area is variable and frequently dangerous. A more proactive solution
4228 rather than stacking repairs seems necessary.

4229 Kids jumping off the bridge into the river. Have also observed drone usage along the bridge.

4230 Shin deep in dog waste along reservoir between Glenmore Landing and Heritage Park. Go to place for
4231 your dog to relieve themselves. Great for our drinking water quality.

4232 "This is a crazy busy pathway along the top of the south ridge starting at the sailing club and going NW.
4233 Would love to see a split pathway - one for cyclists and one for pedestrians - like there is along the north
4234 ridge from the rowing club to the parking lot at 66 Ave and 37 St. There is already a split path on part of
4235 the south side that cyclists should take around the south side of the water park but many cyclist ignore
4236 this - mostly due to lack of clear signage and traffic calming/separation devices that should direct them
4237 to the bike path and keep them off the pedestrian-only stretch where the music park is. Generally there
4238 is a lot of confusion and conflict of use around the whole reservoir because of poor signage. This
4239 reservoir area is becoming so popular and the increase in use really requires some better solutions to
4240 keep it safe."

4241 Love the pump track! But not the layout which is dangerous! So many close calls between cyclists and
4242 pedestrians. The entrance to this popular attraction is often congested with cyclists and spectators
4243 blocking an already busy pedestrian/cycle pathway. Can the entrance to the pump track be moved?
4244 There are 3 other sides to the track with unlimited space and access. How about twinning the pathway
4245 at this spot and creating an entrance/spectator area on the south side? Or twinning the pathway
4246 around the south side so pedestrians and bikes can detour around this spot and avoid the congestion
4247 and collisions. Would require some clear signage to educate all users.

4248 This land is not within the Coty Limits of Calgary, which means bylaws cannot be enforced here. Need to
4249 work with the Tsuut'ina Nation and others to ensure proper jurisdictional boundaries are established.

4250 get over the clothing optional beach people. some people like to hang out naked. if you're offended by
4251 seeing nude people, get some counselling.

4252 Pickleball at all hours is disruptive enough to humans but really sucks for local wildlife.

4253 The sound of the ring road is a constant reminder to park users that they are still in the city. Absolutely
4254 concerned that the original plans to provide safe wildlife passage were ditched, nowhere near enough
4255 safe space for this.

4256 Offleash dogs along this corridor almost every time I walk or bike along here. Some have lunged in front
4257 of my bike too. Please keep the dogs on leash and clean up after them, plenty of dog poops seen back
4258 here too.

4259 NO OFF LEASH DOGS IN THE WEASLEHEAD. CYCLISTS ON PAVED PATHS ONLY. Please preserve this area.
4260 Fish Creek is now an atrocity - dirt bike paths everywhere, off-leash dogs have made it a desert for
4261 biodiversity.

4262 off-leash dogs are a massive problem in this city. Get a handle on it; they are incredibly destructive and
4263 their impact on wildlife and nesting birds is immense. And I am a dog owner and lover.

4264 NO off-leash dogs; NO DOGS at all in certain protected areas; Cyclists on PAVED paths only. Protect the
4265 little environment left.

4266 NOISE!! Large gatherings with their own sound systems in NGP, or Stampede drumming bands practice
4267 here. The sound carries along the ridge pathway towards the 37St/66Av parking lot and then clear

4268 across the water to the south side as well. If on the reservoir itself, you can't get away from the
4269 booming sounds until you go beyond the Barry Erskine pedestrian bridge. Need to educate all users
4270 about noise levels and enjoyment for all. Would be nice to have some visible bylaw enforcement
4271 especially at busy times - evenings and weekends. Complaints to 311 do nothing and if there is not staff
4272 in the area then everyone just has to put up with the noise until the inconsiderate ones stop.

4273 I love the xc ski track-setting here this year - please keep that up!

4274 "This is ""pedestrian only ""but bikes are always going through and some at great speed. Need to put
4275 signage at eye level on either end of this stretch - right now it is above the eye level of pedestrians - at
4276 least 8 ft or more.

4277 Please improve signage around entire reservoir about bikes and dogs."

4278 Have seen a stand-up paddleboard used here. Really need to clarify signage and enforce this or it will
4279 become a free-for-all.

4280 "The bridge area has become a popular off-leash dog swimming beach. No signage in the Weaselhead
4281 area about dogs. Why is signage prohibiting dogs posted up top along the paved pathway and not down
4282 below in the flats?

4283 There never seems to be any enforcement of restrictions - why is that?"

4284 Nude hikers along the river trails going back and forth to nude beach. These are single track pathways
4285 used by many and it is uncomfortable to meet a nude hiker - especially with children in the group! City
4286 really needs to deal with recreation in this area and be clear about uses and boundaries. What about all
4287 the children in school groups and Summer Day Camps that use this area - the City runs camps in here.
4288 Time to make your policies clear.

4289 Sign spray painted on sidewalk in white (2022) declaring "free" hiking (aka nude hiking) allowed below
4290 this point - that would mean throughout the Weaselhead Flats? Who is responsible for this decision?
4291 Or if it is not sanctioned by the City please remove the signage and be clear about nude activities (hiking
4292 and beaching) in this area.

4293 Calgary Nude Recreation advertises on their site that this is a Nude Beach - is that true? It is also noted
4294 on Google maps. The nude beach, if it is in fact legitimate, is actually further SW near the ring road. So
4295 many people are coming to this area since covid and are stopping at this beach thinking they have
4296 arrived at the nude beach. This has created a conflict of use with the walkers and boaters of all ages
4297 who have been coming here for many years. There is a problem with any beach destination along this
4298 stretch because the term "beach" implies a place to spend some time and this would require City
4299 facilities for both washroom and garbage collection. I have seen nude bathers relieving themselves on
4300 the beach - probably happens in the river as well. There should be concern about garbage, and people
4301 using the bushes for defecating. You can see the discarded tissue if you walk thru. Also consider
4302 sunscreen in the water. So many reasons this shouldn't be a picnic spot for anyone!

4303 Really concerned about bushes in this area that died off last year (2022). It is now like a graveyard for
4304 what was once once a thriving riparian zone. Can only imagine that it has impacted birds and nesting
4305 sites as well. Is this from the unusually high water level or from some kind of dumping from the
4306 construction of the ring road upstream? Waiting to see if the area can recover this year.

4307 I'm worried that car-dependency could tear up this land even more in the future, and the ring road only
4308 worsens our dependency.

4309 I'm worried that wildlife can't cross the ring road safely.

4310 Golf courses are a waste of land and water resources to sustain a sport for rich people who drive to the
4311 golf course anyway, making me question the need for them within the city limits.

4312 The sign here says no dogs except on the pathway. This sign gives free reign to people walking their
4313 dogs in the Weaselhead, as they are indeed walking dogs on pathways, of the dirt variety. The City is
4314 attempting to obfuscate their own bylaw. Kind of a joke this whole business with dogs. They're actually
4315 only allowed on the paved bike path. Great mix of uses, eh? Like telling the kids to go play on the
4316 freeway. How about just banning dogs from entire reservoir area to protect our drinking water.

4317 In the nicer weather there can be drinking and parties here, along with people in the water.

4318 There seems to be an increasing use of this area by some people, as a place to live when the weather is
4319 nicer, which has impacts on the plant and animal habitat.

4320 This part of the pathway can seem unsafe as people use high speeds, with narrow passageways and
4321 limited visibility at points. There are near misses here near Glenmore with people coming fast down the
4322 MUP and others coming up towards that path from the two other directions.

4323 Would love to see an eventual plan where MUP continues all the way along next to the water, similar to
4324 how it was added next to the golf course across from here.

4325 Lots of confusion at times with unfamiliar, occasional park users attending a picnic/playground,
4326 wandering on the path designated for bikes, leading to near misses. Might help to have more frequent
4327 signage or make sure painted markings on pavement are in good repair, for people who are
4328 entering/exiting path at different points along the grass and missed where the entry signage designated
4329 if it was for biking or walking.

4330 In the summer, groups can gather and take turns diving off the bridge, which is disruptive to the habitat,
4331 and seems like it could be unsafe for the individuals, not sure how deep the water is.

4332 Extensive infestation of yellow clematis - on causeway and along the entire shore of the reservoir from
4333 here all the way around to Heritage Park shore up into the woods.

4334 Knapweed infestation

4335 Really need to stabilize this pathway.

4336 Concerned about long term impacts of the new normal reservoir levels on the pathway and bridge

4337 Often encounter mountain bikers along the unpaved pathways in here even with the clear No Bike signs.
4338 These are very narrow paths and there is no where to go except to step off trail onto the vegetation to
4339 move out of the way for bikers. In the wetter months the trails get beat up by bike tires leading to a lot
4340 of ruts .

4341 Have seen groups swimming in the reservoir here. More signage may help.

4342 Always dogs off leash in area along residential fence line. Dog poo is a guarantee. There are coyote in
4343 the Aspen Forest as you can hear them at night which seems dangerous for off leash dogs and coyotes.

4344 Path has not been repaired - dangerous for cyclists, passing, children

4345 Noisy from Stoney trail

4346 Clearing and in general wherever there is shared biking and walking I don't feel safe. Also with dogs on
4347 leashes running across path and getting caught up.

4348 The crocuses here are lovely. Is the hill understood to be a natural area and therefore protected
4349 somehow?

4350 when the path needs to be on this road, the markers aren't clear about when to turn to the little path up
4351 to the hospital

4352 After the flood, a huge amount of time and money was spent widening what used to be a nice walking
4353 trail here - ostensibly to make it accessible for wheelchairs and strollers but of course that didn't work
4354 because natural rain and flooding makes this trail rutted/muddy. The project meant a huge amount of
4355 plant life that used to edge the trail had to be cut. This damaged great ecology for birds and other
4356 wildlife. The fact that the path is all the same width and "engineered" changed the natural feel of this
4357 "natural area". Please don't engineer any more trails! It's okay to have some trails that wheels can't go
4358 quickly or smoothly on. Concentrate on maintaining the paved pathway for bikes and wheelchairs and
4359 strollers. Thank you.

4360 Around this area there is some path that is crumbling towards the wetland that should be repaired.

4361 There can be a lot of congestion at the pump track depending on time of day and season. One solution
4362 could be to add more waiting room (picnic tables and benches so people waiting to use the area and
4363 anyone accompanying them don't wait on to the main trail.

4364 Hugely destructive effects on wildlife migration, light pollution and sound pollution. More engagement
4365 with the province and Tsuut'ina Nation to improvement on these factors would be ideal.

4366 Intensive trail braiding and habitat disturbance throughout this area. More restrictions need to be in
4367 place to preserve habitat.

4368 Hi frequency of bicycle usage. Disruptive to wildlife in the area. Bicycle use should be restricted to the
4369 regional paved pathway only.

4370 People walking their dogs off leash and letting them run through the habitat off path. Extremely
4371 destructive.

4372 Off leash dogs constantly seen in this area. I saw 2 chasing a coyote once.

4373 Homeless encampments in milder months

4374 Pathway flooding that affects wildlife movement and is over time changing the plant community. This
4375 area has lots of native plants but many of them are not tolerant of being flooded for half the season

4376 Lack of wetland connectivity for amphibians and decreased water flow causing beaver pond to all but
4377 dry up in the summer

4378 off leash dogs. Even if wildlife is not seen, they are there and they don't need to be harassed by off-leash
4379 dogs

4380 Gravel that washes onto the trail here after storms creates dangerous conditions for trail users. Some
4381 remedial stormwater management work would increase safety and reduce pathway
4382 sweeping/maintenance requirements.

4383 The educational signs need some major upgrading. Half of them are so sun bleached you can't even read
4384 them. Educating the public will help folks understand and respect the natural area that Weaselhead is.

4385 I think a few more garbage bins would help a lot with the dog waste bags being left around that people
4386 are complaining about. The nearest bin to the flats is all the way at the top of the hill towards N
4387 Glenmore Park. I have seen a little bit of trash from school groups being left behind too, although not a
4388 whole lot.

4389 I agree with the others about the condition of the boardwalk. Sometimes in the spring it is actually
4390 under water. Perhaps something elevated or a little further back off the shore

4391 For those that wonder about the absence of water here. It is quite possible that it is caused by beavers.
4392 The creek that runs from the cement bridge southwards to 90th ave has about 10 beaver dams and
4393 structures impeding the little stream. They can be seen on google earth. Most of them are on Tsuut'ina
4394 land please do not venture there.

4395 A few years ago the city decided to poison all the Richardson Ground Squirrels. Now there is a huge
4396 decrease in the hawk population. Not sure why they think ground squirrels are "pests" when they are
4397 not harming anyone in this area.

4398 Splash park is great but the black rubber surfaces and equipment in the playground get hot in the
4399 summer and kids are not going to take put on shoes when moving between the splash park and the
4400 playground because it is all one connected area.

4401 Offleash dogs are a huge concern in this park (and every park in the southwest). Playgrounds commonly
4402 have offleash dogs in or near them. Dogs disturbing wildlife and other park users. Need much better
4403 enforcement across Calgary, especially on weekends and holidays.

4404 Can this area be added into the park area and more wildlife habitat encouraged? Would like to see
4405 construction banned so developments don't further encroach on the park.

4406 Does the Plan include recreational use on the water? There are a growing number of users, but
4407 everything I see here is related to uses on land.

4408 So many people with dogs off leash scaring wildlife. Seems they don't know where dog parks are.

4409 Agree that this area had been ruined. It used to be a nice place to stop and observe waterfowl. Now it's
4410 just a depressing mess.

4411 No bike lane/ pathway coming down 37th street in to the park. This seems like a missed opportunity to
4412 add connection to the parks pathway system for users.

4413 Lots of congestion entering/ exiting the pump track. Great to see so many users but its high a traffic
4414 area that impacts users moving through the area.

4415 General comment about pathways and not specific only to to this spot: I use both the walking/running
4416 path for runs and the bike path for cycling. Other users are often all over the place (people walking on
4417 the bike path and bikes on the walking path) and often no one is paying attention to other users who are
4418 coming towards them (either in front or from behind) on the pathways. Some of this is due to user
4419 indifference, but some is due to congestion and popularity of these trails. Don't know what the solution
4420 is (widening the path for example has impact on the natural environment), but I have seen lots of
4421 crashes and incidents due to overcrowded paths and improper use on the paths.

4422 The steep downhill section with the abrupt 90 degree turn by the beaver ponds is safety risk of collisions
4423 between rapidly riding cyclists and pedestrians

4424 Why is the primitive bike path closed here that restricts access to the park by bicycle? I enjoy getting to
4425 the area by bike but the lack of a pathway along 37 Street into the park can make for a scary trip. I have
4426 accessed the area by bike but came across a fence near the park.

4427 I'd like people who use/rent kayaks or canoes to be reminded not to disturb the birds nesting/resting. It
4428 seems they often are just going for the photo or talking so loudly with no consideration of how it
4429 impacts wildlife.

4430 I agree, the board walk trail really needs to be fixed.

4431 River bank is consistently flooded all summer long resulting in zero trails and large amounts of standing
4432 water (very bad mosquitoes)

4433 This bridge is very narrow and can hardly fit 2 passing bikes.

4434 We need a bike path leading into Weaselhead down 37th street.

4435 I walk in the Aspen forest daily and there is a lot of dog waste. I have not encountered any problems
4436 with the dogs themselves, off leash or on leash. The majority of people are very responsible and leash
4437 up their dog when they see others walking or they have their dog on leash already. This is a naturalized
4438 area and people need to stay on the paths, clean up after their dogs and use common sense. There are
4439 other areas of the park that need attention over this.

4440 Strongly agree that this area needs attention, specifically rewilding and wildlife access needs to be
4441 addressed. I can tell the "post ring road revitalization" hasn't been completed, would like to see what
4442 the plan is for this corridor with respect to the ring road project finishing up.

4443 This area of the park is not as heavily used as the MUPs along the reservoir. I think this would be a great
4444 area for a disc golf course!

4445 Yeah, unsure about this golf course. It limits the users of city owned "open spaces" and is not conducive
4446 to wildlife biodiversity. Conversion to multi use area with naturalization and free recreation such as
4447 MUP and disc golf would be more in line with values of increasing biodiversity and equity amongst
4448 calgarians.

4449 More natural connectivity for terrestrial animals and for riparian zones. A multi use pathway to the
4450 Griffith woods would be great too! I wonder though how increased traffic would effect the wildlife and
4451 biodiversity in this area of the park?

4452 I agree with the previous commentator. I've ran past here 2-3 times a week all winter and I've seen
4453 people feeding birds for photos or just for fun at least 15 times. There should be signage and more
4454 enforcement.

4455 100% agree that the wildlife connectivity problem was created by the (necessary) ring road. There is
4456 only this narrow cement river connection here and no other underpasses. This one is noisy and needs to
4457 be re-wild to ensure wildlife can pass in out of the park. Closing beautiful running trails isn't going to
4458 solve the problem created by this area. Its just going to make less dirt trails in the city for people to
4459 enjoy.

4460 Agree that the boardwalk needs to be fixed. The trail perhaps should be re-aligned slightly farther away
4461 from the water. Having a boardwalk is not ideal as it creates a maintenance cost. This trail is important
4462 to create an official loop trail in the Weaselhead though so that you can stay off the pavement.

4463 Drainage that formerly filled this beaver pond has been completely disrupted by the ring road. The area
4464 is pretty much now a wasteland.

4465 Managing Reservoir levels for flood control needs to also address ecological impacts. After a long spring
4466 drawdown the reservoir is typically filled extremely quickly. This has significant impacts (nesting birds
4467 and small mammals that can not relocate). The larger level fluctuation is also killing off much of the bush
4468 in the riparian zone. When raising the water level, flows in the Elbow are reduced so much that rainbow
4469 trout redds (April/May spawning) are likely dried out and destroyed.

4470 Creeping bellflower (prohibited noxious) is found along the entire neighbourhood. It is moving from
4471 residential lots into the park, and is utterly out of control.

4472 "Nude beach is a very uncomfortable place to happen upon accidentally. I was once on a run and turned
4473 a corner on the pathway on the hill to a naked man sunning his nether regions. Not great.

4474

4475 I don't know what the right answer is, but I don't think they should be allowed here."

4476 Lots of garbage left behind after picnic areas are used for large family gatherings. Please increase
4477 signage/enforcement of this.

4478 Many cyclists speed down this hill in a very unsafe fashion, regardless if there are
4479 pedestrians/children/dogs on leash. Have seen many almost wipe out on the gravel at the bottom of the
4480 hill. Is there any way to prevent or discourage this speeding aside from the tiny speed limit sign? it
4481 becomes very uncomfortable on a busy summer day.

4482 Agree with concerns about dogs and bikes in this area, and not enough signage/enforcement to prevent
4483 same.

4484 Agree that this is not the place for mountain bikes.

4485 Agree with others concern about off leash dogs in this area. I bring my leashed dog in, have concerns
4486 with behaviour from non-leashed dogs and the waste left behind. Please increase signage and
4487 enforcement in this area.

4488 Echoing other comments - during the spring-summer-fall I refuse to enter the park on weekends
4489 because the demand exceeds what the park can handle. Vehicle congestion is problematic, parking on
4490 the shoulders/green areas be should not be occurring.

4491 Agree with two previous postings - would be nice to have naturalized connectivity both for wildlife and if
4492 feasible for recreational users.

4493 Agree with posting from Scott. That there isn't a pedestrian/bike trail running the length of 37st on the
4494 West side is just baffling and dangerous. The road is narrow and there are a lot of "close" and unfriendly
4495 encounters between motorists and cyclists.

4496 Speed at which cyclists travel and pass pedestrians

4497 I do not think this is the right place for mountain bikes.

4498 Agree with concerns about dogs and bikes in area

4499 The Earl Grey golf course is City-owned land. Is the current use aligned with Council priorities on
4500 climate, equity, and financial resilience? Could these lands be repurposed to provide more valuable
4501 habitat as well as opportunities for housing in line with MDP objectives and Council priorities?

4502 This seems like a significant habitat connectivity barrier. Can this crossing of Tsuut'ina Trail SW be more
4503 naturalized and other crossings added to support wildlife mobility?

4504 Traffic congestion and parked vehicles partly blocking road in this area on summer weekends and
4505 holiday.

4506 Frequently see dogs and cyclists here

4507 So many off leash dogs in this natural area! There is not need for this as it is literally right beside the off-
4508 leash area along the powerline right-of-way and interferes with wildlife (not to mention the bags and
4509 waste left behind)

4510 Lots of erosion on this hill. It would be good to formalize the trail and put in some stairs.

4511 Dogs and bikes - Both are not allowed out here, but people continue to come out here for biking and
4512 dog walking.

4513 Dogs! People bring their dogs out here and there is frequently dog waste and bags with dog waste.

4514 I would really like to see at least one "approved" mountain bike trail through here. The terrain is really
4515 interesting and it seems to be a waste to only allow walkers in here.

4516 people don't see the one way/no entry signs, they just see an available car park and get surprised at the
4517 parking bays being the "wrong way around".

4518 there are lots of unofficial trails forming, visible in winter snow.

4519 occasional loud music from some groups that can then be heard across the reservoir.

4520 there are people scattering seeds for the birds on the posts here, just to take photos.

4521 cyclists are using this turn off, to go on the dirt trails despite the signage indicating off limits to bikes.

4522 Enough blind corners with the trees to cause concerns for the hikers.

4523 This is one of the worst parts of the entire Mattamy Greenway. Build a MUP up the west side of 37 St
4524 ASAP!

4525 Agree with the comment about a MUP connection to Discovery/Griffith.

4526 It would be nice to see a bike path in this area to connect Glenmore Reservoir park and Discovery Ridge

4527 Someone has created a new alternative pathway in this area, and cut down trees, over the past few
4528 years. I suspect it is a homeowner attempting to divert people away from the back of their house. In any
4529 case, the 'new' path should be blocked and rehabilitated and the old pathway should be used. This area
4530 is now confusing.

4531 The City does not clear ice and snow effectively in the area in the valley, presumably because it cannot
4532 get equipment over the bridges on either end. This is a vital connection in the City's cycle network and
4533 needs to be cleared. There may be access from the ring road that the City could utilize, but the area
4534 needs to be regularly cleared.

4535 The boardwalk that was here has been damaged (possibly the result of more water being detained by
4536 the dam and higher water levels). This is a wonderful walking trail and it should be fixed.

4537 Nude beach. Don't mind too much if they stick to that area, but when they move to the other side of the
4538 river, I object.

4539 I like to ride my horse here

4556 Encouring people to visit, be able to meander the trails and develop a love of nature that will encourage
4557 them to want to protect it.

4558 A natural getaway from the city but still within the city, with easy accessible spaces to enjoy the park.

4559 A little piece of the foothills/parkland ecotone right in town. A buffer around our drinking water, free of
4560 dog excretion and racers.

4561 How lucky we are to have such a park only minutes away from where I live

4562 That it be kept as natural as it is today while supporting multiple types of activities

4563 Habitat and home for an amazing variety of wildlife.

4564 Accessibility to nature in your backyard and respect for the park and wildlife (i.e. no off leash dogs)

4565 Separate walking paths from biking paths.

4566

4578 It would be nice if there was educational signage to educate people as to why certain rules and bylaws
4579 are in place to protect the park
